

with a perfect length volley. In the third Jansher was dominant and took the game in 66 minutes but Marshall refused to bow down and stormed quickly into a 5-1 lead in the next with superb driving and perfect lobs into the corners.

MELBOURNE, Nov 17: Milena Trendafilova of Bulgaria swept all three gold medals in

the women's 70kilogram class Wednesday at the World Weightlifting Championships, reports AP.

The 23-year-old former national javelin champion lifted 100 kilograms (220 1/2 pounds) in the snatch and 120 (264 1/2) in the clean-andjerk for a total of 220 (485).

It was the sixth successive World Championships in which she had won the snatch, but the first time since 1990 she had won the overall title.

Li Chiaping of China, the favourite, did not compete. Chinese officials said she

had not made the weight and would instead compete in the 76-kilogram class on Thursday.

"I came here expecting to win the silver medals, so I was delighted the Chinese girl didn't make the weight. Trendafilova said.

"I don't think I had much chance of beating her, because the Chinese are extremely strong."



Li's compatriots Sun Caiyan. 19, won the 59 kg class on Monday. Chen Xiaomia, 16, won the 54 kg class by a massive 22.5 kg and Liu Xihua, 18 won the 50 kg.

The Chinese women won 26 of the 27 gold medals on offer at last year world titles and are on track to achieve a similar feat at this year's champions.

No Alexeyev to stop him now



national hero after winning Turkmenistan's first ever gold medal in any sport, reports Reuter.

It came on the fifth day of the World Weightlifting Championships on Tuesday.

Orazdurdiev, 24, turned last year's nightmare into this year's dream when he won the new 75 kg class, although he had to rely on his lighter bodyweight to take the gold medal.

Orazdurdiev lifted a combined total of 370 kg, equal with Rouslan Saftchenko, but the Ukrainian is just 30 grammes heavier.

The young weightlifting coach, who is Turkmenistan's only top class athlete in any sport, said: "This win will mean a lot to my country. It will inspire more younger people to take up sport, and maybe in particular weightlifting."

It was a sweet victory for Orazdurdiev, who represented the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS) team at the Barcelona Olympics and was favourite for the light-heavyweight final.

But he was pulled out of the contest by coach Vasily Alexeyev 15 minutes before the start, despite having the highest qualifying lift in the division.

Alexeyev, a Russian, said Orazdurdiev would have got in the way of Russian teammate Ibragim Samadov, who ended in

the bronze position. Orazdurdiev, pleaded in vain with Alexeyev, and even promised to let Samadov beat him.

Samadov was later stripped of his medal and banned for life from the sport after he dropped his bronze medal on the podium and stalked out of the award ceremony

Orazdurdiev is a product of the former Soviet Union's weightlifting infrastructure. He said after Tuesday's vic-

tory his country had no top class sports facilities that his 3.67 million compatriots could "All the best facilities went

to Russia after the split up," he explained. "Now in my country there are no good facilities for young people to use, so it is very difficult to encourage people to play sport."

Saftchenko, 22, in his first year at the senior level nearly had the gold in his pocket with

overall bronze medal. Reigning middleweight Oly mpic champion Todor Kasapu from Moldova lost any chance of getting amongst the medals when he finished 10th in the snatch and then failed to record

a clean lift in the jerk. Kasapu said he had be able to train properly for the World Championships because of food shortages in his homeland.

China, S Korea, Taiwan cagers in ABC qtrs

JAKARTA, Nov 17: China, South Korea and Taiwan al moved into the quarter-finals of the 17th men's Asian Basketball Confederation (ABC) championship here Tuesday, reports

Also through are Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Iran and North Korea.

In Group A China beat Pakistan 112-40 to win one of the groups tickets to the quarter-finals with the other going to group runners-up Saudi Arabia. Earlier, Jordan beat Thai-

land 72-45, but it failed to win

enough points to dislodge Saudi

Arabia. In Group B the Philippines easily outsmarted their Singaporean opponents, who were three ranks below them according to the ABCs 1991 seedings, to take the game 89-62 after

leading midway 44-28. But the effort was not enough for the seventh ranked Philippines to move into quarter-finals, with the two group slots going to South Korea and runners-up the United Arab Emirates.

