The visiting Bangladesh national football team drew 2-2 with Malaysian state team Ipoh Chempaka Laxmi Textiles in their third exhibition match in Malaysia yesterday, according to a message received in Dhaka last night.

The match was locked 1-1 in the first half. Mamun Joarder scored both the goals, one in each half, for the Bangladesh team which is visiting Malaysia as a part of its preparation for the sixth SAF Games.

The Malaysian team scored first in the 26th minute of the match while Mamun Joarder restored parity for Bangladesh in the 40th minute.

Bangladesh went down again in the 13th minute of the second half but Mamun Joarder rescued his team once again with the equaliser 11 minutes later.

Bangladesh team beat Negeri Sembilan state team and Malacca state team, both by three goals to nil in their earlier matches.

Bangladesh will play their fourth and last match on Friday against Malaysian under-23 Olympic team.

Crowe had to quit New Zealand's tour of Australia at the conclusion of the first drawn Test in Perth last week. His captaincy has gone to Ken Rutherford.

Crowe said the need to come home from the tour of Australia was especially frustrating because it was a country he enjoyed touring.

"I was really looking forward to playing the World Series Cup against South Africa."

So it seemed when one of the two unbeaten teams left in the fray beat Greater Mymensingh Cricket Club (GMCC) by four wickets in a dull day's cricket of the Navana Premier Division cricket league at the Dhaka Stadium yesterday.

Endless imbroglio

CALCUTTA, Nov 24: The telecasting imbroglio of the five-nation Hero Cup cricket tournament resurfaced on the eve of the semi final between India and South Africa as Doordarshan decided to move to the Calcutta High Court today alleging that they had not been provided prime camera positions at the Eden Gardens, the venue of the match, reports PTT.

In a late night development yesterday, Doordarshan handed out a letter to the Cricket Association of Bengal (CAB) saying that the camera positions provided to them were not acceptable as they had not been given prime positions as directed by the Calcutta High Court earlier.

The matter would come for hearing before the Division Bench of Justice Bhagwati Prasad Banerjee and Justice Sushanta Chatterjee at 1030 hours today.

A CAB spokesman said that Doordarshan was provided with all facilities they had been utilising at the Eden Gardens since the 1987 Reliance World Cup.

The Doordarshan officials have never expressed any dissatisfaction and have already installed all their cameras and positioned their outdoor broadcasting vans at the stadium. Then how this dispute came up suddenly we do not know, the spokesman added.

South Africa's Karl Liebenburg, who has experience in the use of television replays to adjudicate close decisions, will be the third umpire for Thursday's semifinal between West Indies and Sri Lanka.

Zimbabwe failed to reach the semifinals. Hi-tech umpiring made its Test debut 13 months ago in South Africa's home series against India.

The lighting up of cricket at Eden Gardens has brought, apart from the usual vast crowd, huge flocks of insects... a few billion," said Kishore Bhimani, an Indian cricket commentator.

"The bright lights have their dark side too," said The Statesman, a Calcutta-based national newspaper.

South Africa and India play the first semifinal match of the five-nation Hero Cup limited overs tournament on Wednesday night.

The second semifinal between the West Indies and Sri Lanka is on Thursday, and the final on Saturday also will be played at the 100,000-seat Eden Gardens, India's largest stadium.

South African team officials refused to comment on the insect menace, but players were seen flapping their hands while practicing under the lights on Tuesday.

Calcutta, India's largest city and home to 12 million people, often has been described as a "black hole" for its vast slums, open drains, stagnating ponds and heaps of uncollected garbage. The dirt becomes a breeding ground for insects, including malaria-carrying mosquitoes, which often strike at night.

On Wednesday, scores of workers used smoke-spraying machines and smoke bombs to spray insect repellent around the stadium.

It was at Eden Gardens that South Africa ended a 22-year isolation from international cricket caused by its apartheid policies when it played a one-day international game against India in November 1992. South Africa lost that match.
