Hosokawa's apology was unlikely to satisfy many Koreans. But South Korean President Kim Young-sam called it "satisfying." and urged Koreans to put historical bitterness behind them.

"Now is the time to put the past behind us and move onward," said Kim. "Our two nations face a mountain of tasks that must be tackled jointly with the goal of advancing our common interests and world de clopment in anticipation of

The visit has been very good - it is interesting she told newsmen at the airport before departure.

Ms Raphel's visit to this country was the first hop in her current swing of some countries in the region.

The visit assumed signifi cance since she took over some time ago the charge of the South Asia bureau in the State

Department. It also marked the first high level visit to this country from the State Department since the Clinton administration took over in the White House.

"I am very impressed" said Ms Raphel, who during her stay here called on Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia and several ministers including Foreign Minister A S M Mostafizur Rahman in addition to having extensive talks with the Bangladesh side led by Foreign Secretary Reaz Rahman.

She also met Awami League chief and Leader of the Opposition in Parliament Sheikh Hasina.

The United States official said she had talks here covering all areas of mutual interest.

Answering questions, Ms Raphel expressed the hope that Bangladesh and India would be serious to settle the water issue. The United States was available for any kind of help in reaching a settlement of the problem, she

Ms Raphel on Friday took time off from her busy itinerary and spent some time in seeing countrysides-beauty of rural Bangladesh in the lovely autumn season.

system of sanitation. In the district towns, only 22 per cent have access to septic tanks, while coverage in the thana towns is about six per

About solid waste management, the report maintained that the standard and level in the country is poor. The municipalities, which have the responsibilities for collection and disposal of urban wastes, do not have the resources to deal with the situation.

Urban dwellers generate almost 6,000 tonnes of solid waste daily, said the report, expressing doubt whether 20 per cent of these waste are collected. In areas under the Dhaka City Corporation, about 1500 tonnes of solid waste is generated daily, about half of which is carted away and dumped.

The report also mentioned about poor drainage facilities in the urban areas with specific reference to the situation in Dhaka and Chittagong where water stagnates for hours even after only moderate showers.
