

Nat'l booters' success in Malaysia

Bangladesh national football team, now visiting Malaysia, defeated Negeri Sembilan State team by 3-0 goals in their first exhibition match on Thursday, reports UNB.

Bangladesh led the first half 1-0 over the star-studded Negeri Sembilan team containing two Malaysian national booters and two Czech players, according to a message received by Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) yesterday.

Satyajit Das Rupu put Bangladesh ahead in the 20th minute with a goal from a corner kick taken by Rumi. Jewel doubled the margin in the 43rd minute from header, from a Rupu corner kick.

The brilliant national striker, Rumi Rizvi Karim completed the tally in the 38th minute of the last half (3-0).

The visiting Bangladesh will take on the Malacca State team on November 22 (Monday), play the Negeri Sembilan league champion Cempaka Laxmi Textiles on November 24 (Wednesday) and either face the Selangor State team or the Malaysian national junior team on November 26 (Friday).

The national booters are expected to return home on November 29.

Boelsen, Cohen ITF men's doubles champions

RAJSHAHI, Nov 20: Boelsen Matthias of Germany and Cohen of USA became champions in men's doubles of the third-leg Gold Leaf ITF Thailand-Bangladesh Satellite Circuit tennis tournament played at Rajshahi Tennis Complex today, reports BSS.

Boelsen and Cohen defeated Luciano of Brazil and Furusho of Japan in a keenly contested match lasting over two and a half hours 3-6, 7-6, (7-5) and 6-4.

Meanwhile, Cowan of Britain and Belgraver of the Netherlands moved to men's singles final to be played tomorrow. In the semifinals played today, Cowan beat Boelsen Matthias of Germany in straight sets 6-3, 6-0 in other singles. Belgraven was declared the winner against Henderson of Britain as the latter retired from the match due to sickness.

Richard of Australia was eligible to play in the masters-level to be played at Dhaka as he beat Emil of Germany 6-1, 6-1 in the play-off for 24th position.

FIFA rankings

ZURICH, Nov 20: Italy moved up from third place last month to supplant Brazil at the top of the FIFA world rankings released on Friday, reports Reuters.

The Italians, who qualified for next year's World Cup finals by beating Portugal 1-0 on Wednesday, held a narrow lead over the Netherlands, who also reached the US finals this week. Brazil dropped back to fourth place behind Germany with Norway falling from second to fifth.

Denmark and England, two nations who disappointed their fans by failing to make it to the World Cup finals, remained in the top 10, Denmark in sixth place and England in eighth.

Akram stars in Abahani's win

Neil Fairbrother's debut in local league cricket paled into insignificance as reigning champions Abahani Kirra Chakra, boosted by a batting blitzkrieg from Akram Khan posted their sixth successive win in this year's Navana Premier Division cricket league.

Yesterday at the Dhaka Stadium, Akram, the burly Chittagonian hit a whirlwind unbeaten 94 off just 68 balls as Abahani amassed 240 for four wickets only from their stipulated quota of 45 overs. They then restricted the lowly Udity to 91 winning day's one of the two Navana matches by 149 runs.

Inspired by the presence of two Englishmen in their ranks Abahani skipper Gazi Ashraf Lipu, a former captain of the Bangladesh national team, won the toss and opted to bat first.

Indian GP Singh who opened Abahani's batting and bowling in the previous matches was dropped to make way for Fairbrother and Lipu himself opened with Harun-ur-Rashid Liton.

Udity bowlers had enough reasons to congratulate themselves when the fourth Abahani wicket — that of Fairbrother fell with the total on 88 in the 25th over. The mouse-eyed left hander from Lancashire could make 25 from 48 balls before spooning a catch to Nahid off Titu.

The anticlimactic acquaintance of Fairbrother with the Dhaka Stadium was compensated by a superb fifth-wicket stand between Akram and Minhazul Abedin Nannu, another former national skipper.

The two put 152 runs in 20.3 overs with Akram weighing in with 94 including three massive sixes and three fours.

Nannu played second fiddle to his fellow Chittagonian only in hefty hitting. He did the job of gleaming after Akram's brutal mowing and remained unbeaten on 51 made off 61 balls. The leading batsman of the country sent the ball to the fence thrice.

Titu and Nahid were the only two Udity bowlers to meet with success, having claimed one

wicket each.

