## 30 Indians die in landslide

MADRAS, Nov 12: At least 30 people were killed and 50 others injured in a rain-triggered landslide in southern India, police and rescue officials said Friday. The landslide occurred late Thursday near Calledmarapalam village, 600 kilometres (372 miles) east of Madras, capital of Tamil Nadu State. Rescuers pulled out 25 bodies. But they had to stop work when it started raining late Friday, reports AP.



SRINAGAR, Nov 12: Police used batons and tear gas to breakup small groups of Muslims who defied curfew and gathered in the streets after Friday prayers to protest against the Indian army's siege of Kashmir's holiest shrine, re-

port AP, AFP. Residents of Srinagar, Jammu-Kashmir state's summer capital, assembled at eight places and tried to march to the Hazratbal Mosque, which has been encircled by Indian troops since Oct. 15, police said.

There were no injuries, the state police chief, Mahinder Sabherwal, told reporters.

Government negotiators talking to some of the militants holed up inside the shrine failed to make headway.

Hundreds of Indian troops equipped with shields, batons and tear gas were deployed in Srinagar to foil the demonstrations called by Kashmiri Muslim political and militant groups.

A curfew was imposed on this troubled city of some 700,000 people and in other towns in the Muslim-majority Kashmir valley.

The call for mass street protests came from the All-party Kashmir Freedom Conference, an umbrella organisation which Thursday pulled out of talks between the government and 50 armed Muslim militants holed up in Hazratbal.

The captain of the turboprop ATP aircraft was suspended and a departmental inquiry committee was formed a day after he left behind Information Minister Barrister Nazmul Huda stranded in Chittagong on April 20 last.

The thorough and extensive investigation revealed nothing against the pilot who made a timely departure from Chittagong at 7:30 pm when the weather in Dhaka was monitored as turning bad.

But the captain, who recently qualified to fly the bigger pilot DC-10s, was cautioned for leaving the VIP behind - an act that had reportedly put the Biman authorities in an 'embarrassing situation.

The suspension order against the pilot was, however, withdrawn on July 2 when the investigation was on.

The two-member probe committee comprising the Deputy Chief of Flight Safety and the Deputy Chief Technical unearthed the 'only fault' that he (the pilot) did not carefully examine the 'check list' in which the names of all the 61 passengers were listed and that See Page 12 Col 8
