

Freedom Fighter beaten to death

MAGURA, Feb 6: A freedom fighter was beaten to death by some activists of outlawed Sharbahara Party in Sreepur thana, police said, reports UNB.

Fazlul Haque (40), Commander of Sreepur Thana Muktiyoddha Sangsad, was kidnapped by the activists from Sachilapur Bazar in broad day light on January 17. He tried to resist them from collecting tolls from the local people.

Later, they confined him in their den and perpetrated brutal torture on him. When his condition turned serious they left him unconscious at to bazar on January 30.

Local people sent him to Dariatpur health complex where the doctors referred him to Magura sadar hospital. He succumbed at the hospital on January 31.

A case was filed with the police but none was arrested so far.

Local people alleged that the outlawed activists have been collecting tolls both from the rich and poor people for a long time and Fazlul became the victim when he tried to resist them.

They urged concerned authority to look into the matter and take necessary steps to nab the miscreants without further delay.

Extension work of Moulvibazar district hospital building and reconstruction work of staff quarters are going on in full swing.

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare has sanctioned Taka one crore 37 lakh under Health Infrastructure Rehabilitation Programme for this purpose with the financial help of European Economic Council (EEC). The works are expected to be completed by September next.

It may be mentioned here that the Staff quarters of the hospital was built only 12 years ago.

154 people committed suicide last year

DINAJPUR, Feb 6: At least 154 people allegedly committed suicide in the Thakurgaon and Panchagarh districts last year, reports UNB.

According to police and hospital sources, of them, 80 were male and the rest 74 were female.

Poverty, family feud, failure in love and demand for dowry were said to be main reasons behind the suicide.

Another report adds: A baby was taken away and killed by a pye-dog at Debiganj thana in Thakurgaon district last week.

Local people said, the pye-dog took away the child of Abdul Karim of Tekrabasha in Debiganj thana when his mother went to bath leaving the child alone in her house. The body was later recovered.

Local people alleged that the pye-dogs are moving freely in the town and elsewhere in the district causing inconvenience to the dwellers.

They also alleged that after repeated appeal no step has yet been taken to eliminate the pye-dogs by the concerned authorities.

A young housewife died due to faulty treatment of a village quack in Nawabganj thana of

the district on January 31. Family sources said, the quack of Patkpara of the same thana was called when the five-month pregnant housewife Parveen Begum (27) was suffering from serious complications. The quack performed abortion on January 18 but could not stop bleeding.

Later, she was rushed to Dinajpur General Hospital where she succumbed due to massive bleeding.

Another message from Magura adds: A boy was brutally killed by his step-mother on January 31.

According to Salikha police, the step-mother, Rahima Khatoun (25) threw the five-year-old son, Tariqul Islam into a nearby pond after killing him.

Later, the villagers recovered the body from the pond and informed the local police.

Police later arrested Rahima and sent her to the court. She confessed her guilt to the magistrate saying that she took away her step son's life in collusion with her father Babar Ali. Babar is now absconding.

A case was filed with the police.

Rival groups clash leaves one dead

NARSINGDI, Feb 6: A young man was killed in a clash between two rival groups at Tulatuli village of Rajpur thana, police said Saturday, reports UNB.

According to the witnesses, some armed youths allegedly led by Mamta Uddin, a village matbar, attacked the houses of Dhan Mia and Siraj Mia following a previous enmity.

When resisted, the attackers beat Dulal Mia (22) with a bamboo stick killing him on the spot. During the attack Dhan Mia, another village matbar, was away from his house.

A case was registered with the police but none was arrested so far.

Another report says: Police arrested six alleged inter-district dacoits from Shibpur and Tongi thanas.

Acting on secret information, Shibpur police raided

Bastuhara area of Tongi thana with the help of Tongi police and arrested three dacoits on January 21.

They are identified as Mannan of Shibpur, Abdul Matin of Valuka and Nurul Islam of Gafargaon of Mymensingh district.

Police said, they were wanted in connection with many cases of murder and inter-district dacoity.

Another three dacoits were arrested from Kunderpara of Shibpur thana on January 20 while they were committing a bus dacoity.

Police said a gang of armed miscreants numbering 10 to 12 stormed the Brahmanbaria-bound bus coming from Dhaka and looted cash and valuables.

Acting on a tip, police rushed to the spot and rounded up three of them while others managed to flee.
