10 BTMC mills will be privatised

The privatisation of ten mills belonging to the Bangladesh Textile Mills Corporation (BTMC) is being processed while sale of one such mill has already been finalised.

According to official sources, the authorities concerned have decided to sell the Bangladesh Textile Mills, located at Dhamghar, Narayanganj, to a private sector entrepreneur at a price of Tk 5.55 crore. The decision has been approved by the Council Committee recently and the mill will be handed over to the

buyer soon. Nine other mills enlisted for disinvestment are : the Noakhali Textile Mills, Madaripur Textile Mills, Kishoregani Textile Mills, Barisal Textile Mills, Kohinoor Spinning Mills, Sharmin Textile Mills, Dhaka Cotton Mills, Khulna Textile Mills and Jafain

Tenders were floated, but the offers from the intending

buyers were largely unattractive. While the authorities are planning to go for re-tender in the case of certain mills, the better offers already received

are being carefully considered, said the sources. The BTMC now owns 41 textile mills, including the ten to be privatised. The corporation had to incur losses to the tune of over 95 erore taka during fiscal 1992-93 while yarn and cloth worth about 160 crore taka are lying unsold at

the mills godowns.

The authorities attributed the losses to the increase of cotton price in the international market, imposition of import duty as well as VAT on raw materials and excise duty on finished products, wage and pay hike of the workers and employees, among other rea-

Cong-I now has absolute majority in Lok Sabha

NEW DELHI, Dec 30: Ten members of parliament from a centrist party joined ranks with Indian Prime Minister P V Narasimha Rao's Congress (I) today, giving the ruling party an absolute majority in the Lower House, reports AFP.

Janata Dal leader Ajit Singh said that in the interests of the country, he and nine other members of his party were joining the Congress, which headed a minority government until the surprise switch-over.

"The merger is without preconditions. The need of the hour is to strengthen secular forces and presently only the Congress can do the task," said Singh, son of former prime minister Charan Singh.

The announcement provided a welcome respite to the 72year-old Rao, who has been under pressure this week to sack his high-profile Finance Minister Manmohan Singh in connection with last year's massive securities scam.

The addition of the 10 Janata Dal MPs gives the Congress 266 seats in the 544. seat Lower House. It can also count on the support of 12 other MPs.

Another Janata Dal faction has 40 MPs in parliament.

The party also administers the eastern state of Bihar, and in November it formed a coalition government in Uttar Pradesh previously administered by the main opposition Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP, Indian people's party).

Ajit Singh, a former Congress ally, backed a noconfidence vote against Rao in July, but the Congress man-

Rao rejects resignation of Manmohan

NEW DELHI, Dec 30: The government said Thursday Prime Minister P V Narasimha Rao has rejected the resignation of his popular finance minister. whose offer to quit had cast a shadow on India's economic liberalisation, reports AP.

Singh told Parliament Thursday he would continue in his post. "The resignation has not been accepted," said government's chief spokesman S Narendra.

Resentment in Orissa over missile test

BALASORE, Dec 30: With the test launch of the prestigious medium range missile 'agni' for the third time from the interim test range (ITR) at Chandipur-on-sea in Orissa's Balasore district only days away, strong resentment is brewing among the people of the villages around the ITR, reports PTI.

Popular resistance had virtually stalled the national test range (NTR) project of the Ministry of Defence. A movement by the people of
