30 hurt in city violence

At least 30 people, including two press photographers, were injured in violent clashes during a Nationalist Democratic Alliance (NDA) meeting in the city yesterday.

According to witnesses, scores of home-made bombs and cocktails exploded and a number of gunshots were heard in and around the NDA-meeting venue at the Dainik Bangla intersection in Motijheel during the clashes which started at around 4 pm.

The nearly hour-long mayhem saw a group of stick-wielding armed youngmen also looting and ransacking over 20 shops in the vicinity and even forcing their way into the nearby National Sports Council (NSC) building, causing exten-

sive damage, they added. Panic spread in the entire Motijheel and Purana Paltan areas during the melee as people ran for safer places. All roads were closed in the area, causing severe traffic jams in nearby roads.

Riot police fired several rounds of teargas canisters and resorted to lathicharge to bring the situation under control.

Motijheel police arrested two persons from the spot and charged them under the Anti-Terrorism Act.

Three people were admitted with stab injuries while a number of others were given first-aid treatment at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

Witnesses said the trouble

erupted after a few cracker blasts were heard when a pro-Awami League Bangladesh Chhatra League procession was heading towards the National Press Club through the Purana Paltan intersection.

Instantly, numerous home-made bombs started to explode near the Dainik Bangla intersection. NDA chairman and former President Khandaker Mushtaque Ahmed was preparing to address the meeting at the time, witnesses added.

Two other meetings were also scheduled at the same venue by the Jamaat-Shibir Pratirodh Committee and the Rickshaw-Chalok League. However, only the NDA was allowed to hold the meeting while

police barricaded all roads leading to the Dainik Bangla intersection.

Stick-wielding NDA activists, witnesses said, turned violent and went on a rampage and looted about 25 shops in the Motijheel and Purana Paltan areas.

At one stage, they added, the unruly elements stormed the NSC building and ransacked the place breaking doors, windows, furniture, sports equipment and trophies and even of- fice machines. They were also seen walking away with a number of crests and trophies kept at the five-storeyed Sports Council building.

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WB VP Wood due in capital today

Sajjad will face Farooq Ahmed Leghari from Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto's Pakistan People's Party (PPP) in the election to be held November 13.

Announcing the decision, former premier and PML president Nawaz Sharif said the party and its allies were strong enough to source the presidency for Sajjad.

The president is to be elected by some 460 members of parliament and four provincial assemblies.

Auranga's men go on rampage in city

The conviction of Hemayetullah Auranga, MP, by the Additional District and Sessions Judge, Dhaka yesterday sparked off a series of violent incidents in the Nawabpur Road area in the afternoon, leaving scores of vehicles and shops damaged.

Witnesses said, immediately after the pronouncement of the life sentence against the Awami League parliamentarian, a militant procession made its way from the District Court area towards Gullistan.

The agitated processionists pelted stones at the passing vehicles and damaged at least 15 cars during the rampage.

Kotwali and Sutrapur police, when contacted last night, shifted blame on one another saying "it is not within our jurisdiction."

The police also failed to give details of the violence.

Prokrichi plans 8-hr hunger strike Nov 15

The non-administrative civil servants and the professionals in government service including engineers, agriculturists and doctors (Prokrichi) will jointly observe an eight-hour token hunger strike on November 15 to press home their 17-point charter of demands for administrative reforms.

The agitating civil servants and the professionals, following four fruitless meetings with the government since May last, recently decided to go ahead with a series of demonstrations against the government. Their programmes include a token two-hour work-stoppage every day from November 20 to 25 and going on a three-day casual leave from December 11 across the country by all the members of the non-administrative cadre services and the Prokrichi.

The non-administrative cadres also plan an en masse resignation in the last week of December amid an 'all out' agitation, the programme for which is to be announced on the first of January 1994.

25 RU students charged

RAJSHAH, Nov 6: Police today submitted two charge sheets on the violence occurred on the Rajshahi University campus in September last, reports UNB.

The charge sheets covered the campus violence on September 20 in which one student was killed, several others injured and the Registrar of the university, Omar Faruk was assaulted on September 22.

The Motihar police submitted charge sheet against 23 activists and leaders of the Islami Chhatra Shibir, including Mhatir Rahman Akand, president of its university unit, upon a case filed by the Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal.

Another charge sheet was submitted against two JCD leaders after filing a case by the university Registrar, accusing central assistant secretary Shahin Sawkat and assistant office secretary of the university unit AHM Kader Siddiki for assaulting and threatening him.

Most urban dwellers are denied municipal services, says report

Most of the urban population in Bangladesh have no access to municipal services since the growth of urban areas has consistently been faster than the growth of service infrastructure.

This was stated in a report prepared recently by the relevant authorities of the government that dealt with the overall situation in urban services including water supply, sanitation, drainage, waste management and other aspects.

The country's urban population has been estimated at 23 million, living in about 500 urban centres including the metropolitan cities, district towns, thana headquarters and small townships.

Only 106 towns are managed by municipalities and the four

big cities — Dhaka, Chittagong, Khulna and Rajshahi — have corporations.

