

GM Hyder of Bangladesh won an individual gold in shooting. The team gold of the same event - Free Rifle, 120 shots, went to Bangladesh also as the collective score of Nasiruddin Johnny and Qamrul Islam outscored their rivals challenges.

Boxer Mozammel Huq brought the third and last gold for the hosts later in the day. He won the fly-weight category beating his Pakistani counter

On the whole it was a fairly satisfactory day for the hosts whose campaign in the Sixth

### ADP implementation seriously slow

The government's investment programme for the current flnancial year is facing serious implementation problems. Official review of implementation performance of foreign aided projects in the annual development programme (ADP) has called the picture frustrating.

The budget that Finance Minister Saifur Rahman presented to Parliament last June was based on a projection of 6 per cent growth in gross domestic product during the current financial year. Minister Rahman had assured that this higher growth would be achieved through an increase in the level of public investment and proposed an ADP of Taka 9750 crore for 1993-94.

The current projection is that the actual investment level will fall far short of expectation.

According to estimates by the Economic Relations Division (ERD), utilisation of foreign aid during July-October 1993 was Taka 1032 crore. Foreign aid utilisation during the same pe-

riod last year was Taka 1284

crore. The ERD has called the

32 per cent decline in aid utili-

sation on a year to-year basis

alarming. The government's expectation was that 18 per cent of the planned ADP outlay will be in the agriculture and the irrigation sectors. Realised investment in both sectors during the first four months of the current financial year is particularly . low. # Excess liquidity cuts banks' profits

The excess liquidity situation of the country's banks has taken a new turn with a number of banks unable to meet their capital adequacy requirement ratios. Deposits in the banks have

been bulging over the years under the safe nets of the Bangladesh Bank, but the banks themselves find little scope to utilise the money, resulting in a dwarfed profit situation. This has contributed to the present situation of the banks failing to meet capital adequacy, banking sources

But the capital adequacy is viewed as a major way of strengthening the basis of the commercial banks.

According to the advices of the Bank for International Settlement situated in Switzerland,

the commercial banks are to maintain five per cent of their total liabilities as paid-up capital. This is usually done from the share of the profits made by the banks.

In Bangladesh, the nationalised commercial banks had never attached any importance to this measure because they felt secure by their government status.

However, with the infusion of capital into these NCBs through government treasury bills, the NCBs have been able to raise their paid-up capital to a high level. The total paid-up capital of the NCBs is now estimated to be around over Tk 900 crore.

However, the problem arises with the private commercial banks which started their shops with the approved level of Tk 20 See Page 12 Col 6


