## Pulp mills to use over 1 lakh tons of jute plants this year

In a dramatic development certain to have a far-reaching impact on the country's socio-economy, the Industries Minister yesterday announced that all four public sector pulp and paper mills will be using over one lakh ton of green jute (plants) for making pulp starting this year.

Talking to The Daily Star, a visibly excited Industries Minister A M Zahiruddin Khan described the use of green jute for producing pulp as a "major breakthrough which will bring about a large-scale diversification in the uses of jute."

With a little balancing, he pointed out, the existing machinery in the mills, under the Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC),

would be used for the purpose, which was not possible earlier when the use of jute fibre was being tested.

The Minister added that the BCIC would also carry out test production of rayon-grade pulp, laboratory tests on which have already been conducted, during the current year. If successfully tested, the BCIC has the capacity to produce two lakh tons of rayon-grade pulp, which would help substitute the annual import of about four lakh tons by the textile mills.

Under a pilot project last year, at the direct initiative of the Industries Minister, the BCIC successfully produced 6.5 tons of pulp from green jute at the Sylhet Pulp and Paper Mills (SPPM), which was later

used to make high quality industrial grade brown paper at the Karnaphuli Paper Mills (KPM).

The paper is extensively used in making envelopes, cardboard boxes, cartons and other packaging materials and the local demand is presently met solely through imports.

According to BCIC officials, the corporation is planning to use as much as 2.5 lakh tons of green jute to produce pulp in the four mills starting from June next, when the jute harvesting season begins.

A cabinet presentation of the project is scheduled for the middle of this month while a task force also has been instituted headed by the Director of Production and Technical

Development of the BCIC.

Using green jute the pulp production cast at the mills would be lowered by about 30 per cent, they said, compared to the use of wood and bamboo.

"It will be a golden-letter day in the history of Bangladesh as far as the farmers are concerned and the socio-economic ripple effect will be felt throughout the nation," the elated minister predicted.

The use of jute to produce pulp could not have come at a better time. Once proclaimed as the 'Golden Fibre of Bengal,' in recent years jute is increasingly facing a grim future due to stiff competition from synthetics in world markets.

## 2 killed, 20 hurt as police fire on Nusrat's march

LARKANA, Jan 5: Riot police fired bullets and teargas Wednesday on a procession led by the mother of Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto. Two people were killed and as many as 20 injured, witnesses said, reports AP.

Ms. Bhutto's mother, Nusrat, was left unconscious briefly by the teargas, but was not seriously hurt, witnesses said.

Nusrat Bhutto was leading about 500 people, many shouting anti-government slogans, as they marched from the family estate to the grave of her husband, Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, when the police shot.

We were under siege," Nusrat Bhutto said, claiming that the police fired without provocation. "Right in front of me, a bullet hit a young man and his brains fell out."

In a telephone interview with The Associated Press, an outraged Nusrat Bhutto accused her daughter of behaving like military dictator Gen. Mohammed Zia-Ul-Haq, who ruled in the 1970s and 1980s.

These things were happening in martial law days. I don't see any difference today. How could it happen with a democratic government?" she said, her voice trembling. "I want to ask her how she could be so ruthless."

The stone walls of the Bhutto family home in Larkana were pockmarked with bullet holes from the shooting, she said. Thousands of police in riot gear cordoned off the dust-clogged road leading to her home, which is separate from the family estate.

Nusrat Bhutto said she has been trying to contact the Prime Minister to arrange for a shooting victim to be taken to Karachi, where the country's best hospitals are located.

I am trying to get the Prime Minister, my daughter, to help... But she is not available," said Nusrat Bhutto. "She was

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surged forward, grabbed a policeman and beat him.

Ms. Bhutto has been feuding with her mother and her brother, Murtaza Bhutto, and Wednesday's shooting is sure to intensify the family feud.

The Prime Minister was also in Larkana, some 300 miles (480 kilometres) north of Karachi. But neither she nor her government issued any immediate comment. She was staying at her own home, which is separate from the family estate.

Speaking about his plans, the AL candidate pledged to rid the DCC of partisan politics with a view to making the city-based local government body completely service-oriented.