Udity tottered to 91 for seven wickets in their turn with Lipu using as many as ten bowlers to force on outright win.

Titu, who got a wicket earlier, was Udity's topscorer, grafting 30 from 92 balls. Chahal with 17 was the only other batsman to make it to the double figures.

Illingworth, the other English Test player in Abahani apart from Fairbrother had the best bowling analysis claiming

two for 13 from nine overs with his left arm spin.

Saiful, Babu, Fairbrother, Lipu and Liton got a wicket apiece.

Pak-Zimbabwe first Test Dec 1

ISLAMABAD, Nov 20: The Zimbabwean cricket team is to arrive here next week to play a three-Test series on their maiden tour of Pakistan. Board of Cricket for Control in Pakistan (BCCP) announced, reports AFP.

A BCCP statement published Friday said the tourists will fly into Lahore Tuesday from India where they are currently taking part in the five-nation hero Cup one-day competition.

Besides, three one-dayers, the team will play three-Test matches at Karachi, Rawalpindi and Lahore.

The first Test at Karachi will start December 1, the second, at Rawalpindi, from December 9 and the last will be played at Lahore from December 16.

Rutherford runs SA ragged

ADELAIDE, Nov 20: Replacement New Zealand captain Ken Rutherford took charge of the South Australian bowling here Saturday to put the Kiwi cricketers in a strong position after the second day of the four-day tour match, reports AFP.

Rutherford, taking over from injured skipper Martin Crowe, cruised to 76 in just over two hours, hitting nine boundaries from 108 deliveries as the tourists pushed South Australia out of the contest.

Rutherford will bat in Crowe's pivotal number four spot in the remaining two Tests against Australia and his highest score on tour carried New Zealand to 276 for six by the close in reply to the South Australian total of 158.

Crowe was forced to pull out of the rest of the tour earlier this week due to knee problems but the loss of the team's best batsman hardly fazed Rutherford on Saturday.

Opener Mark Greatbatch backed him with 65 while night-watchman Murphy Su'a frustrated the South Australians for three hours for 56 — the highest score of his first class career.

At the close, Chris Harris was on 15 while Tony Blain had scored a single to push the lead to 118 runs.

The South Australians hardly helped their cause with wasteful fielding, dropping five catches with Greatbatch being given three lives and Bryan Young two.

Greatbatch was able to play his way back into form with the assistance of lives on three, 17 and 65.

The left hander has had an interrupted tour of Australia, badly breaking a finger in the opening match against Western Australia, and struggled with 18 and nought in the first Test.

The South Australia attack was hampered by the absence of leg-spinner Peter McIntyre with a damaged right index finger suffered while batting on Friday night.

Sampras sails into final



FRANKFURT, Nov 20: Pete Sampras overpowered Andrei Medvedev 6-3, 6-0 Saturday to reach the final of the ATP Tour World Championship, serving out the match with his 1,000th ace of the season, reports AP.

The semifinal lasted only 51 minutes.

Sampras was in devastating form. In his eight service games, Sampras dropped only seven

He simply rolled past Medvedev, hitting winners from all over the court.

"I was in a bit of a zone," Sampras said.

Sampras is assured of finishing the year as No. 1 in the world, even if he does not win the durs 2.75 million tournament which pits the eight top-ranked players. He won the event in 1991.

The 22-year-old American has won eight titles this year, including Wimbledon and the

the 1991 tournament champion, will face Andrei Medvedev in the second semifinal.

Stich beat Jim Courier 7-5, 6-4 and will replace the American as No. 2 in the world if he wins the tournament.

Stich had a 3-0 match record in leading his group while Courier, second in this event the last two years, dropped to 0-3.

Ivanisevic started with an ace, setting the tone for the entire match. He broke for a 5-3 lead, and was serving for the set, only to allow Edberg to break back to love.

Sanchez scrambles in semis

NEW YORK, Nov 20: Arantxa Sanchez Vicario, nearly on the verge of elimination, rallied Friday night to defeat Jana Novotna and grab a spot in the semifinals of the Virginia Slims Championships, reports AP.

Getting stronger and more determined the longer they played, the second-seeded Spaniard toppled Novotna 6-7 (2-7), 7-6 (7-2), 6-4 in a match that took 2 hours, 57 minutes at Madison Square Garden.

