## Taylor accepts inevitable



ONDON, Nov 24: Graham Taylor on Tuesday gave English soccer what demanded -

his managerial head - and opened the way for a revolution at Lancaster Gate, home of the national games' hierarchy, reports Reuter.

Taylor's three-and-a-halfyear reign ended at noon when he faced the Football Association (FA) and resigned, six days after World Cup elimination.

Chairman Sir Bert Millichip immediately made plans to appoint a temporary manager for the March 9 friendly against European champions Denmark at Wembley and the April 20 clash with world champions Germany in Hamburg.

Don Howe, coach to Bobby Robson when England reached the 1990 World Cup semifinals, is a leading candidate for that role.

It looks odds on that the FA's long term strategy in the wake of Taylor's farewell will be to adopt a two-tier system favoured by a number of national teams, including Germany.

Taylor's number two Lawrie McMenemy also resigned.

Realistically, the pair had little option after England's flickering hopes of making it to the United States next summer were finally extinguished in Bologna last Wednesday.

#### Ankle may nip Basten's career

ROME, Nov 24: AC Milan and Netherlands' striker Marco van Basten fears his soccer career may be prematurely ended by a persistent ankle problem, reports Reuter

Van Basten, 29, has been out of soccer since December last year when he underwent surgery on his right ankle.







# Slovakia's superb showing



LILLEHAMMER (Norway), Nov 24: Come February count on Slovakia in the Olympic hockey tournament.

Since forming its federation Jan 1 following the breakup of Czechoslovakia, the Slovakians are 2-0 in tournament play and still unbeaten, reports AP.

They won the qualifying event to the Feb 12-27 Lillehammer Olympics earlier this fall and tied with USA 5-5 Sunday to win the Telehockey Cup pre-Olympic tournament.

"Playing for their country is unique for them so I think they had a lot of pride playing against teams like the United States, Canada and Russia." said USA team coach Tim Tay-