The past governments used the DCC to strengthen the ruling party in the capital, Hanif remarked and expressed his desire to use the organisation exclusively for the welfare of the city dwellers.

In an interview with The Daily Star at his Nazira Bazar residence in the older part of the city, the AL city chief also expressed his views on the first ever direct balloting for the

ing party candidate would vitiate the atmosphere. "The election campaign is being influenced by the BNP administration," he alleged.

Hanif said the large scale development activities undertaken by the DCC ahead of the elections were aimed at wooing the voters. "It's an old tactic to bribe the voters by launching development projects when any election nears."

The AL nominee thinks the voters will give their verdict considering the fact that a mayor, too, too submissive to the government, cannot serve the citizens better.

In a bid to defend the ongoing election campaign on his behalf despite a prohibition by the EC, Hanif said, "I've asked my partymen not to do so. But the rivals, especially the BNP candidate, had begun their campaigns much earlier."

"How can I stop my people when others have started ahead of us?" he asked.

Welcoming the code of conduct for the candidates, he said, "I want the authorities to strictly implement the code and punish the violators."

## Scouts jamboree begins at Mouchak

MOUCHAK (Gazipur), Jan 5: Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia today inaugurated the 8-day 14th Asia Pacific and 5th Bangladesh National Scout Jamboree with a call to intensify the scout movement to serve the humanity and the nation, reports UNB.

The jamboree, with the theme 'Scouting for a better tomorrow,' is being attended by some 7,500 Scouts from home and four countries of the Asia Pacific region — Australia, India, Pakistan and Nepal.

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## Contract for Barapukuria project finalised

The contract between Petrobangla and Chinese consortium for the implementation of the Barapukuria Coal Mine Project has been finalised and both sides initialled the draft contract in Dhaka Tuesday evening.

Following scrutiny and vetting by the ministries of Energy and Mineral Resources, Law, and Finance, the contract will be signed after Cabinet approval.

"We hope to sign the contract with our Chinese counterpart sometime next month in Dhaka and then we will begin the implementation process," said an official of Petrobangla.

The two sides agreed on the terms of the contract after negotiations in Dhaka that began early November. The negotiations were based on a Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU) signed between Bangladesh and China in Beijing in December 1992.

The Chinese consortium,

consisting of three companies, will provide 124.84 million US dollars as suppliers' credit for the 227.52 million dollar turnkey project. The rest of the cost will be borne by the Bangladesh government. The project is expected to be implemented in five years.

Bangladesh will repay the loan in eight years with a five per cent interest with a grace period of three years.

The coal reserve, of about 303 million tonnes, within an area of 5.25 sq km at Barapukuria in Dinajpur district, was discovered by the country's geologists in 1985. Out of this deposit, 102 million tonnes are recoverable. It is estimated that one million tonnes of coal will be extracted from the mine every year.

According to the feasibility report, the coal at Barapukuria is deposited at the depth ranging from 129 metres to 506 metres, consisting six seams.

## KL to punish illegal workers' employers

KUALA LUMPUR, Jan 5: Malaysia, which has a large population of foreign workers, is planning to jail employers for up to five years if they hire illegal immigrants. Human Resources Minister Lim Ah Lek said today, reports Reuter.

Employers found guilty of the practice under the proposed law can also be fined up to 50,000 ringgit (19,000 US dollar). Lim was quoted as saying by the national Bernama News Agency.

He said labour-short employers should seek the help of the Labour Department to recruit foreigners. The draft law would be presented in parliament in April.

Nearly 320,000 illegal immigrants were given work permits by the government in 1992 under an amnesty programme. Police are hunting for about 200,000 others, mostly Indonesians, who did not sign up under the programmes.

## Prokrichi action 'illegal', says Diprokous

The Bangladesh Water and Power Diploma Engineers' Association (Diprokous) has called the agitation of the Prokrichi, the combine of engineers, agriculturists and doctors, as unethical aimed at capturing administrative powers.

The number of mayoral candidates for the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) election now stands at 24 following the withdrawals of nomination by two persons yesterday, the last date for pulling out of the race.

The number of commissioner candidates for the 90 city wards also came down to 648 following withdrawal of 248 candidates.

This was announced by the Returning Officer Syed Ehtesham Rasul yesterday
