

## JS body recommends ban on use of polythene

A joint parliamentary standing committee yesterday recommended a ban on the use of all kinds of artificial fabrics and polythene to encourage the use of jute in the country, reports UNB.

The recommendation was made at a meeting of the parliamentary standing committee on the Ministry of Commerce and the Ministry of Jute held in Sangsad Bhaban with Commerce Minister M Shamsul Islam in the chair.

The meeting discussed the increase in jute production, ensuring fair price to jute growers, increase in volume of exports of jute and jute products, diversification of use of jute and the condition of jute mills in the country.

It felt the need for creating world opinion against the use of polythene in the interest of preserving environment and popularising jute and jute goods abroad by exploring markets in foreign countries.

Jute Minister Haman Shah

explained various measures taken by his ministry to increase jute production and provide fair prices to jute farmers. He told the meeting that 8,000 jute farmers will be imparted training and given seeds and fertilizer before the beginning of the next jute season.

Commerce Minister Shamsul Islam spelt out steps for the increase in the export of jute.

The meeting also discussed the holding of exhibitions on jute and jute goods at home and abroad. It stressed the need for coordinated efforts among the ministries of jute, agriculture, commerce and finance for boosting jute export.

Amir Khasru, Begum Farida Hasan, Adv Abul Kalam, Qamruddin Yahia Khan Majlis and Ansar Ali Siddique were present.

Besides, Adv Khairul Anam, A K M Fazlul Haq of BNP, Mosharrar Hossain and Altaf Hossain Golondaz of Awami League and Mojibur Rahman of Jatiya Party were also present.

## JP observes hartal in Khulna

KHULNA, Nov 30: A half-day hartal called by the Jatiya Party (JP) in protest of police action on its activists recently was observed here today peacefully.

Shops and educational institutions were closed and all modes of vehicles were off the road during the hartal hours. The attendance in the government offices was thin. Mills and factories in Khalishpur, Rupsha, Daulatpur and Atra industrial belt, however, functioned normally.

No untoward incident, except some explosion of crackers, were reported. However, police took precautionary measures deploying additional forces at different points of the city. Front organisations of the JP brought out processions in the city protesting the police action and arrest of their activists.

## SAARC activities for '94 finalised

The SAARC Programme Committee has finalised its recommendations on calendar of activities of the Integrated Programme of Action (IPA) of the association for 1994, reports UNB.

The recommendations will be submitted to the standing committee which begins a three-day deliberation today to adopt the agenda for the meeting of the SAARC Council of Ministers.

The two-day meeting of the Foreign Ministers of the SAARC countries will begin here on Saturday to review the progress of the forum's activities and determine its future course of action.

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia, the current chairperson of the seven-nation SAARC, will inaugurate the meeting at the International Conference Centre (ICC).

The Programme Committee, which held two sessions here yesterday, also reviewed the

progress of calendar of activities of the current year, a senior official of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs told newsmen at a briefing.

Director General (SAARC) Ashfaqur Rahman, who presided over the meeting as the current chairman of the Programme Committee, said that the meeting had drafted a budget of nearly US dollar 700,000 for next year for the association.

The IPA covers the activities of the existing 12 technical committees of the SAARC which generally deal with seminars, workshops and academic discussions on the subjects concerned.

There are technical committees on agriculture, communications, education and culture, environment, health and population, meteorology, drug trafficking and drug abuse, rural development, science and technology, tourism, transport and women development.

Opposition members argued. Winding up opposition disapproval motions on three identical ordinances extending till January 1995 the time for holding election to the hill district local government councils, the Foreign Minister said dialogue with tribal leaders continued for reaching a political solution.

The tribal leaders had suggested that the elections should be deferred till return of the Chakmas who fled to Tripura in India, he added.

Mostafiz expressed the hope that the government would be able to find a solution to the problems of the hill districts within the time extended through the ordinance.

He pointed to the efforts being made by a committee that includes some opposition MPs to devise a political solution through talks with the tribal leaders. It has been meeting with the Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity leaders to thrash the differences.

