

GENEVA, Dec 7: Stephane Oberer, coach of Switzerland's Olympic tennis champion Marc Rosset, has been appointed non-playing captain and coach of the Davis Cup team, reports Reuter.

Swiss Tennis Association (STV) spokesman Daniel Mollin said on Tuesday that Oberer, 32, would take over from interim captain Dimitri Sturdza and combine the job of coach previously held by controversial Frenchman Georges Deniau.

Sturdza, 54, a naturalised Swiss and former Davis Cup stalwart, was picked by the players to replace Roland Stadler in November last year.