According to the report, only 40 per cent of urban households, accommodating about 8.6 million people, have access to public water supplies. Forty per cent of these people have to depend on 20,000 hand pumps for water.

The remaining 60 per cent urban households where about 14 million people live, obtain water from private sources including ponds, surface water and hand-pumped tubewells.

People living in urban fringe settlements and slums do not have access to piped water while only Dhaka and Chittagong have extensive piped water distribution networks.

The report mentioned about wastage of water where public supply system exists and said that the wastage remains between 40 to 75 per cent. The wastage was attributed to inadequate supervision, operation and maintenance of the water supply system while the pricing policy and general apathy of consumers and agency personnel to water conservation was also pointed out as a major cause.

As regards sanitation services, the report said that only 25 per cent of the urban population have access to proper hygienic sanitation. The remaining 75 per cent depend on open latrines or open places.

Murtaza proclaims himself innocent

KARACHI, Nov 6: Mir Murtaza Bhutto, jailed younger brother of Pakistani Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto, proclaimed in court today, after 16 years in exile, he was innocent of a hijacking charge, reports Reuter.

Appearing for the first time since he was arrested when he arrived at the Karachi Airport on Thursday, Murtaza complained he had been detained without a warrant.

But he said he was delighted to be back in Pakistan — even if in a Pakistani jail.

"I am very happy that I am in Pakistan," Murtaza, who was a state guest of Syria for many years, told reporters after a 30-minute court appearance.

"Even though I am in jail it is a jail in my country, which is much better than living in exile," said the 39-year-old son of Pakistan's first popularly elected Prime Minister, Zulfikar Ali Bhutto.

Bhutto was toppled in a military coup in 1977 and hanged two years later on charges of conspiring in a political murder despite worldwide appeals for a pardon.

Police brought Murtaza to

Karachi's special court for the suppression of terrorist activities to face charges in connection with the hijacking of a Pakistani airliner to Kabul and Damascus in 1981 in which one man was killed.

"I will face the charges," Murtaza told reporters after the hearing. "I am innocent."

He was remanded to appear again on November 13. He is also due to appear on November 18 on charges that allege he led an underground group, Al-Zulfikar, accused of bombings in several Pakistani cities in the 1980s.

"I surrendered, but I have been deprived of my fundamental and legal rights," he told the court. "The authorities arrested me without showing an arrest warrant."

Police Deputy Superintendent Sarfaraz Alpa told the court he had not shown Murtaza an arrest warrant when he was taken into custody at the Karachi Airport.

Murtaza was initially refused permission to land in special plane provided by the Syrian government and later arrived

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Hazratbal crisis

Separatists' surrender only solution: Delhi

SRINAGAR (India), Nov 6: The Indian army siege of the Hazratbal Mosque entered a fourth week today with the authorities raising renewed hope of a settlement with Kashmiri Muslim rebels holed up in the mosque, reports AFP.

But nothing less than a surrender by the separatists would be acceptable, the government said.

Brigadier S P S Kanwar, commanding the siege of the lakeside mosque told reporters the new government negotiator Mehmoor-ur Rehman had held three rounds of talks with representatives of the separatists in the mosque.

"My personal view is that we are going to have a settlement very soon," Kanwar said, without specifying a likely date for an end to the standoff.

It was the first statement of hope by an Indian official since a painstakingly brokered agreement collapsed Wednesday after the militants at the last minute reverted back to demands for a safe passage.

Kashmir police chief

Manohar Nath Sabarwal earlier said that the estimated 50 militants who have been entrenched in the revered Islamic shrine since the night of October 15 had no choice but to give themselves up.

The police chief said the only thing being discussed during the negotiations related to how the rebels would be treated after their surrender.

Meanwhile, 88 packets of food were sent in today to the militants and the 60 to 70 Muslim pilgrims trapped in the mosque, Kanwar said, and added that a physician had been allowed inside the complex to treat the sick.

Some people emerged from the mosque around noon to collect five blankets from an abandoned hut inside the complex, he said.

Rehman, an additional chief secretary for Home Affairs, replaced Wajahat Habibullah as the chief government negotiator on Thursday after Habibullah was critically injured in an automobile accident.

Auranga gets life term for murder

Awami League MP KM Hemayetullah Auranga has been convicted for murdering a defence intelligence man and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Additional District and Sessions Judge of Dhaka Zinat Ara also fined him Tk 5,000 and in default to suffer another one year's rigorous imprisonment for killing DGFI corporal Ali Azam in January, 1980.

The 40-year-old AL leader, wearing white kuata-pyjama and a black Mujib coat, stood silently in the dock when the Judge delivered her 38-page verdict in the decade-old murder case yesterday.

Auranga's supporters, mostly AL and Jubo League activists on the ground floor of the old court building, chanted slo-

gans during the delivery of the verdict while policemen cordoned off the courtroom on the second floor of the building.

After the judgement, Auranga told a group of reporters that he would appeal against the sentence in the higher court.

Once a leading student leader of the AL's front organisation Bangladesh Chhatra League, Auranga was elected MP for the Shariatpur-1 constituency in February 1991.

Col (ret'd) Shwaket Ali, another AL MP from Shariatpur, was present in the court during the judgement.