Refuting opposition criticism, the Foreign Minister said extension of time for holding election to the hill districts local government parishes through ordinances was in tune with the constitutional provision.

The House witnessed a brief but lively debate on procedural matter in taking up the bills in which opposition stalwarts, in-

cluding Deputy Leader of the Opposition Abdus Samad Azad, Sudhangshu Shekhar Haldar (AL), Salahuddin Kader Chowdhury (NDP) and Ansar Ali (Jamaat) took part. The debate was initiated by Abu Lais Mohammad Mubin Chowdhury (JP) who, quoting relevant rules, contended that the bills could not be taken up by the House without giving adequate time.

Deputy Speaker Humayun Khan Panni who was in the chair adjourned the House for five minutes. The recess over, Speaker Shaikh Razzak Ali succeeded in taking the House with him for continuing discussion on the bills.

Earlier in the evening Opposition Chief Whip Mohammad Nasim demanded a day's discussion in the House on the grievances of workers and alarming increase of road accidents as this was discussed in the advisory committee meeting.

The Deputy Speaker Humayun Khan Panni said he would convey the message to the Speaker.

Ebadur Rahman Chowdhury (JP), rising on a point of order, wanted to know about the fate of the notices on adjournment motion submitted by eight Jatiya Party MPs for creating a new division in the greater Sylhet.

The Speaker, Shaikh Razzak Ali, adjourned the House at 9:34 pm till 4:00 pm today.

## Widespread unrest in Gaza : 56 injured

KHAN YUNIS (Occupied Gaza Strip), Nov 30: Angered by Israeli army attacks on the PLO's Fatah Hawks, Palestinians blocked roads Tuesday and threw rocks at soldiers, who fired back and wounded 56 people in the worst unrest since the signing of the PLO-Israel peace accord, reports AP.

The simmering rebellion of young militants threatened to undercut PLO leader Yasser Arafat's control of the Gaza Strip and further imperiled peace negotiations that are reportedly at an impasse.

Fatah said in Tunis on Tuesday it would not order an end to violence in the Gaza Strip before five of its Hawks leaders arrested on Monday were freed.

"The Hawks will not be committed to the order to stop unrest until five of their militants, including Hawks chief Taysir Bardini, are freed.

"There will be no restraint (of violence) if Israel does not stop its measures," a spokesman for PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat's Bureau for Gaza Strip Affairs told Reuters.

"We call on the PLO leadership to immediately stop the talks with Israel," said a wall slogan in Rafah signed by the Fatah Hawks, military wing of Arafat's Fatah faction.

"The peace process will not tie our hands from going back to the armed struggle," said a leaflet signed by Shabiba, Fa-

ta's youth movement. Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, who was in Paris on Tuesday, said he regretted the army clashes with Arafat's followers. He vowed to press ahead with talks on implementing the Palestinian autonomy accord while conceding that opposition to the peace process was increasing among Palestinians and Israelis alike.

"I regret any act of violence and of terror in that sector," Rabin said.

Arafat under fire  
PLO leaders met Tuesday to discuss the stumbling autonomy talks with Israel as PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat came under attack even from longtime allies over his handling of the negotiations.

Officials in the Palestine Liberation Organization, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Arafat called the emergency meeting of the group's executive committee after the latest criticism.

The sources said Mahmoud Abbas, who signed the autonomy agreement with Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres in Washington on September 13, had expressed discontent over Arafat's handling of negotiations on implementing the accord.

If their reports are correct, Abbas would be the highest-ranking PLO official to challenge Arafat over the agreement.

JCD leader expelled from JU unit

He was also a former General Secretary of the Jahangirnagar University Central Students Union (JUCSU).

Central President and a senior Vice President of the JCD, Fazul Haque Milon and Moniruzzaman Monir respectively and the JU unit President of the organisation Masud Hassan Talukder in a meeting held on the campus yesterday took the decision to expel Mithu.

The JCD leaders in the meeting brought 17 allegations including terrorism, extortion, intervention in the university administrative affairs against Mithu.

Patgram Govt College closed  
LALMONIRHAT, Nov 30: Patgram Government Degree College was declared closed sine die following a clash between the activists of two rival student organisations on Monday which left 10 injured, reports UNB.

