Ganges water treaty takes effect today

 Ganges water will flow down the Farakka Barrage to Bangladesh from today as per the 30-year water sharing treaty with India.
 The Ganges water sharing treaty was signed by the prime ministers of Bangladesh and India in New Delhi on December 19.
 Engineers of the two countries, under the auspices of the Joint Committee, will supervise the release and record the flow of the Ganges waters at four points from today. The points are the lower part of the Farakka Barrage, the Navigation Lock, the Feeder Canal on the Indian side and the Harding Bridge on the Bangladesh side.
 The Joint Committee has been constituted as per provision of the accord and it will be responsible for implementing the arrangements contained in the treaty.
 The Joint Committee in its first meeting in Dhaka on December 24 completed all necessary modalities and charted the terms of reference for the monitoring the release and flow of the Ganges water.
 A team of four Bangladeshis

engineers led by Azizul Huq reached Farakka yesterday to observe and record the discharge of the Ganges water at the lower point of Farakka Barrage, the Navigation Lock and the Feeder canal. Indian engineers are also learnt to be in place for the joint monitoring.
 An official of the Water Resources Ministry said yesterday that the Bangladesh engineers would record the discharge at those points and send the data weekly through the Deputy High Commissioner's Office in Calcutta.
 The Bangladesh monitors will be provided with transport and accommodation facilities by the Indian government while all other costs will be borne by the Bangladesh government.
 The Indian monitors who are due to be posted at Harding Bridge point are yet to come but sources said they are expected shortly.
 Meanwhile, the level of water recorded at Harding Bridge on December 29 was learnt to be 76.277 cusec. Water experts said the present water level "is satisfactory."

'Govt has broken backbone of farmers'

BNP Secretary General Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan yesterday warned the government that his party would soon build resistance instead of protesting the 'conspiracy' to run Parliament without Opposition, reports UNB.
 "The government has hatched a conspiracy so that the Opposition cannot return to Parliament. They did not hold any formal or informal discussion with us to resolve the crisis through meeting our demands," he said.
 The BNP leader was addressing a meeting organised on the occasion of 16th founding anniversary of the Jatiyatabadi Krishak Dal, the peasant front of BNP, at the party central office in the evening.
 Bhuiyan said the BNP wants a democratic atmosphere in the country which was being destroyed by the ruling party and See Page 16 Col 1

AL, BNP soften stance

 Both the ruling Awami League and the major opposition party in the Jatiya Sangsad, BNP, have softened their stance, signalling a solution to the stalemate in the House caused by the latter's abstention from attending the session.
 Talking to The Daily Star last night, leaders of both the sides expressed their desire to resolve the main issues that created the stalemate. The BNP has been demanding what it calls neutrality of the Speaker in running the House and impartial coverage of the proceedings by the Bangladesh Television (BTV).
 The leaders also showed eagerness to ensure that Parliament sits with members of both the benches when its first session of the new year begins on January 15 next.
 BNP walked out of the House on November 10, the fourth working day of the last session to press its 10-point demand which include 'neutral' role of the Speaker and the BTV and halting 'repression' on its workers. Later, the party came down to only three demands — neutrality of the Speaker, fair coverage by the BTV and release of detained party workers.
 Asked if his party would initiate any fresh dialogue to bring BNP back to the House, Parliamentary Affairs Adviser to the Prime Minister and AL leader Suranjit Sengupta said, "Hundred times... We're already in contact with them. The informal contacts are being established at all levels of the BNP."
 About the outcome of the contacts, Suranjit said, "We're getting positive response... We hope they will return to the Parliament and won't do any politics on the issue."
 The Awami League leader, however, declined to elaborate BNP Secretary General Abdul See Page 16 Col 3

JCD attacks Ctg BCL activists: 10 injured

 CHITTAGONG, Dec 31: At least ten persons were injured in an attack by a group of armed activists on the Gasbaria college campus today, police and witnesses said.
 The victims were identified as the activists of the Bangladesh Chhatra League. Of them, Jamir Uddin, was admitted to the Chittagong Medical college hospital with serious bullet injuries.
 Others were admitted to another hospital.
 Police said, a group of a pro-BNP Chhatra Dal activists armed with lethal weapons attacked the pro-Awami League BCL supporters on the campus at 1.15 am when the Principal was holding a meeting with some student leaders.
 The meeting was held to discuss ways of ensuring academic atmosphere on campus.
 During the clash, the students were seen running for safety as gunfire and explosion of crackers rocked the campus.
 The college has been closed till January 8.

Dist AL meet at Tangail cancelled

 TANGAIL, Dec 31: A meeting of the Subject Committee of district Awami League, scheduled for January 4, was cancelled today due to 'conflict' among the leaders, according to party sources.
 The meeting of the Subject Committee was earlier fixed by the central committee of Awami League after the council session of the district unit of the party ended in a fiasco on December 7.

According to sources in the party Chhatra League is divided into two groups. One of the groups is led by Azad Siddiky and Murad Siddiky, both younger brothers of Latif Siddiky and Kader Siddiky. The other is run by Rana and Bappi and is linked with AL leader Shamsur Rahman Khan and a party MP Abdul Mannan. Rana and Bappi are also nephews of Shamsur Rahman Khan.

Shooting spree on BL College campus

KHULNA, Dec 31: Unidentified gunmen intruded into BL University College and went on a shoot-out creating panic among the students and teachers, reports UNB.
 College sources said a band of youths wearing lungi and half-pants swept into the campus through its main gate at 11.30 am, firing guns. They disappeared through another gate after firing some 20 to 25 gunshots in the air.
 During the shooting spree, the panicky students were seen running helter-skelter for safe shelter.

Feni Jubo League leader shot dead

Jahangir Alam, 24, a Jubo League leader of Lemua Union of Feni Sadar thana was shot dead by a group of unidentified assailants on Monday night, reports BSS.
 According to police, the victim was shot dead by the miscreants near Terobaria Bazar while returning home from Lemua Bazar. He died on the spot.
 A case was registered with Feni Sadar thana, but no arrest was made till last night.
 Leaders of Feni district Jubo League condemned the killing and blamed the armed cadres of local BNP for the killing.
 It is said that four Jubo League leaders in different thanas of the district have been killed by miscreants in December 1996. But police failed to arrest the alleged killers.

59 bodies recovered Bodos invited for peace talks

GUWAHATI, Dec 31: The government of the Indian state of Assam today invited tribal Bodo militants for peace talks after a passenger train was bombed here, killing scores of people, reports AFP.
 Rescuers so far recovered 59 bodies from the crowded train ripped apart by two bomb blasts. Reuters quoting authorities said today. They expected to find more victims in the twisted wreckage.
 But officials held out hope that fewer died than the 300 initially believed killed.
 Three of the train's 19 carriages — each crammed with up to 100 people leaving for the New Year holiday — were destroyed in the twin blasts after the train left Kokrajhar Station in Assam state for Delhi around 7 pm (1330 GMT) on Monday police said.
 There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the attack, which authorities blamed on Bodo tribal guerrillas who have waged a violent separatist struggle for nearly a decade.
 A police spokesman in Kokrajhar said none of the estimated 160 passengers in the two sleeper coaches which took the brunt of the explosions were believed to have survived.
 "It appeared that there were no survivors in the two coaches," he said.
 By mid-afternoon today 59 bodies had been recovered at the site of the attack in the town of Sensapani some 200km west of Guwahati, authorities said.
 Dozens of mutilated bodies, some of them children, lay on a soft rice paddy field near the tracks.
