

Ghali threatens to use force against Serbs

THE HAGUE, Jan 21: UN Secretary General Boutros-Boutros Ghali said Friday he may order air strikes against Serb forces unless they allow the rotation of UN peacekeeping troops in Bosnia next within few days, reports AP.

"I have received today information that the problem (in Srebrenioa) is on the point of being resolved," said Ghali at a news conference.

"If it (the rotation) does not happen, then we will have to make the decision to use the power."

NATO said last week it was prepared to use air strikes to open an air strip in northern Bosnia to aid flights and to protect Canadian troops in the Muslim enclave of Srebrenica in Eastern Bosnia. The strike would have to be authorised by

It earlier said the quake, the largest in the region in more than 30 years, hit 7.2. while the US Geological Survey said it hit 7.3 on the same

One resident in radio contact with the worst-hit area, around the town of Kao on the northern Isthmus of the island, said seven people were killed, although the cause of death was unclear.

The country's foreign aid in the pipeline has gone down considerably over the last few months against the backdrop of the global aid scenario emerging out of the demise of the communist empire.

The pipeline reserve of foreign aid was at a little over 4.4 billion US dollars last month. It was 5:264 billion in June, 1992. During the first quarter of fiscal 1993-94, the reserve remained at the five billion level, sources indicated.

When negotiations for any foreign assistance is completed, it is regarded as being in the pipeline. The recipient country then utilises the pipeline reserve over the next few years once the projects start rolling.

The slimming down of the pipeline is of keen interest to the country's economists because the pipeline reserve tends to become bigger due to

The city corporation polls, scheduled for January 30: are now the talk of the town in the country's four major cities -Dhaka, Chittagong, Khulna and Rajshahi. More than 29 lakh voters in these four cities will choose

commissioner posts. Of the 48 mayoral candidates. 24 are in the race in Dhaka, 12 in Chittagong, five in Khulna and seven in Rajshahi.

On the other hand, 675 candidates are vying for 90 commissioner posts in the Dhaka City Corporation, 301 for 41 posts in Chittagong, 176 for 31 posts in Khulna and 257 for 30 posts in Rajshahi.

The number of voters under the Dhaka City Corporation is 17,54,475 while it is 6,85,855 in Chittagong, 3,28,765 in Khulna and 1.51,681 in Rajshahi.
