

l'aiwan jet plunges into sea: All safe

HONG KONG, Nov 4: A Taiwan jumbo jet with nearly 300 people aboard skidded of the runway and plunged into the sea while trying to land in strong winds and heavy rain at the Hong Kong Airport today, reports AFP.

The China Airlines Boeing 747-400 ended up half submerged in the sea with its nose resting on the embankment of the runway which just out into the harbour.

 Mifaculously there were no fatalities. Only five minor injuries and all passengers were evacuated to safety.

Wu, in his 20s, was sitting at the back of the plane. He said there was no big shock as the aircraft hit the sea ... it was quite gentle, but as the rescue operation got underway he noticed that water was coming in the rear door.

Cal flight 605 from Taipei. with 274 passengers and 22 crew on board, was trying to land when the accident occurred at 11.39 am, (0339 GMT).