In the Group D Taiwan and North Korea got the quarter-final tickets.

Earlier, Malaysia beat Bangladesh 144-73 in the same group.

Iran is already through in Group C with the runner-up position to be fought over between Japan and Indonesia later Tuesday.

Palatable plates

OSLO, Nov 17: If spectators at the Lillehammer Winter Olympics are still hungry after a meal, they can always try chewing on the plates, reports

Reuter. Organisers of the Games said on Tuesday they had ordered 900,000 environmentally friendly plates made of potato starch from a firm in neighbouring Sweden.

All knives, forks and spoons — 3.5 million in total — would be made from stiffened maize.

"We wanted to avoid using plastic. For the Olympics, this is the best environmental result we've achieved," said Osmund Ueland, a director with the organising committee.

"But we won't recommend people eat them - stick to the food on the plates;" he told Reuters.

At every arena the plates and cutlery will be collected into sacks, also made of potato starch, and recycled as plant fertilizer.

Ueland said more research was needed to find out if the plates and cutlery could be used as food for pigs as organisers had originally hoped Initial tests on edibility were encouraging.

"I ate two plates today and I feel fine. I also ate two or three some time ago for a group of Japanese reporters," he said. "But the cutlery's too stiff to

He said that a Norwegian firm would also supply about 300-400,000 recyclable plates The Swedish firm producing the potato starch plates only had capacity to make 900,000 in the three months left before the Games.

Cuba still too strong for China

TOKYO, Nov 17: China's challenge to all-conquering Cuba crashed in a straight-sets defeat in the women's competition at the 1.5 million dollar World Grand Champions Cup volleyball tournament here Wednesday, reports AFP.

The Chinese, who reshuffled their team after finishing seventh in the Barcelona Olympics, failed to capitalise on their 11-4 lead in the second set before losing 0-3 (3-15, 13-15, 7-15).

We had a chance to win the second set when the Cubans made several errors. We took six points on their mistakes, two on our service winners and four on our attacks. But our players lost nerve after that," said Chinese coach Li Xiaofeng. "The Cuban women have a

lot of experience and they are

able to overcome a deficit. Our team is still young and men-

tally insecure ... there are many ups and downs. We have to improve our vulnerable points to beat Cuba," he added. China dominated the world in the early 1980s, but Cuba replaced them, winning all the major titles, including the

World Cup, the Barcelona Games and this year's World

Grand Prix. Cuba's coach George Eugenio said: "The Chinese team missued chances because they have many young players and they haven't experienced enough, but I think they will be a major threat in the near future, especially Xiao Jianhua is a wonderful player."

NEW YORK, Nov 17: In the very international game of tennis, Mary Pierce is particularly worldly, reports AP.

Pierce, 18, lives in Florida but plays Federation Cup for France. She was born in Montreal, and so has a Canadian passport to go with her French and American ones. After her victory at the Vir-

ginia Slims championships over Gabriela Sabatini, Pierce's first over a top 10 player, she will likely move up from her current world ranking of 16. "Now that I beat a top ten player it just feels really great

and now it gives me more confidenee," she said in her postmatch press conference. Pierce has gained a lot of attention because of her often disruptive father, Jim Pierce, who was barred from attending Women's Tennis Association events after the French Open in

Mary's mother, Yannick, was rooting for Mary on Tuesday at Madison Square Garden and later chatted in French-accented English with Nick Bollettieri, Andre Aggassi's former coach, who has been helping

Mary's French has a slight American accent and is peppered with small grammatical errors. (She admits: "Français, c'est mon deuxieme langue" -French is my second language. Indeed. "Langue," a feminine word, should take the posses-

sive pronoun "ma".) Pierce says that for training

she prefers America. "But for living it's hard because I love France so much. I have so much fun.I have my cousins and everybody over there," she told the Associated Press. "France has helped me a lot when I needed help. So, I'm

glad to be playing for them."

Pierce, who also represents France in the Olympics, says the fans there "definitely" support her. "Before it was kind of hard. I don't know if they accepted me. But I think now they are pulling for me," she says.

"I think it's going to be a fun match because I like the way she plays. I like playing against people who come to the net a lot," Pierce said.


