Condition for resuming ties, aid

Riyadh demands public apology from Arafat

TUNIS, Oct 26: Saudi Arabia has demanded a public apology from PLO Chief Yasser Arafat as a condition for the normalisa tion of ties and resumption of aid to the Palestinians, diplomats said here today, reports

King Fahd set the condition in response to mediation efforts by Egyptian president Hosni Mubarak, who has been trying to patch up relations between the Palestine Liberation Organisation and Gulf states.

Relations were soured by Palestinian support for Iraqi president Saddam Hussein during the Gulf crisis from August 1990 to February 1991.

Saudi Arabia, along with other Gulf states, suspended aid to the PLO in retaliation for its pro-Iraqi stance after Baghdad troops overran Kuwait.

The United Arab Emirates and Qatar have shown signs of a rapprochement with the PLO since the signing of the Israeli PLO peace accord on September 13. but Saudi Arabia, which welcomed the limited autonomy deal, has not yet followed suit.

Meanwhile. Palestinians spoke bitterly today of the pace and scope of Israel's release of prisoners under the autonomy deal, saying the freeing of 600 so far went nowhere near far

Israel has freed 617 Palestinians from the occupied territories since Monday, in an operation which continued through the night, a military spokesman said. The group was made up of prisoners aged under 18 or over 50, women or the

"We were expecting more releases. This number does not even meet our minimum demands," said Suffan Abu Zayda spokesman for the PLO office in Gaza He urged Israel, which holds a total of 12,000 Palestinians, to "empty its prisons."

Myanmar may allow UNHCR to supervise Rohingyas' return

Myanmar is close to signing an agreement with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) allowing the UN relief agency to supervise on its territory the repatriation of the Rohingya refugees from Bangladesh, reports UNB.

Diplomatic sources in Dhaka said the agreement is expected to be initialled in the first week of November during a planned visit by UNHCR Director Warren Baltter to Yangon.

The sources indicated that hectic parleys were on to thrash out the planned accord that is expected to speed up the process of repatriation of tens of thousands of the Myanmar Muslims sheltered in squalid camps in south-eastern Bangter Barrister Rafigul Islam ladesh for more than two years

earlier last year.

In May 1992 the full court of the High Court division, consisting of all sitting judges and presided over by the Chief Justice, recommended that the two sub-judges be included in a panel approved earlier. The names of the two sub-judges were not included in the original panel of promotees forwarded by the Law Ministry, but the full court recommended their promotion after scrutinizing the service records, the source added.

Later, the full court again reaffirmed its decision recommending promotion of the two sub-judges.

Yet the Law Ministry, he said, did not even include the two candidates for promotion in the subsequent panels that were prepared and even went on to promote a junior sub-

judge. In August this year the Supreme Court sought a clarification from the government regarding the promotion of the two sub-judges. The Law Ministry is yet to provide any clarification on the matter, the

source pointed out. However, the Law Ministry source, who requested anonymity, noted that the President turned down the promotion of the two sub-judges on specific grounds after scrutinizing their annual confidential reports (ACR).

The President's Secretariat asked for the ACRs which contained specific allegations against the two sub-judges, he

In another instance, the informed source said, the government turned down a Supreme Court recommendation regarding the posting of a district judge.

In July last, the Law Ministry had forwarded a panel of two judges for posting as the district judge in Dhaka after the previous judge went on retire-

However, the Supreme Court, the source said, recommended a third judge for the post as the 'best candidate' but the government went on to appoint one of the two originally selected judges for the post, he added.

The Law Ministry source, however, pointed out that the candidate recommended by the Supreme Court was earlier posted in Dhaka a number of times and one of his close relatives was a practising lawyer at the Dhaka Bar.

