

NEW DELHI, Nov 28: India's ruling Congress (I) Party today suffered serious reversals in elections seen as critical for Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao, but its main rival also lost ground, reports AFP.

The Congress (I) was crushed in the politically crucial state of Uttar Pradesh, India's most populous state, and lost badly in New Delhi city to the Hindu-revivalist Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP, or Indian People's Party)

It also failed to stem the BJP's slow march to power in the northwestern desert state of Rajasthan, but swept to office in the tiny hill state of Himachal Pradesh after three years in the wilderness.

Political observers have

warned that major reverses in the state polls could further loosen Rao's shaky hold over his party. But the 108-year-old Congress (I) Party drew comfort

from the BJP's poor performance in Himachal Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh, a state of 140 million where the BJP had hoped to win with ease on the strength of its Hindu ideology.
