leader on October 19. Sharif's Pakistan Muslim League (PML) gained 72 seats and was wooing smaller, inde-

pendent parties. Sharif, who won in a third province in Saturday's closely contested elections, called a meeting of his newly elected members of parliament in Islamabad and was in fighting

"We are as strong as anyone else", he said, "We are as powerful as any other party". With large opposition par-

ties in the two provinces that Bhutto won, Sharif looked certain to prove a tough opponent in Pakistan's highly personalised and Machiavellian poli-

As opposition leader, Bhutto launched a campaign to topple Sharif and, allied with former enemies, finally forced his resignation in July. Sharif himself had been chiefly responsible for Bhutto's fall from office in

The biggest Islamic party in parliament, the fundamentalist Jamaat-i-Islami, said both sides had asked for the support of its three members in the house leadership vote.

"We have not decided whether to vote for anyone or to abstain", a spokesman said by telephone from Lahore.

Sharif's party maintains that the Punjab result was still in the balance, giving a hung provincial parliament.



Earnings from raw jute plummeted by 0.97 million dollars from last year's corresponding period to 11.75 million dollars. In the jute goods sub-sector, the earnings fell by 5.24 million and stood at 53.17 million dollars.

The readymade garments sector witness a boom of 16.15 per cent growth over last year and the earnings stood at 253.69 million dollars.

The USA remained the top importer of Bangladeshi goods with a share of 35.30 per cent of the country's total exports. The second, third, fourth and fifth ranking countries are Germany (9.95 per cent of total export), the UK (7.69 per cent), France (6.24 per cent) and Italy (5.6 per cent).

During the period, Bangladesh exported to 76 countries around the globe.
