
Peshalov's professionalism The



MELBOURNE Nov 13: Nikolai Peshalov put the welfare of his pregnant

wife out of his mind Saturday night as he swept all three gold medals in the men's 59kilogram class at the World Weightlifting Championships, reports AP.

Peshalov, 23, collected Bulgaria's second title in men's competition following the triumph of Ivan Ivanov in the 54kilogram event on Friday.

Peshalov lifted 137.5kg in the snatch and 167.5kg in the clean-and-jerk for a total of 305kg (672 1/2lbs) in the new division. Both the total and the jerk will be ratified as world records in the newly-recognised weight class.

Hafiz Suleumanoglu of Turkey finished second overall with 295kg (650 1/2lbs), while Tang Ningsheng of China was third overall on 292.5 kg (644 3/4lbs).

Suleymanoglu, who migrated from Azerbaijan to Turkey in 1989, took the silver in the snatch and Qiu Shanlin of China the bronze, while Giorgos Tzelilis of Greece took the silver in the jerk and Tang the bronze. Olympic champion Chan

Byung-kwan of South Korea could only finish fourth overall "It was very hard to concen-

trate without knowing what was going on back home." Peshalov said. "I didn't want to ring before the competition because I was too nervous and now I can't get a (phone) line to Bulgaria.

Peshalov, a curly-headed full-time weightlifter who won his first world title in 1990, was an silver medalist in the 60kilogram class at the Barcelona Olympics.

He said his wife Lubka was expecting their first child in their hometown of Pazardjik. The baby was due Saturday.

"Now I hope to have two things to celebrate," he said. He said he planned to call the baby Victoria in honour of his victory if it is a girl, but would let his wife choose the name if it is a

Earlier. Chinese language student Liu Xiuhua needed only three lifts to defeat compatriot Guan Hong and win the women's 50-kilogram class gold medal.

Liu, a stocky 18-year-old

from Guangdong province, took the gold medals in both the clean-and-jerk and overall com-



"I felt very confident that I would win," Liu said. "I felt I could have lifted more if I had needed to."

Liu won a world title for the second straight year following her triumph in the 48-kilogram class last year. Guan won the 44-kilogram class last year in

lifting Federation weight groupings.

The championships are the first event in which world records can be officially recognized in the new classes. World records are set when lifters exceed world standards which were laid down during the year.

Lifting in 10 men's divisions and nine women's divisions at the Royal Exhibition Building continues through Nov 21.

Replied King: "This is not a normal presentation because I'm not a normal individual. One nugget of advice from

King concerned taxes. You must write it on before you write it off," said the man who once was acquitted on 24 counts of income-tax evasion.

Questions from the audience concerned former heavyweight champion Mike Tyson, and the answer to one caught everybody's attention.

"You're talking about business," said a student, who identified himself as "Big Rob"

Brooks. "Well, Mike Tyson being in jail, was that business on your part?"

"No. Mike Tyson being in fail was monkey business on his part," King said.

After the session. King said he meant Tyson, convicted of rape in Indiana, was in the wrong place at the wrong time.

The sad story of a Chinese superwoman

BEIJING, Nov 13: The new superwoman of Chinese athletics was weak and malnourished as a child and was told by her mother to avoid looking at people who were well fed, reports Reuter.

Hang Junxia, 20, won the Marathon World Cup in San Sebastian two weeks ago, after destroying the world 10,000 metres and 3,000 metres records at China's National Games in Beijing in October.

The People's Daily on Friday published a moving interview with her parents, farmers who live in a village on the outskirts of Dalian.

Wang was born in January 1973 when the family lived in a village in Jilin province to the north, the youngest in a family of one son and two daughters.

As a child, she was a weakling and could not lift her head until she was three and none of the neighbours asked her to help with farmwork because she looked too frail, the newspaper

But in primary school she began to win athletics competitions. By the time the family moved to Dalian in 1985 she was running at least an hour a day on the beach and, in winter, an hour a day along snow capped roads, with never a day's rest.

In middle school she ran home for lunch and then ran back to school, a total distance of 10 km (six miles) each day.

The family was so poor it had to trade the eggs from its three chickens for salt, cooking and soyabean oil, so that young Junxia had a few eggs to eat.

One day in 1988 she asked her mother for money to buy the nutritious food that her fellow students at Dalian physical education college were eating, only to be told there was no money and she had better avoid seeing them, so as not to think

Aged 16, she watched black athletes run away with the medals at an international meeting on television and promised her parents she would beat them — a promise she fulfilled last year. Her only brother returned home after serving in the army but was killed in a traffic accident before seeing Junxia again. The news was withheld from her for three months so she could finish a major sports meeting.


Buenos dias for Bueno

SEOUL. Nov 13: Mexican challenger Jose Luis Bueno outpunched South Korea's Moon Sung-kil to become the new World Boxing Council super flyweight champion with a split decision in a 12-round title match Saturday, reports AP.

The two boxers staged a slugfest from the start, with Bueno being floored in the third round before about 5,000 spectators at a gymnasium in the industrial city of Pohang, 280 kilometers (173 miles) southeast of Seoul.

One judge called the bout 115-114 for Moon, but two others carded 117-112 and 118-100 for Bueno.



Four more Russians in trouble

MOSCOW, Nov 13: Four more Russian weightlifters have been caught using anabolic steroids, bringing to seven the number who have tested positive for banned drugs since the national championships in

September, reports Reuter. Viktor Polyakov, head of the Russian Weightlifting Federation, said on Friday the four were caught in tests conducted in Moscow just after the St Petersburg Championships.

Polyakov declined to name the four, but told a Russian sports journalist that the federation was currently considering how to punish them.

Official source said the best known of the four were lgor Kachurin, a European champion in 1992 and Russian Champion Avetin Davtyan.

The four, previously unpublicised, cases are in addition to the positive dope tests on three leading weightlifters - Maxim Agapitov, Andrei Matveyev and Ramzan Mussayev that led to Russia being banned from the current World Championships in Melbourne, Australia.

That ban waived after the federation paid a 50,000 dollars fine.

Bubka in business

MARSEILLE, France, Nov 13: Sergey Bubka, the Ukrainian master of the pole vault, is to set up a top-level sports centre near here, reports AFP.

Bubka is buying a hotel and accompanying land at Salon-de-Provence, according to the centre's future director Francois Bourret on Friday. The costs were not revealed

but are at estimated six million francs (one million dollars) before building work, which is due to start in January and finish

The centre, which will bear Bubka's name, will also offer cross country running and mountain biking.


