

Kashmiris boycott prayers at Hazratbal

SRINAGAR, Nov 18: Kashmiri Muslims kept away from the Hazratbal mosque after it was opened to them today following a month-long army siege, demanding the withdrawal of a security cordon around the shrine, reports AFP.

Some 1,000 protesters attempted a march on the lake-side mosque but were beaten back by members of the Border Security Force (BSF), whose presence around the complex has sparked public resentment, a police official said.

Thousands of Indian army troops pulled out from around the mosque Wednesday and left security duties to border guards after Muslim militants holed up inside the shrine surrendered Tuesday.

Meanwhile, 33 Muslim pilgrims set free Wednesday after interrogation returned to the police barracks where the 32

suspected rebels are being held, demanding they also be released.

The worshippers had been trapped inside the shrine when the army laid siege to it on the night of October 15.

A forum of Kashmiri political and militant groups, led by the All-Party Kashmir Freedom Conference, called for a boycott of prayers at the white-marble mosque until the BSF soldiers are withdrawn.

Meanwhile, the European parliament today asked Belgium to free as soon as possible Kashmir separatist leader Amanullah Khan, arrested in Brussels last month.

Khan, chairman of the Jammu and Kashmir Liberation Front (JKLF), was arrested October 18 because of a 1990 arrest warrant issued against him by Interpol at the request of Indian authorities.

The Prime Minister said the BNP government had removed the country's image of 'bottomless basket' and developed the country to the extent that it was now considering to export foodgrain. While giving a long list of her government's socio-economic development programmes, she asked the audience whether these were the 'successes' or 'failures'.

The people shouted in chorus, "These are successes" and raised their hands to demonstrate their support to the government.

The Prime Minister reiterated her call to the people for starting dairy and poultry farming, fish cultivation, small and cottage industries in a massive scale.

She asked the rural people particularly the women to avail themselves of loan facilities for setting up self-employment generating projects.

The Prime Minister said Rajshahi-Tanore road had been constructed as per the pre-election pledges.

Responding to some local demands, Begum Zia said, Tanore-Chubaria road would be constructed, a bridge would be built for the Shantal tribesmen at Tanore.

She also said rural electrification programme would be started in Tanore and educational institutions of the thana would be provided financial assistance.

The Prime Minister distributed poultry birds among the distressed men and women after the meeting.

Silk industrial estate in Rajshahi soon

RAJSHAH, Nov 18: Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia today announced that a silk industrial estate would be set up in Rajshahi soon at an approximate cost of Taka eight crore twenty lakh to revive the lost glory of Rajshahi silk and earn foreign exchange, reports BSS.

She made this announcement while inaugurating the national conference on sericulture development here at the district council auditorium.

The Prime Minister, however, said the setting up of a silk industrial estate would not suffice unless cultivation of mulberry in a massive scale is undertaken to attain the target of meeting domestic demand and earning foreign exchange.

Begum Zia said her government was contemplating formulating a realistic policy to fairly solve the existing problems of the silk industry.

The proper steps, she said, would help enhance efficiency of the manpower, involved in the silk sector and improve the quality of the silk products, which are necessary to compete in the international market.

Organised by the Textile Ministry, the national conference on the development of sericulture in Bangladesh was attended by the mulberry cultivators and exporters.

Energy and Mineral Resources Minister Dr Khandaker Mosharrar Hossain, State Minister for Land Kabir Hossain, State Minister for Textile Abdul Mannan, State Minister for Establishment Barrister Aminul Huq, Mayor of

Rajshahi Mizanur Rahman Minu, Syed Manzur Rahman Hossain MP, Textile Secretary AH Mofazzal Karim, and Chairman of the Bangladesh Sericulture Board MG Rabbani spoke on the occasion. Vice Chancellor of the Bangladesh Islamic University Prof MA Hamid presented the key-note paper at the inaugural ceremony.

