To save women from male cops

ISLAMABAD, Nov 22: Pakistan is to set up police stations staffed exclusively by women to prevent harassment of females by male police, a senior official said Monday reports AFP.

Mistreatment of female suspects at police stations has been a focal point of women's rights organizations and an issue frequently highlighted by the national press.

Pakistan's police force already has a small number of female officers, but more would have to be trained to meet the new staffing plans.

The stations would initially be established in four large cities in Punjab, the country's most populous province, said Faisal Saleh Hayat, a political adviser in Punjab.

Hayat said Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto's government would also set up special courts for women.

Hasina mentioned the Awami League government's initiative to restructure the education system in post-independent Bangladesh and said the Bangabandhu government had set up an education commission headed by renowned scientist Dr Qudrat-e-Khuda.

She also attached importance to women's education for implementation of the universal primary education.

not have any political ideology. She criticised the BNP government for giving shelter to its 'party terrorists' and questioned how a democratic and patriotic government could patronise armed goons.

Hasina also accused the government of abusing the Anti-Terrorism Act against students




