



Flame in snow

MORGEDAL, Norway, Now 27: Norwegian museum curator Olav Bekken rubbed two sticks together on a snow-covered mountainside to light the Olympic flame today for the 1994 Winter Games in Lillehammer, reports Reuter.

Bekken, winner of a nationwide contest in fire lighting with stone age methods, sparked the flame just after midnight after about half a dozen attempt.

"This is the start of the great enthusiasm. We're not just lighting the flame here but also lighting up the whole of Norway," said Gerhard Heiberg. president of the Lillehammer Organising Committee.

The flame will be carried 8,000 km (5,000 miles) around Norway by about 7,000 runners in a relay starting later today and ending in Lillehammer when the Games start on February

At the ceremony in Morgedal in southern Norway, Bekken took his burning branch a few metres (yards) to a fireplace in the mountain cottage where, Sondre Nordheim, known in Norway as the father of modern skiing, was born in 1825.

Flames for the 1952 Oslo Winter Games and the 1960 Squaw Velley Olympics were also ignited at Nordheim's

The flame will be mixed with one brought from Olympia in Greece on February 5.

Smollich joins dopers' club

HILDESHEIM, Germany, Nov 27: Another German swimmer has tested positive for using forbidden amounts of performance-enhancing caffeine, the German sports news agency SID says, reports AP.

It was the second such report in two days involving a German swimmer. Steffen Smollich, 22, is

suspected of using the stimulant to enhance his performance during the German sprint championships held in Gelsenkirchen earlier this month, SID said Tuesday. According to the report, a

urine A-test taken from Smollich, who came in second in the 100-metre (yard) medley relay, tested positive for caffeine. SID said. It said the results were first released on Tuesday, but it provided no other details on the results.

The agency, reported Monday that German swimmer Sylvia Gerasch, the European women's champion in the 100metre (yard) breaststroke, tested positive at a meet last week for excessive caffeine.

The 24-year-old Gerasch, winner of the 1986 world title in the event, was said by German swimming officials to have been in bed with the flu a few days before the European Sprint Championships in Gateshead, England.

SID said various cold medications containing caffeint were found in Gerasch's luggage. Caffeine also is found in coffee and tea.

Smolich was among the Germans competing in Gasteshead and won gold there as a member of the 4x50-metre (yard) breaststroke and the 4x50-metre (yard) backstroke

He was also a member of the German team that took bronze in the 4x50-metre (yard) medley, the report said. If B-tests also prove posi-

tive, both athletes could face a two-year suspension for the use of performance-enhancing drugs according to SID's re-



TOKYO. Nov 27: Barcelona Olympic men's gold medalists Brazil breezed past South Korea in strai-

The Brazilians, who came from behind to beat Cuba and the United States in Osaka, staved in top form from the outset to score a 3-0 (15-9, 15-12, 15-7) win over the Asian champions.

Maier races past Wachter

SANTA CATERINA VALFU-RVA, Italy, Nov 27: Ulrike Maier on Saturday captured her second World Cup giant slalom career victory, ending teammate Anita Wachter's winning streak, reports AP.

Maier, 26, a former world Super-G champion, clocked an unbeatable aggregate time of two minutes, 20.84 seconds in two runs down the Cevedale course in this Italian Alpine resort.

Wachter, who had dominated the two previous giant slalom races, finished second, 0.28 seconds behind.

Wachter, the defending World Cup champion, still strengthened her lead in the overall standings, piling up 280 points. Sweden's Pernilla Wiberg

trailed Maier by 0.79 seconds in third place, producing an outstanding performance in her third race in ten months. She tore her achilles' tendon in January and returned to action in October.

Italy's Deborah Compagnoni placed fourth, ahead of Swiss veteran Vreni Schneider.

Compagnoni, skiing before her parents and neighbours, finished 0.86 seconds behind the winner.

Schneider, who had placed second to Wachter in Friday's giant sialom on the same course here, had a gap of 1.28 seconds. French star Carole Merle

edged Germany's Martina Ertl for sixth place.

Maier, a double world Super-G champion in 1989 and 1991, clocked the fastest first run in 1:09.35 minutes and withstood the comeback of Wachter and Wiberg in the second run. Wachter: who trailed the

teammate by 0.54 in the first run, clocked the fastest second run in 1:11.23 but could not catch up Maier, who had a second-heat time of 1:11.49 Maier, third in Priday's race,

'Superwomen' set out for Manila BEIJING, Nov 27; China's

'superwomen' athletes will compete in the 10th Asian Track and Field Championships in Manila from November 30, Xinhua news agency confirmed on Thursday, reports Reuter.

It said world champions and world record holders Wang Junxia and Qu Yunxia would lead a 70-member Chinese delegation to the event.

The team will consist of 19 men and 29 women athletes, including six members of the so-called Ma family army, the team includes 12 Asian record holders and eight defending champions.

The 'army' is named after their trainer Ma Juren.

The agency said China has dominated the last four Asian Championships since beating Japan to finish first in the medal tally in the 1903 Games. At the World Cup marathon

in San Sebastian last month, Wang Junxia confirmed her status as the most versatileever woman distance runner by leading the Chinese team to the first four places. Wang broke the world 10,000 and 3,000 metre records at the National Games last month in Beijing.


