Ord on workers' service conditions

JS debates legality of retrospective effect

The Speaker of the Jatiya Sangsad (JS) yesterday deferred until Sunday a discussion on some Opposition motions seeking disapproval of an ordinance relating to the service conditions of the workers following a legal dispute which surfaced in the House between the Treasury and the Opposition benches.

The President promulgated the ordinance on October 19 last seeking retrospective effect of the proposed law from July

The Opposition members, while arguing in favour of the disapproval, said that the giving retrospective effect to an ordi tique was morative on the country's Constitution: The relevant Article of the Constitution only permits the President to promulgate an ordinance with the effect from the time of its promulgation, the Opposition

law-makers argued. On the other hand, the treasury Bench members maintained that there was no such legal bar in giving retrospective effect to an ordinance. In a bid ' to substantiate their position they told the House that an ordinance was as good as a law

and retrospective effect could be given to an ordinance because there was no legal bar in giving

However, Speaker Shaikh Razzak Ali deferred the discussion till Sunday arguing that the concerned parties including himself needed to be sanguine over the exact legal situation on the issue. 'I shall also give a ruling on the debate on Sunday, he added.

The whole debate started in the House when AKM Jahangir of the Awami League (AL) sought a ruling from Deputy Speaker Humayun Khan Panni, who was presiding over the House at that time.

AL MP Shudhangshu Shekhar Halder pointed out the issue in the beginning but the chair avoided the debate.

However, in the face of repeated demands for a ruling on the legal point. Humayun Khan Panni adjourned the House for five minutes apparently to pave the way for Speaker Shaikh Razzak Ali to come at 8:13 pm.

Dhaka must produce new, cheaper items

Bangladesh will have to produce new items in more competitive price for export if the country really wants to get benefits out of the South Asian Preferential Trade Agreement (SAPTA)

According to concerned officials, India, the 11th largest exporting country in the world. produces almost all the items which Bangladesh and the other least developed nations of the region can offer for tariff and other concessions under the agreement.

The Indian commodities are also cheaper than those of the other SAARC members because of a large market inside and or religious to transport the second bearing to the second difficult for the least developed nations like Bangladesh to compete with those products even after withdrawal of tariffs and removal of non-tariff barriers, the officials observed.

Moreover, there will remain a very few items which would not coincide with the offers being made by the other membercountries; the officials said. adding that in that case, Bangladesh would have a fewer items to be considered as eligible for getting tariff and other

concessions. The cost of production of Bangladeshi products (both industrial and agricultural) is higher than that of the other SAARC countries because of various reasons including low productivity, low technology and anomalies in the policies and the tariff structure.

If these factors cannot be removed, Bangladesh would be in a disadvantageous position to avail of a large market of the densely populated SAARC region even after offering the concessions, the officials pointed

According to sources, the list of Bangladeshi commodities offered to India for concessions includes as many as 70 tems while the list for the Maldives includes 55 items. The number of items offered by Bangladesh to the other member countries for concessions ranged in between the two numbers.

An official of the Ministry of Commerce, while talking to The Daily Star said, "We may not be benefited by the agreement at this stage. But we don't have anything to lose for SAPTA."

Credit schemes for small investors, voluntarily rtd employees

The Government has infuated, with immediate effect, a Tk 50 crore credit guarantee scheme for small investors and a Tk 62.5 crore credit support scheme for public sector employees opting for voluntary retirement to start small scale self-help projects.

This was disclosed by Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday at a press briefing held at the conference room of the Ministry.

Both the schemes, the Minister noted, are designed to encourage commercial banks to offer loans to small investors and to create opportunities for public sector employees opting for voluntary retirement to undertake productive investments of their compensation funds in efficient, labour intensive cot-

Rahman also talked about the overall investment situation prevailing in the country and about the constraints to investment. The Tk 50 crore credit guar-

antee scheme for small investors would be administered by Bangladesh Bank and all scheduled banks would participate in the scheme.

The scheme is designed to remove the handicaps faced by small investors as banks are reluctant to provide credit to them because of the lack of collateral security, the Finance Minister said.

"Under the scheme, small investors will be able to get access to the bank loan if their projects are found viable in all

respects but they are unable to provide necessary collateral as security against the bank loan."

This would create an environment in which the full potential and dynamics of the small investors can be exploited, the Minister said adding that this would allow then to play their due role in the growth of the economy.

The total amount of guarantee would be limited to double the amount of equity investment by the entrepreneurs subject to a maximum of Tk 25 lakh and for a maximum period of seven years. The banks would also provide non-guaranteed loans for the project under the scheme, which would be at least equal to the amount invested by the sponsor.



Polls puncture BJP's 'invincible aura'

NEW DELHI, Dec 1: India's main Hindu party was reeling today after a disastrous showfng in critical state elections which punctured the aura of invincibility it had acquired in recent years, reports AFP.

Leaders of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP, Indian people's party) were groping for answers after losing control of the Madhya Pradesh, India's largest state to Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao's Congress (I)

The loss capped an election debacle for the BJP, which also ceded the tiny state of Himachal Pradesh to the Congress and suffered a shock defeat in the Uttar Pradesh, India's most populous and politically-crucial

A narrow win in the desert state of Rajasthan and a sweep of the vote for a local legislature in New Delhi were small consolation for the losses elsewhere.
