Doctors' strike continues

Half-day hartal disrupts Ctg

CHITTAGONG, Oct 20: Normal life was disrupted in this port city following a half-day hartal today enforced by the Islami Chhatra Shibir and the Awami League-backed Chhatra League.

The ICS and BCL gave the call for this half-day hartal separately in protest against the raid by unidentified gunmen on the doctors' cafeteria of the Chittagong Medical College on Monday that left three persons. including a doctor, killed and 30 others injured.

Today's hartal, that continued for eight hours beginning at 6 am was marked by sporadic explosions of crackers and cocktails at different places of the city amid massive picketing. according to police and witnesses. Kotwali police arrested three persons along with three live cocktails from the Andorkilla crossing during the hartal.

The arrested persons are Palash Dutta, Harunur Rashid and Md Yunus.

All kinds of vehicles including most of the rickshaws stayed off the roads, inconveniencing commuters. Shopping arcades, markets and most offices were shut.

UK to give Tk 60cr commodity aid to police

Britain and Bangladesh yesterday signed two agreements on commodity aid to Bangladesh police, reports UNB. British High Commissioner

in Dhaka Peter Fowler and Joint Secretary of the Economic Relations Division Md Sirajul Islam signed the agreements on behalf of their respective governments.

A press release issued by the British High Commission said the commodity aid grant worth 10 million pounds sterling (Tk 60 crore) recognises the steps taken by the government to implement structural adjustment agreements with the international financial institutions.

The grant is in two parts of 5 million pounds sterling each to be available in accordance with the conditions attached to the second and third tranches of the World Bank's Public Resources Management Adjustment

It will be open to the private and public sector for the purchase of goods and services. The funds will be administered by the crown agents on behalf of the British government.

The meeting warned that the doctors would go for stronger agitation if the killers were not arrested by tomorrow noon.

President of the Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA) Dr M A Majed addressed the meeting. which was presided over by acting president of district BMA Dr S M Badrul Alam.

Another reports says, workers of the Islami Chhatra Shibir and JCD today gheraped the office of the Principal of the Chittagong Medical College demanding expulsion of the BCL leaders including the VP and the GS of the college students union for their alleged involvement in Monday's killings.

A meeting of the college disciplinary committee was held at the Principal's office to review the situation. The meeting. which started at 1:30 pm, continued till late this evening.

Large contingents of police were still guarding the tensiongripped CMC campus and other trouble spots of the city.

Nizami blames BCL for CMCH killings

CHITTAGONG, Oct 20: Jamaat leader Moulana Matiur Rahman Nizami MP today blasted the government for patronising terrorism and blamed the Awami League-backed Chhatra League for Monday's killing at the Chittagong Medical College Hospital, reports UNB.

Addressing an anti-terrorism rally organised by the Jamaat city unit at Laldighi Square, the Jamaat leader said such brutal killings in broad daylight proved that the government miserably failed to ensure security of people's life and property.

"Last month's political alliance of BNP. AL and 5-party alliance on Rajshahi University incident gave terrorists a licence of killing. Monday's killing at the CMCH was also a result of that," he added.

Nizami accused a section of newspapers and journalists of being biased and partial and said they are engaged in making propaganda against the Jamaat-Shibir. He also blamed that a section of the press had been instigating terrorism. chaos and anarchy across the

The DCCI suggested that the representatives of the business community be included in the Privatisation Board, the Securities Exchange Commission, Export Processing Zone, financial loan courts and

the nationalised banks.

Waziullah said, the task of building infrastructure for the industries was now entrusted to different authorities and suggested these responsibilities should be given to the Board of Investment (BOI).

Suggesting a change of the "rent-seeking" attitude among the bureaucrats and an end to mis-use of the administration. the DCCI also urged the government to revise the Statutory Regulatory Order (SRO) of the National Board of Revenue with regard to import duty on capital machinery.
