

New laws soon to curb 'defaulting culture'

The government is planning some drastic changes in the country's laws to tackle the problem of defaulting loanees.

To strengthen the existing legal framework, the government will soon enact a bankruptcy law, according to the top rankers heading the country's financial sector reforms programme.

Sources said this law will be similar to the Chapter 11 bankruptcy act of the US and also will be enforced accord-

Moreover, the jurisdiction of the financial loan court will also be stretched so that it becomes more effective in collecting the bad debts.

Bangladesh Bank sources said another legal code, called the Mortgage Act, suggested by private bankers as a means for recovering bad debts, is still under consideration. Under the proposed Ban-

kruptcy Act, anyone with defaulting loans will be declared bankrupt and he will be denied fresh loans and certain privileges and facilities.

Bankers now feel that this new law would discourage the 'defaulting culture' since they feel, most defaulters do not repay bank loans deliberately because the legal procedures to bring them to book are too weak and often full of loop-

To back up the bankruptcy act, the financial loan courts will be empowered to enforce its decisions. Presently, in most cases, the defaulters file appeal petitions with the Higher courts against the decisions of the loan court and the litigation drags on for years. But under the contemplated changes in the legal framework, steps will be taken to avoid lengthy litigation proce-

Sources said the drafts of the new laws will be completed within the next three months and sent to Parliament for adoption

The changes are a result of the World Bank's repeated concern over the country's bulging bad debts and as a preliminary step, the Finance Minister had also disclosed names of some selected big defaulters in Parliament. However, his action evoked severe reactions from the private sec-

The country's banking cir cle feels that about 35 per cent of the total loans have now become technically defaulting loans. They pointed out that this has been mainly because of 'buying out,' of back loans by new loans.

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia will inaugurate the 11th meeting of the health ministers of the WHO Southeast Asia region, at the International Conference Centre (ICC) at 10 in the morning.

There are 11 countries in the South Asia region of the World Health Organisation including Bhutan, North Korea, India, Indonesia, the Maldives. Mongolia. Myanmar, Nepal. Shri Lanka, Thailand and host Bangladesh.

Meanwhile the Health and Deputy Health Ministers of several countries arrived in the city yesterday.

BNP hasn't come to power thru' hartals : Khaleda

GOPALPUR (Tangail), Oct 31: Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia today rebutted the opposition's remarks that "BNP had gone to power through hartals" saying, "We have not come to power through hartals, but removed autoeracy by calling hartals." reports BSS.

Addressing a big public meeting at Suti V M High School field here she said hartals were necessary at that time to oust the autocracy but the BNP had come to power through people's mandate in a free, fair and neutral election.

The Prime Minister questioned the justifiability of conmirming harrers now and said there should be work now instead of hartals.

Criticising the organisers of frequent hartals Begum Zia said some quarters in league with the fallen autocracy have

now indulged in the politics of hartals to disrupt the democratic process.

She, however, said their attempts to disrupt the development and production would not be successful as the people would resist such ill moves.

The Prime Minister also addressed another big public meeting at the Bhuapur Ibrahimpur Khan College field under the district today.

The Prime Minister described the frequent hartal callers as isolated from the people and said their parties had resorted to the politics of hartals and chaos as they became perplexed by seeing the pensent-trend of the dayment.

Kashmiris inside Hazratbal say troops must leave

SRINAGAR, Oct 31: A group of 25 men today came out of Kashmir's holiest Islamic shrine that is surrounded by troops. saying none of the people inside

would leave until the army moved out, report AP AFP. The men, most of them in their early 20s, emerged from the white marble shrine in the afternoon and shouted anti-Indian slogans as hundreds of

Indian troops watched. Soldiers with guns trained on the mosque did not fire or make any attempt to grab the men, who stood about 100 feet away in the mosque's court-

"No India, no Pakistan, we want independence," shouted the men dressed in loose cotton shirts and shawls draped across their shoulders. On seeing a group of re-

porters and press photographers outside the mosque, one of them said they were not being held hostage inside the shrine by Muslim militants. Authorities say about 100 people are inside, many of them civilians being held by armed separatist guerillas.

"We are not militants, you can take our photographs." some of the men shouted.

Earlier today, a 40-year-old woman came out of the shrine and was taken by the police for interrogation.
