It felt the need for creating world opinion against the use of polythene in the interest of preserving environment and popularising jute and jute goods abroad by exploring markets in foreign countries.

Islam told Hamida Khanam of the BNP that the government had no plans to totally restrict import of powdered milk. He. however, said various steps were being taken by the government to attain self-sufficiency in milk.

WASHINGTON, Nov 30: Changes in US foreign aid policy will not mean a resumption of economic and military assistance to Pakistan, the State Department said Monday, re-

ports AFP. "Pakistan would continue to be subject to sanctions along the lines of the Pressler Amendment under the administration's new proposal" for foreign aid criteria, department spokeswoman Christine Shelley told reporters.

The United States suspended economic and military assistance to Pakistan in 1990 under the Pressler Amendment, which specifically outlawed aid to