Sanchez Vicario will play Mary Pierce in Saturday's second semifinals. The unseeded Pierce reached the semifinals in her first trip to this season-ending tournament by upsetting four-time winner Martina Navratilova on Thursday night.

The first semifinal has top-seeded Steffi Graf against No. 8 Anke Huber. In Friday's first match, Huber made it an all-German semifinal by defeating fourth-seeded Conchita Martinez 6-3, 6-3.

It was a rare victory over Novotna for Sanchez Vicario, who has lost eight of 12 career

meetings. But this one was sweeter, considering from how far back she had to come.

Although Novotna, one of the best all-court players on the women's tour, and Sanchez Vicario battled evenly through the first two sets, that parity was only on the scoreboard. Novotna appeared to be in control while Sanchez Vicario struggled.

Appearances were deceiving. There were four service breaks in the first set and two more in the second. Each time one broke serve, the other broke right back.

Big boost for Irish football

DUBLIN, Nov 20: The Football Association of Ireland (FAI) are hoping to benefit by around five million pounds by Eire's qualification for next year's World Cup finals, reports AFP.

That is the rough estimate put on Alan McLoughlin's equaliser against Northern Ireland in Belfast on Wednesday by FAI chief executive Sean Connolly.

"The goal could easily be worth five million pounds to us," he said. "Now that England and Wales are out of the World Cup, major British companies are considering diverting sponsorship funds to the Irish."

It's also feasible that Irish industry and commerce could pull something like 100 million pounds from our qualifying in America."

Terrorism: The lurking menace

NEWARK, N.J., Nov 20: The biggest security threat at international soccer matches generally comes from violent fans, but organisers believe terrorism will pose as great a danger when the World Cup comes to the United States next summer, reports AP.

An estimated 1 billion people will watch the broadcast of a July semifinal game at Giants Stadium, one of seven matches scheduled at the East Rutherford, N.J. facility just 10 miles (16 kilometres) from New York City.

"With that kind of a worldwide audience, you obviously worry about anything going wrong, but also some terrorist activity," said George R Zoffinger, chairman of the New York-New Jersey Host Committee.

Overseas, hooligans are a big fear of soccer match organisers, but England already have been eliminated from the World Cup. Other teams that would have caused security concerns — Iran, Iraq and North Korea — also are out of the tournament.

But the World Cup, which begins June 17, 1994, in the United States for the first time, will still provide a highly visible platform for mayhem or political statements.

"There is going to be a lot more security than you would see at normal games at Giants Stadium," Zoffinger said.

"We're preparing for both potential problems — hooligans as well as terrorism," said Charles Stillitano, Meadowlands' executive director for World Cup USA. "We really won't know until the teams are drawn to this area which problem is more relevant."

The draw to determine which teams play in which of the nine US sites will be held December 19 in Las Vegas. Italy is likely to be the seeded team in Group E, which would put it at Giants Stadium for two games in the first round.

Officials have dismissed anxiety in Europe that Americans are unprepared for mobs of unruly soccer fans.

"We've dealt with capacity crowds at Giants Stadium many times," Zoffinger said.

About 800 English fans were arrested and sent home from Amsterdam and Rotterdam during several turbulent days around the England-Netherlands match earlier this year. Drunken rampages, a nail bomb, and a mass escape from a detention area were among the incidents associated with the hooligans.

Many bought one-way airline tickets, knowing that departure means a free ride home.

"The point is that Ameri-

cans don't actually know what they're talking about," Peter van Zunderd, chief of the Ijsselmonde district police force, which includes Rotterdam, told a Dutch news agency during the unrest.

