'Accountability' still an undefined concept

Accountability of the civil servants and the elected representatives at all levels is in a 'diluted, diffused and fuzzy state", observes a recent report on accountability in the Bangledesh Civil Service.

"In fact, the question of accountability still remains unresolved; it is not fully clear who is accountable to whom and how the results of development activities are to be measured," the report adds.

Co-authored by Ekramul Ahsan and Syed Naquib Muslim, both senior civil servants themselves, the report was presented at the 5-day ASEAN-SAARC Conference on Administrative and Financial Accountability". which began in the capital on Sunday. It is being jointly organised by the Bangladesh

Public Administration Training Centre, and the Asian and Pacific Development Centre.

Identifying the absence of accountability as the most dominant problem faced by the government, the report elaborates on the existing mechanisms to ensure accountability. pin-points the problems and strongly advocates upgrading the present system, allowing more free-flow of information. appointing an ombudsman as per constitutional provision and setting up special courts to adjudicate administrative wrongs.

"The main challenge for the Bangladesh Civil Service today is to prove its accountability and to demonstrate its capability to run in a parliamentary democracy established in 1991," it says, referring to the

Noting that the civil service is often criticised for its colonial attitude, corruption, inefficiency. delay, waste, extravagance and arregance, the report states: "A state of maldevelopment is prevailing in the country. The organisations and reforms introduced earlier do not seem to have delivered the fruits of development to the

people." Elimination of corruption is an 'important' challenge before the civil servants, it says, and scathingly remarks 'Corruption is the chief barrier to development and unless it is checked, welfare of the common people cannot be ensured."

Eight die in Pabna Coldwave to persist for few days

The coldwave now sweeping the country is likely to continue for another 3-4 days with the mercury falling to 8 degree Celsius in the country's northern region, reports UNB.

Meteorology experts said yesterday afternoon that northeastern part of the country -Sylhet-Comilla region — might also come under the grip of the biting cold. "The moderate coldwave may

continue through the first or second week of February, and after that, warmer weather will prevail," said a weatherman.

Explaining the reason for the sharp fall in temperature, the experts said the coldwave was due to Saturday's rainfall caused by what they called "western disturbance."

Further deregulation of banking soon

'Some steps for further deregulation of the banking sector are likely to be taken soon by the government, according to sources concerned.

The measures include withdrawal of the stipulations regarding forward contracts in foreign exchange dealings, waiving the provision of government registration while opening letters of credit (L/C), and withdrawal of the passbook system in the import process.

According to sources, a circular will be issued by the Bangladesh Bank within a couple of days formally withdrawing all the regulations regarding forward contracts. Of course, a number of such regulations had become redundant immediately after the announcement of the convertibility of the Taka in current account transactions last year.

According to the previous rules, the commercial banks were not allowed to sign forward contracts in foreign exchange dealings beyond some specific fields. The periods of contract validity for specific items or commodities were also specified by the central bank.

Such regulations, which are still effective, would, however be withdrawn by the central bank through the imminent cir-

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14 killed, hundreds injured

Severe quake jolts LA

LOS ANGELES, Jan 17: Up to 25 people may have been killed and hundreds injured when a major earthquake struck Los Angeles before dawn today creating panic and chaos in the nation's second largest

city, reports Reuter. The Red Cross said it has received reports of up to 25 people killed but city officials said the confirmed death toll was 14. There were reports of whole houses being blown apart in gas explosions and cars being

hurled off freeways. The quake, measuring 6.6 on the Richter scale, buckled freeways, ruptured gas and water lines and triggered scores of fires that destroyed dozens of

A spokesman for Cedars Sinai Hospital said two people died there and mayor Richard

Riordan said a third person was killed on one of the city's many damaged freeways.

The Cedars Sinai spokesman said "the hospital was filled with scores of walking wounded."

There were isolated reports of looting, and among the dead was a motorcycle policeman.

A multi-story apartment building in the suburb of Northridge partially collapsed and fire fighters freed a number of people who had been trapped in the rubble.

"We live on the second floor. We ran out on the balcony and climbed down. It was really frightening, a teenage girl said.

A number of people were trapped in their cars when the

Emergency crews tried to reach them, but had to cross a moonscape of damaged roads. The police said the quake lit-

erally threw cars from elevated freeways onto streets below. Mayor Riordan declared a

state of emergency and President Clinton, who just returned from a European visit, was being kept posted on a minute-to-minute basis of the damage, federal emergency officials said. The President ordered that all aid that was humanely possible to be rushed

Government Pete Wilson also ordered a state of emergency, saying the quake had caused major structural damage.

GENEVA. Jan 17: The Organisation of the Islamic Conference called today for UN Secretary General Boutros Boutros-Ghali to authorise air strikes without delay against Bosnian Serb forces, reports

Foreign ministers from leading nations of the OIC met here with Boutros-Ghali to urge the UN to follow through on a pledge at the NATO summit to use air strikes if necessary to ensure the passage of aid and the safety of UN troops.