Begum Zia said increased allocation would be made in the Fourth Five Year Plan for the development of silk industry.

The development of silk industry, most of whose workforce are women, could help women and the unemployed rural youths in getting employment, she said.

Describing Rajshahi as the city of silk the Prime Minister thanked the mulberry cultivators and exporters for attending the conference.

She hoped that the conference would be able to give new directions in restoring the lost glory of silk.

Later the Prime Minister visited an exhibition, organised on the occasion.

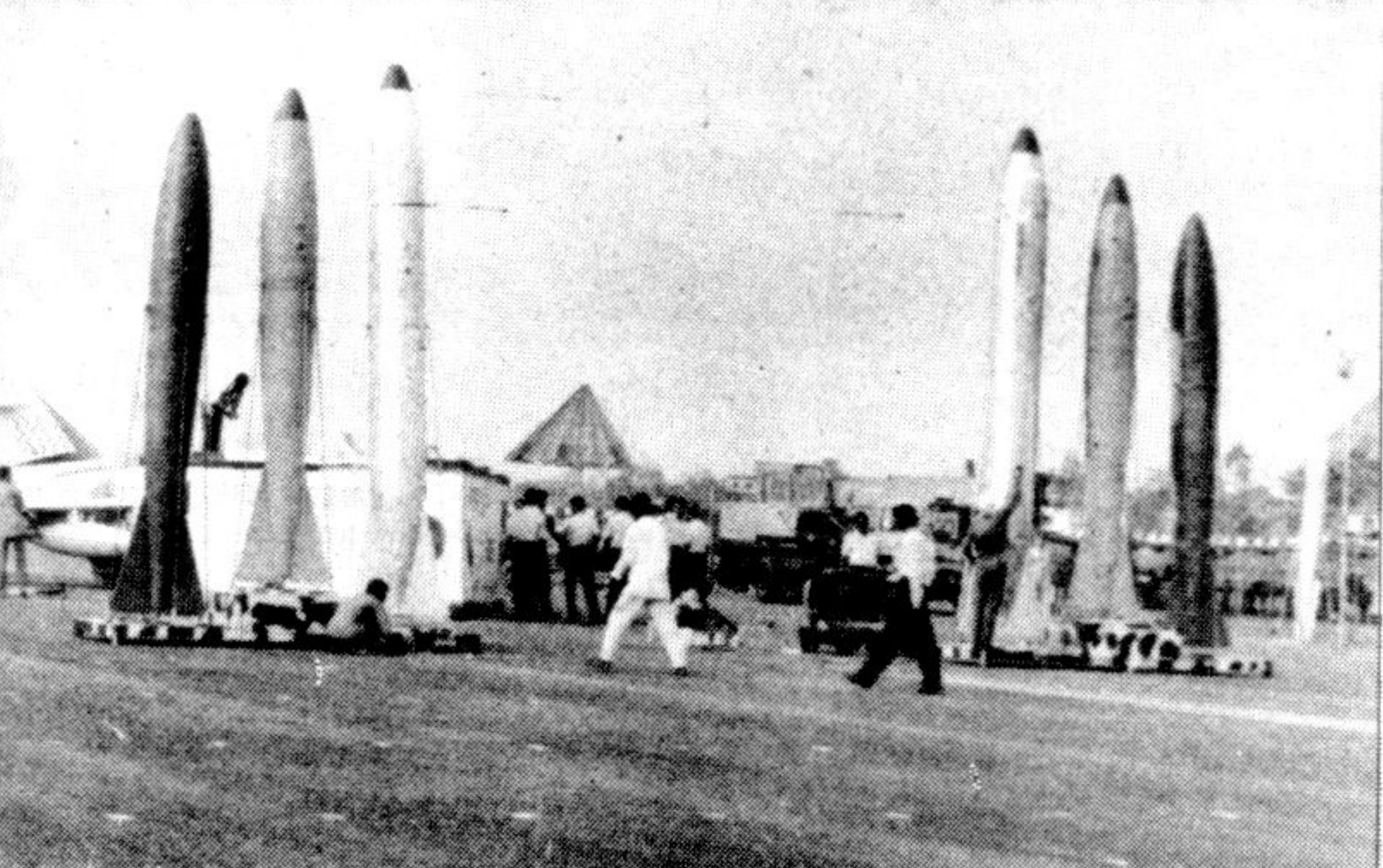

Defamation suit: Sheikh Selim, 2 others acquitted

Metropolitan Magistrate Khandkar Shwaket Hossain, in a judgement Wednesday, disposed of a defamation suit and acquitted all the defendants honourably, reports BSS.

The suit was lodged by Addl Attorney General Abdul Wadud Khandkar against Sheikh Fazlul Karim Selim, MP, Sheikh Fazlur Rahman Maruf and Faruque Kazi, Editor, Managing Editor and Senior Staff Reporter respectively of the *Banglar Bani*. The contempt proceeding was against a news item published on the September 3 issue of the daily with a caption "Kuti Takar Protarana-o-Jaliatir Avhijogey Atirikta Attorney General Abdul Wadud Khandkarer Biruddhya Adalat-a-Mamla" (case in the court against Addl Attorney General Abdul Wadud Khandkar on charges of defalcation of crore taka and forgery).

The court issued warrant of arrest against Faruque Kazi and summoned Sheikh Fazlul Karim Selim and Sheikh Fazlur Rahman Maruf. All the defendants appeared in the court and were granted bail.

The case, however, was referred to the court of Khandkar Shwaket Hossain for hearing over the framing of charges. Khandkar Hossain, hearing both the sides, set aside the proceedings and acquitted all the defendants honourably.

A panel of 32 lawyers headed by senior Advocate Khandkar Mahub Hossain appeared on behalf of the defendants.

The court also ordered to restrain on the company's advertising such lottery in the tabloids, radio and television up to November 24.

