Rao concerned at possible move to repeal Pressler Amendment

No country would be specifi-

NEW DELHI, Dec 12: Indian Prime Minster PV Narasimha cally targeted for sanctions in Rao has expressed concern at a possible US move to repeal the Pressler Amendment outlawing aid to Pakistan because of its nuclear programme, reports

Rao conveyed his concern to visiting US republican senators Larry Pressler, the author of the amendment, Thad Cochran and Hank Brown at a meeting here Saturday, officials said today.

Rao, 72, voiced Indian fears that the Clinton administration's move to change the US foreign assistance act would amount to a repealing of the Pressler Amendment and boost Pakistan's offensive capability.

Washington suspended economic and military assistance to Pakistan in 1990 under the amendment which specifically outlawed aid to Pakistan because of its nuclear programme.

President Bill Clinton has said he wants to overhaul the entire system of US foreign aid, laying down broad objectives instead of the often conflicting policy goals of the cold war era.

Fully aware of the fate of the project without Japanese participation, the government is now resolved to extending the bid period to gain some more time for itself to convince the Japanese side to become a co-

Sources said, the government, expecting Tokyo's green signal during the recent visit of a Japanese review mission, had sent message to the bidders of the JMBP components to come to Dhaka, hinting that the contracts would be awarded to them by the middle of Decem-

Accordingly, many executives of the successful bidders are now staying in the capital, still awaiting word from the Japanese government.

A Japanese team, which arrived in Dhaka last week, left the capital after holding extensive meetings with the government. The team refrained from giving any indication either for or against Tokyo's support for the bridge project. The team members informed the government that Japan needed more time to satisfy some of the doubts about the adequacy of institutional arrangements to implement the resettlement plan for nearly 10000 families likely to be effected by the pro-

With so much still hanging in the balance due to a delay in Japan's commitment of support, the government now has little option but to ask the bidders to accept extension of the

expiry dates of the various bids. Japanese involvement in the project has now become a critical issue since two other co-financers - the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank --cannot remit their portions under the co-financing plan.

Former president George Bush in October 1990 invoked the legislation to freeze more than 500 million dollars in economic and military assistance to Pakistan, a traditional US ally during the cold war era.



Rahman said, the cardinal principle pursued by Dhaka in its foreign policy was guided by the policy of friendship with all and malice towards none.

Speaking generally, Rahman said that for a nation like Bangladesh with a large population and scant resources, "Pursuing a strong and independent foreign policy was a challenging and daunting task, but we have performed remarkably well.

Dwelling on Indo-Bangladesh relations, Rahman said there were basically four areas of focus between the two countries. He said the issues with India were water sharing, demarcation of boundary, including the martime boundary. economic matters and the question of the Chakma

"Water plays a crucial role in the life of the people and the nation," he said without elaborating. He, however, expressed the hope that outstanding issues with our neighbours would be resolved

"Our diplomatic weapons include international law and logic," he added.

Rahman expressed the hope that the Rohingyas, who had fled their homes and were staying in camps Bangladesh, would see an early solution to their problems following the memorandum of understanding signed by the government of Myanmar and the UNHCR.

Indian troops kill 5 Kashmiris

JAMMU, Dec 12: Indian troops shot and killed five suspected Kashmiri Muslim guerillas Sunday in an operation to capture militants from a village, police said. The guerillas were killed during a gunbattle with soldiers who had cordoned off Keshwani, a mountainous village of Jammu-Kashmir state. The village is about 230 kilometres (143 miles) northwest of Jammu the state's winter capital, reports AP.

12 die as trains collide in Cairo

CAIRO, Dec 12: At least 12 people were killed and 85 injured when two trains collided north of Cairo early today, security sources said. They said a mistake by a railway traffic controller is believed to have caused the collision between a passenger train and a goods train at Zifta Station, 97 km (60 miles) north of Cairo, reports Reuter.

Low turnout in Russian polls

MOSCOW, Dec 12: Two years after the fall of the Soviet Union, Russians voted Sunday on a new constitution and Parliament, but many appeared to ignore President Boris Yeltsin's plea for a strong endorsement of reform, reports AP.

Turnout was so low that it threatened to make the vote on the constitution invalid and leave Yeltsin in a legal vacuum. with no rules to guide the new Parliament and no solution in his question for stronger. clearer presidential powers.

The result would not be an immediate crisis, but a continuation of Russia's political instability. The most likely course would be for the new parliament itself to revise and adopt the draft constitution, at least as a temporary charter.

Yeltsin, voting with his wife. Naina, at a polling station near their Moscow apartment, told reporters, he was optimistic.

Housewife dies unnatural death in Uttara

By Staff Correspondent The wife of a retired army official reportedly committed suicide following a family quarrel at her Uttara residence on

Saturday. Sabiha Khaled (37), wife of retired Major Khaled Akhter. was declared dead by doctors at the Combined Military Hospital (CMH) late Saturday where she was taken there in a critical condition.

Major Khaled filed an unnatural death case with the police Sunday morning in which he said his wife had left the house on December 4 after an altercation with him. However, Khaled did not inform the police about the disappearance of his wife for six days.

An Art College student and Khaled's neighbour, Raju reportedly left the victim in an unconscious state in front of her house at around 6-45 pm Saturday, a thana official said, quoting the written statement filed with Uttara thana by the

deceased's husband. She was immediately rushed to the CMH where the doctors pronounced her dead.

The police have started an investigation into the case and interrogated a number of people in the area. No one was arrested or taken to the police station till the writing of this report late Sunday night.