Campus sources said the trouble ensued when a female worker of the Chhara League tore down a cartoon poster on Sheikh Hasina and Ershad posted by the Jatiyatabadi Chhara Dal.

Both the student groups chased each other with lethal weapons. Police rushed to the college campus and brought the situation under control.

Authorities closed the college for an indefinite period and asked the students to leave their hostels immediately after the violence.

Three of the injured — Ekramul and Hafzar of the JCD and Afzal Hossain of the BCL — were admitted to the local hospital.

### European security confce opens

ROME, Nov 30: Foreign Ministers of more than 50 countries opened a European Security Conference today expected to focus on Russia's bid to take on a peacekeeping role throughout the former Soviet Union. Diplomats said the other main theme of the two-day conference would be the nuclear legacy Ukraine has inherited from the Soviet era, which the international community wants Kiev to dismantle, reports Reuter.

### Clinton defends meeting with Rushdie

WASHINGTON, Nov 30: President Clinton said Tuesday he meant no disrespect to Muslims by meeting British author Salman Rushdie at the White House, but said he thinks he "made the right decision". Clinton conceded that some of his advisers had recommended against such a meeting, but he said he wanted to underscore the importance of freedom of speech and other constitutional guarantees in this country. Clinton said his meeting with the controversial author — whose writings have been condemned in the Islamic world — demonstrated the importance he places on US constitutional freedoms of religion and speech, reports AP.

### New US aid policy won't rid Pakistan of sanctions

WASHINGTON, Nov 30: Changes in US foreign aid policy will not mean a resumption of economic and military assistance to Pakistan, the State Department said Monday, reports AFP.

"Pakistan would continue to be subject to sanctions along the lines of the Pressler Amendment under the administration's new proposal" for foreign aid criteria, department spokeswoman Christine Shelley told reporters.

The United States suspended economic and military assistance to Pakistan in 1990 under the Pressler Amendment, which specifically outlawed aid to Pakistan because of its nuclear programme.

President Bill Clinton has said he wants to overhaul the entire system of US foreign aid.

"We have covered a lot of ground by this time and we also witnessed some activities during the interregnum of the last summit and the coming meeting of the foreign ministers," he said.

Salah Shihab, who is the Deputy Foreign Minister of Maldives and acts as the Foreign Secretary, arrived in the afternoon.

"The SAARC foreign ministerial meeting will give us the opportunity to review our activities," he told newsmen adding that the progress of the SAARC had been "reasonably good".

The Foreign Secretary of Nepal, Yadav Kant Silwal, said that the SAARC council of ministers' meeting has created optimism all over the region.

Talking to BSS at Zia International Airport on his arrival here to take part in the meeting, Silwal said 'that meetings held in Dhaka produce concrete achievements' and added, 'especially the last summit produced positive achievements.'

The Leader of the Opposition promised, if AL went to power it would restructure the Local Government to make it more participatory.

Hasina demanded repeal of the Indemnity and the Anti-Terrorism Bills, withdrawal of cases under the Anti-Terrorism Act against AL activists, stopping of labour retrenchments, controlling price hike, re-opening of the closed mills and industries and lowering the prices of agricultural inputs.

A procession, brought out from the GPO after the rally, ended at the Mouchak crossing. AL will hold a rally at the Panthapath on December 6.

## Bangladesh has trade deficit with India, Pakistan and Bhutan

Bangladesh had trade deficit with India, Pakistan and Bhutan among the seven member countries of the SAARC in the last fiscal year, the Commerce Minister told Parliament yesterday, reports UNB.

Its trade gap with India was to the tune of Tk 1308.0 crore in 1992-93, said Shamsul Islam in reply to Shahjahan Chowdhury of the BNP and Sheikh Ansar Ali of the Jamaat.

To another question from Abdus Sobhan of the Jamaat, the minister said Bangladesh exported tea, raw jute, fertiliser, jute goods, betel leaf, leather, farm and industrial products to Pakistan, and imported cotton, yarn cotton fabrics, knit fabrics, salt, stone, cement, synthetic yarn and clothes and chemical products from Pakistan last year.