Bangladesh Ain Adhikar Trust filed a title suit No. 256 of 1993 with an injunction petition against Tabani Beverage Company for selling its soft drinks through illegal lottery.

After hearing, the court passed the ad-interim order and fixed the date for hearing on November 24.

Advocates Abdus Salam, Ayubur Rahman, Glasuddin Ahmed, Sk Rezaul Karim and Muradul Huq appeared for the Bangladesh Ain Adhikar Trust while Advocate Yakub Ali appeared for the company.

Osmany medical students observe hunger strike

A procession was brought out after the meeting that paraded up to Jatiya Press Club chanting slogans against Nasreen.

Bosnia's 3 warring factions sign joint declaration

GENEVA, Nov 18: The leaders of Bosnia's three warring factions today signed a joint declaration to guarantee UN aid convoys unhindered passage across Bosnia this winter. After a day of talks with the leaders of Bosnia's Muslims, Serbs and Croats, UN High Commissioner for Refugees Sadako Ogata said the three factions had agreed on six points "that we consider absolutely necessary to carry on humanitarian assistance this winter," reports Reuter.

Ukraine ratifies START treaty

KIEV, Nov 18: Ukraine's Parliament overwhelmingly ratified the START-I disarmament treaty today but with stiff conditions on giving up ex-Soviet nuclear weapons on its territory. Deputies leaving a closed session of parliament said a draft resolution ratifying the treaty but proposing "gradual" disarmament was approved by 254 votes to nine. About 30 deputies abstained, reports Reuter.

25 killed in Salvadoran prison riot

SAN SALVADOR, Nov 18: At least 25 prisoners were killed and 30 injured today in rioting at a prison in eastern El Salvador, officials said. "There are 25 dead and about 30 wounded," the Director of the San Francisco Gotera Prison, about 100 miles (170 km) east of the capital of San Salvador, told Reuters by telephone.

3 killed, 5 hurt in city, N'ganj

At least three persons died and five others were injured in separate incidents in the city yesterday.

