Mob lynches muggers in city: 1 dies

An angry mob lynched three muggers in the city yesterday. One of them later died at a hospital after admission

The three, trying to avoid arrest by the police, hot on their heels, ran out of luck when their autorickshaw got caught in a traffic jam on the Satmasjid Read. Dhanmandi near the Abahani Club. This was around 11:30 in the ward. morning

In their desperation, the cornered crooks exploded several cocktails and even opened fire. They rushed towards a passing car -carrying a woman and her daughter -broke its windshield and shot the driver in a frantic bid to escape capture, but in vain. witnesses said.
