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OIC and the Commonwealth. She said the process of converting these inputs into specific objectives that could be implemented remain an urgent task. The current law must also be revitalised to urgently push forward such issues as sharing of trans-boundary rivers, environmental codes of conduct and rights of women and children.

The Prime Minister said in the world of today, the main targets must be peace and development. "In our quest for peace and development, we need to be result-oriented. Global peace-keeping must be strengthened in new and imaginative ways, and has to be adequately financed."

She said technology and new mass awareness of rights and expectations had brought about phenomenal changes all over the world. These changes have been constructive, but not uniform. Winds of hope are blowing in the Middle-East, Cambodia, South Africa and Western Sahara, she said, adding that given the past deadlock, these first steps were indeed encouraging.

Begum Zia said there should be greater responsibility, vision and statesmanship for courageous initiatives. She said "the world-wide upsurge of democracy, greater tolerance for differing social and political systems and lesser reliance on the military culture hold great promise for the future." This must be strengthened, she said. "Yet negative impulses

counterbalance these devel opments." Double standards and lack of uniformity in the search for solutions continue to surface, she added.

The Prime Minister pointed out the Bosnia-Herzegovina situation as a paramount example in this respect. She said, "We must exert all efforts to arrive at a just and comprehensive solution that will preserve the religious, cultural and political integrity of Bosnia-Herzegovina