Of the dead, two minor children died in road mishaps while a middle-aged man died in mysterious circumstances.

Early yesterday morning one Tutul, 9, was crushed under the wheels of a speeding bus at Tejgaon near the WAPDA building.

Salma, a ten-year-old girl, was knocked down by a speeding private car at Sobhanbagh, opposite the Dental College dormitory at around 5:45 pm yesterday.

Meanwhile, at least five persons were injured when a bus rammed into a parked microbus and an auto-rickshaw. The injured were taken to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

In another incident a retired army sepoy Nurul Islam died an unnatural death at the Tejgaon Boarding House. The 50-year-old victim, who hailed from Jamalpur, had come to Dhaka on a business trip. He was heard groaning in his bed by the inmates of the boarding house. Tejgaon police recovered the body and sent it to the DMCH morgue for autopsy.

In Narayanganj, one Abdul Khaleq, 25, a pro-Awami League Juba League activists and a businessman, received bullet injuries when he went to the Narayanganj Court to attend the hearing of a case involving his cousin.

Khaleq was called aside, according to witnesses, and was assaulted, reportedly by his opponents. The attackers shot at Khaleq from close range, hitting him in the arm.

UNB adds: The Chakma king Devasish Roy Thursday urged the government to conduct an impartial inquiry into the violence at Naniarchar Bazar in Rangamati that left several people dead.

Roy also called for finding out the cause of the incident and taking necessary steps to punish those guilty to prevent recurrence of such events.

The Chakma tribe chief, in a press release, appealed to all to show restraint and help defuse tension.

Meanwhile, the Chittagong Hill Tracts Coordination and Peace Council, in a statement, sought a judicial inquiry and punishment of those responsible for the trouble.

The council itself has formed a probe body headed by its district convener Borhan Uddin Ahmed for an unofficial investigation.

"Unless we had a stronger government with full-hearted conviction to boost the country's economy, we would be lost," Khan said and added that the way the country was being "infested" by harts and lawlessness, the future might be very bleak.

Observers in Dhaka feel that the NAFTA was a US move to send signals to the European Community (EC) and Japan that even if the General Agreement on Tariff and Trade (GATT) fails to come through, NAFTA would be the main economic leverage to counter those other two economic forces.

Prof Bhuiyan said, "Beginning with Canada, Mexico and the USA, the NAFTA would certainly want, at a later stage, to bring other central American and Caribbean countries under its fold."

Similarly, Japan and Korea may take the initiative to form another bloc with the Asian economic powers, experts observed.

"Where does Bangladesh and the other South Asian countries stand in this case?" asked Prof Bhuiyan.

"We will be mere by-standers to the world game of the economic giants," Prof Abu Ahmed of the Economics Department of the Dhaka University said.

"At least, for a short time, our position will go down."

The SAARC's contribution to world trade as well as its internal trade volume reflects a ray of hope for forming an economic bloc of the regional countries, analysis felt.

that the parliamentary standing committee on the ministry, comprising members from both the benches, was there to scrutinise the overall activities of the ministry.

Replying to a question, two members of the committee belonging to the Treasury and the Opposition benches, said that so far they saw no possibility for the 'primary report' to be a unanimous one.

Following session of Parliament after its promulgation," said the source, adding that the proposed act is also a legal necessity for implementing the new wage structure.

When contacted yesterday, Labour Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan said that the implementation process of the new pay scales for the workers of the nationalised sector has been started.

"The new scale will be implemented in all the state-owned industries," he added.

The new pay scale, that incorporates 16 grades with a monthly minimum wage of Taka 950, has been given retrospective effect from July 1, 1991. Other allowances and fringe benefits such as medical allowances, conveyance, house rent, contributory provident fund, leave encashment, festival bonus, gratuity, night shift allowance are being granted from June 1, 1992.

About 1,50,000 workers of the industrial units under six public sector corporations will get the benefit under the new wage structure.