The candidate recommended by the Supreme Court was not considered for the post on these grounds, as per the existing of-

ficial guidelines, he added. On the issue of magistrates performing judicial duties, the Law Ministry source acknowledged that until very recently no consultation was held at all with the Supreme Court. Noting that the magistrates are under the Ministry of Establishment, he said that after repeated requests to comply with the constitutional requirements the ministry only recently agreed to consult, through the Law Ministry, the Supreme Court regarding disciplinary matters against magistrates discharging judicial duties. But no consultation takes place with the Supreme Court relating to their appointment, posting and pro-

motion, he confirmed

Sher-e-Bangla's Tk 1070 cr okayed for 5 gas, 2 other projects

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (ECNEC) approved seven projects at a cost of Taka 1070 crore including a foreign exchange component of taka 531 crore to be undertaken by the Energy, Irrigation and Agriculture ministries, reports BSS.

The approval was given at a meeting of the ECNEC held here yesterday with Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman in the chair.

Out of the seven projects, five will be undertaken by the Energy and Mineral Resources Ministry which included Feni 2nd Gaswell Drilling and Development Project, the Titas and Habigani Gas Field Development Project, the Third Titas, Third Bakhrabad and Third Jalalabad Natural Gas Development Projects.

The Feni Gas Drilling Project is aimed at extraction of another 70 million cubic feet of gas which will be transmitted to Chittagong area and the Karnafuli Urea Fertilizer Company through the Bakhrabad-Chittagong Transmission Line.

The Titas and Habigani Gas Fields Development Project is designed to drill three gas wells in Titas area and four in Habiganj area. The project also included setting up of four gas processing plants two each in Titas and Habiganj areas.

The third Titas natural gas development project is aimed at setting up of gas pipe lines from

Murtaza to return nome next month

DAMASCUS, Oct 26: Murtaza Bhutto, the wanted brother of Pakistan's new Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto, said on Monday he has decided to end 16 years of self-imposed exile and return home next

Murtaza, 39, told Reuters in an interview at his home in Damascus where he is living in exile he planned to return on November 3 regardless of an arrest warrant issued against him in Pakistan.

But Murtaza, son of late Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, said he was not seeking to challenge his sister or to seek her job as a Prime Minister. "My immediate plan is to re-

turn to Pakistan. I am scheduled to return on the 3rd of November and I hope to be able to proceed from Karachi to the graves of my father and brother to say prayers and then to take oath in the parliament." Murtaza said.

Murtaza, who is wanted in Pakistan on a string of terrorism charges, was elected in his absence to the Sindh Provincial Assembly on October 9 polls. He must take his oath before November 7 or lose his seat.

His father was toppled in a military coup by General Mohammed Zia-ul-Haq in 1977 Bhutto was hanged in 1979 on controversial charges despite worldwide appeals for a pardon.

Taslima Nasreen The government yesterday issued a statement strongly contradicting the media campaign, especially outside Bangladesh, that controversial writer Taslima Nasreen was facing any threat to her life or not enjoying normal life, reports

"The recent spate of malicious publicity, carried out by interested quarters and by a section of the press regarding Taslima Nasreen is not based on fact and is highly imaginary," a statement from the External Publicity wing of the government said yesterday.

Giving "the correct position," the official version said the government banned Taslima Nasreen's novel "Lajjya" (Shame) on July 10 this year as it contained "substance prejudicial to the state" which might create misunderstanding and mistrust among different communities living in an exemplary harmony in the country.

"A few remarks in the said novel tantamount to blasphemy, hurting religious sentiments of a large section of people," the government said adding "It will not be out of place to mention here that 90 per cent of the population of Bangladesh are Muslims."

Giving a background of the recent controversy about the writer the statement said that the remarks in Nasreen's book had infuriated a religious group in Sylhet, a north-eastern district of Bangladesh who, in a meeting are reported to have condemned the controversial writer to death. "But the same group, in a press conference later, completely denied having said that, and termed the report as totally false, concocted and motivated," the statement explained.

It was their first meeting since they learned October 15 that they would share the Nobel Peace Prize. Each has since questioned whether the other deserved the award, reports AP.
