SYDNEY, Dec 15: South African officials are hopeful ace flelder Jonty Rhodes will recoverfrom a hand injury in time to play in the first cricket Test against Australia, starting Dec

26 in Melbourne, reports AP. Rhodes broke a bone below the little finger of his left hand while fielding in the World Series limited-overs match against Australia on Tuesday.

His hand was strapped Wednesday and he was unable to practice.

Team manager Rob Muzzel said Rhodes believed he could recover in time to play in the Test, despite being told by doctors that he needs to rest for up to three weeks.

"Jonty has an outside chance of playing in the Test and we will work to try and get him fit in time," Muzzel said.

South Africa will not now seek a replacement player for either Rhodes or all-rounder Brian McMillan, who is recovering from a knee operation.

"McMillan won't be fit for the first Test but should be back after that," said an optimistic Muzzei.

Muzzel said South Africa could use off-spinner Pat Symcox in its World Series match against New Zealand in Hobart on Saturday.

LONDON, Dec 15: Pete Sampras and Steffi Graf on Wednesday were named world champions for 1993 by the International Tennis Federation, reports AP.

Sampras won Wimbledon and the US Open, was runnerup at the Australian Open and reached the quarter-finals of the Prench Open. He won eight tournament titles, had an overall match record of 85-16 and finished with the No 1 ranking on the ATP Tour computer.

Graf won 10 tournaments, including the French Open. Wimbledon, the US Open and the season-ending Virginia Slims Championships. She also recaptured the No 1 ranking from Monica Seles, who missed most of the season after being stabbed by a spectator on April

Int'l'umpires' panel now a reality

LONDON, Dec 15: An international panel of umpires which World cricket chiefs have been trying to set up since 1991 may soon become a reality, reports Reuter.

It appears they have succeeded in tying up a sponsorship deal that would mean every Test being controlled by one home country umpire and one official from overseas.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) have called a news conference at Lord's next Tuesday at which they plan to announce "An important new international-cricket sponsorship of interest to the nine Test match countries."

A pilot scheme during the past year has included England's Dickie Bird standing in Tests between West Indies

and Pakistan in the Caribbean. Anticipating the formation of an international panel, England have not yet appointed their umpires for next season's home Tests against New Zealand and South Africa.



Duran still as mean as ever



BAY ST LOUIS. Mississippi, Dec 15: Four-time world champion Roberto Duran celebrated

100th pro fight by outslugging a man half his age as the 42year-old Panamanian stopped Tony Menefee in the eighth round of a middleweight bout on Tuesday, reports Reuter.

Duran knocked Menefee down in the fifth round and again in the eighth with crushing rights to the head. After sending the 21-year-old

Menefee to the floor in the eighth, Duran gestured to the referee that he, thought his opponent had taken enough punishment and the referee agreed. waving an end to the fight at 2:34 of the round.

Duran, who has held world titles in the lightweight, welterweight, junior middleweight and middleweight divisions, raised his record to 91-9 with 63 wins coming within the distance. Menefee fell to 19-2.

Duran ruled the lightweight division for nearly a decade after beating Ken Buchanan for the world title in June 1972. He made 12 successful title defences before voluntarily surrendering the crown in 1979.

Duran reached the peak of his career in June 1980, when he outpointed unbeaten defending champion Sugar Ray Leonard for the World Boxing Council welterweight title.

But five months later, he ceached the low point when he ibruptly quit in the eighth round of the rematch against Leonard without any apparent fessional. Duran has gone 17-7. losing to champions Marvin Hagler, Thomas Hearns and Wilfredo Benitez, and Leonard again as well as to journeymen

such as Kirkland Laing.