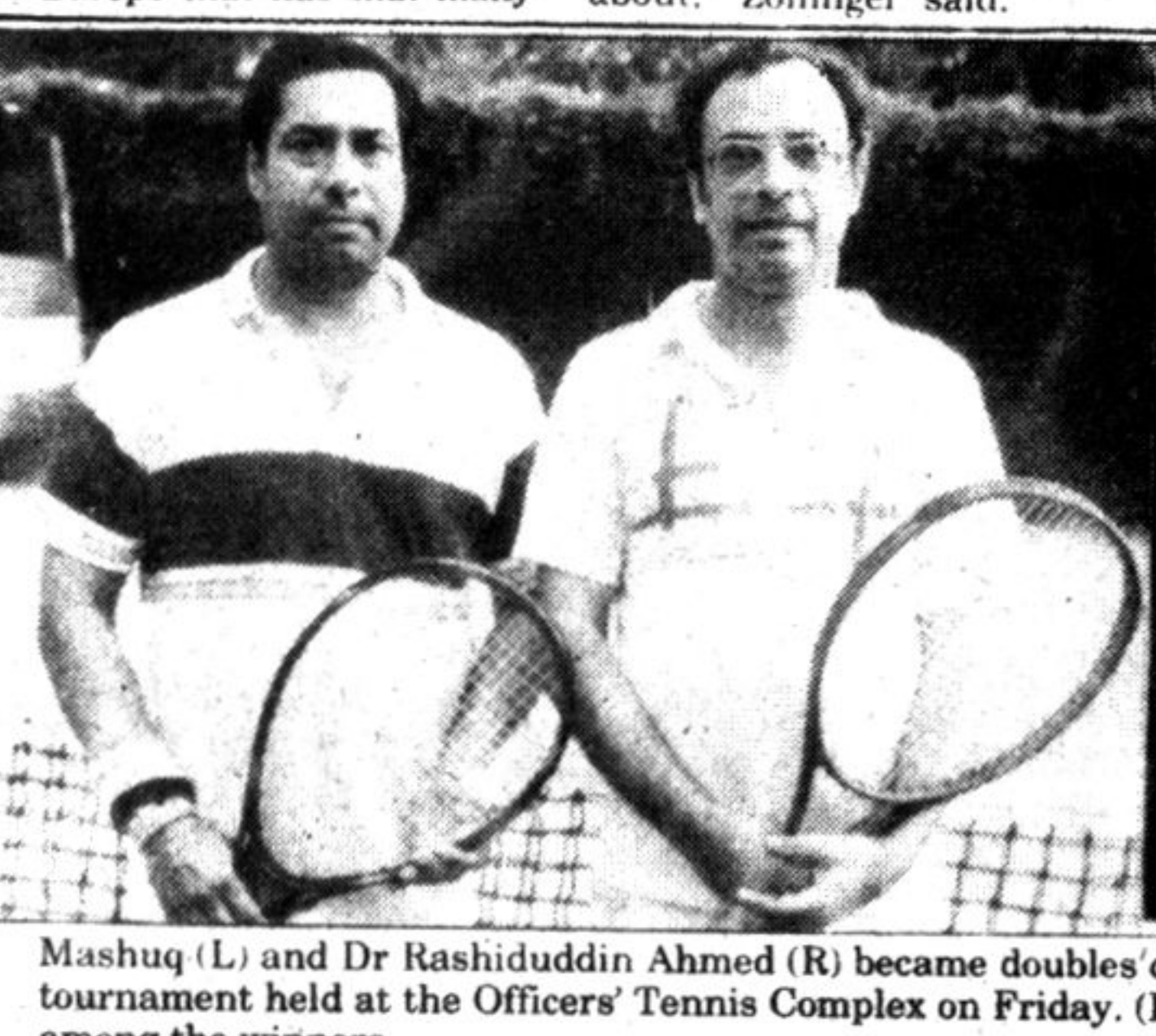
"They have absolutely no experience of these sorts of situations because sports in America is for the most part a huge family party," van Zunderd said.

Michael Rowe, general manager of the Meadowlands Sports Complex, dismissed van Zunderd's comments.

"I'm not sure he's been to some of the football games and rock concerts I have," Rowe said. "We do know what we're in for."

Rowe pointed to these security measures:

- Fans of different countries will sit in separate areas.
- Planes bringing teams and fans from different countries won't arrive at the same time.
- Multilingual agents will circulate at airports, hotels, restaurants and training camps before matches to look for potential problems. Agents will also be in the stadium parking lot on game days.
- Metal detectors may be used, and there will be additional screening of fans entering the stadium to ensure no bottles, cans or weapons are brought in.
- Cameras will survey parking lots.
- Dogs will sniff for bombs.
- No separate parking areas are planned, Rowe said, because "it is unlikely, pregame, that they will tailgate together."
- Tailgating is an American term used to describe an informal pre-game party among fans. It gets its name from the tailgate of car, which is used as table at the parties.
- The stadium's many exits should aid in crowd dispersal, he said. "There's not a stadium in Europe that has that many