Islam told Hamida Khanam of the BNP that the government had no plans to totally restrict import of powdered milk. He, however, said various steps were being taken by the government to attain self-sufficiency in milk.

In reply to Begum Rashida Khatun, the Commerce Minister said Tk 215 crore was spent for importing baby foods annually. The baby foods are imported from Denmark (Dano), Australia (Red Cow, Elders, Diploma), New Zealand (Anchor, Nesle), Belgium (Cerelac), France (Celia), UK (Nespray) and Holland (Frishiana).

Clash over cricket match: 2 sustain bullet wounds

## Bosnian peace talks deadlocked

GENEVA, Nov 30: Peace talks on Bosnia Herzegovina deadlocked Tuesday over the future of Sarajevo, the Bosnian capital besieged for 19 months by Serbs. Bosnia's UN ambassador warned the negotiations could collapse, reports AP.

Muhammed Sacirbey, Bosnia's ambassador to the United Nations, charged European Community mediator Lord Owen was endangering the peace process by deviating from a new mandate outlined by EC foreign ministers Monday.

That plan promised a gradual suspension of the UN economic sanctions against Serbia if it pushed Bosnian Serbs to return more land to the Muslim-led government. Serbia's economy has been devastated by the sanctions.

Bosnian President Alija Izetbegovic met Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic and Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic as the Geneva talks reopened after a two-month break.

"We made no progress at all," a grim-faced Izetbegovic said after the meeting.

## Home Minister tells JS Steps taken to prevent piracy in Padma, Jamuna

Home Minister Abul Matin Chowdhury yesterday informed parliament that necessary steps had been taken to prevent piracy and protect the interest of fishermen, reports UNB.

Responding to a call attention notice of Begum K J Hamida of BNP, the Home Minister said administrative orders had been issued to investigate allegations of piracy and snatching of fish from fishermen in river Jamuna and Padma.

Besides, police patrol in the rivers and vigilance of naval force in the sea have been geared up to stop looting of fish from fishermen and robbing passengers in different waterways.

The Home Minister said some 30 people including 9 dacoits were arrested alongwith 2 pigeons and 9 bullets during a special operation in the riverine districts of Pabna, Sirajganj, Manikganj and Rajbari.

He, however, expressed his ignorance about the incidents of 8 dacoity in the Jamuna during July 21 to August, as claimed by Hamida Khanam in her notice. "No such case was registered with concerned police stations," he said.

## Aman procurement target fixed at 3 lakh tonnes

The government has set the target of aman paddy procurement during the current season at three lakh metric tons equivalent to two lakh metric tons of rice, reports UNB.

Food Minister Mir Sawkat Ali told Parliament yesterday in reply to a question from vice-principal Mohd Abdus Shahid of the Awami League, that the procurement price per quintal paddy has been fixed at Taka 535.84.

To another question from Mirza Azam of the Awami League, State Minister for Relief Harun-ur-Rashid said the government has allocated 83,595 metric tons of wheat from its own sources for food for works programme during the current financial year.

Besides, some 20,000 metric tons of wheat were given as special allocation for 33 districts affected by flood this year.

## 101-member Muslim Oikya Front convening body

Bangladesh Muslim Oikya Front (BMOF) yesterday announced a 101-member national convening committee with Syed Nazibul Bashar Matzbandhari MP as its convenor, reports UNB.

The committee was declared at a press conference organised by the BMOF at the Jatiya Press Club. It also named five joint convenors and a 21-member advisory council.

The joint convenors are: Prof Shajada Mohammad Pearsa Al Kaderi, Shajada Syed Golam Mushabbir Hossaini Chisti, Purjada Shahnuza Bellal Sureshwari, Mohammad Yusuf MP and Rafiqul Anwar Principal Hafez Moulana Abul Jalil was name member secretary of the committee.

A written statement, read out by member secretary Moulana Abdul Jalil, outlined a 13-point charter of demands, including ban on the politics of fanaticism and resolving of the Farakka issue immediately.
