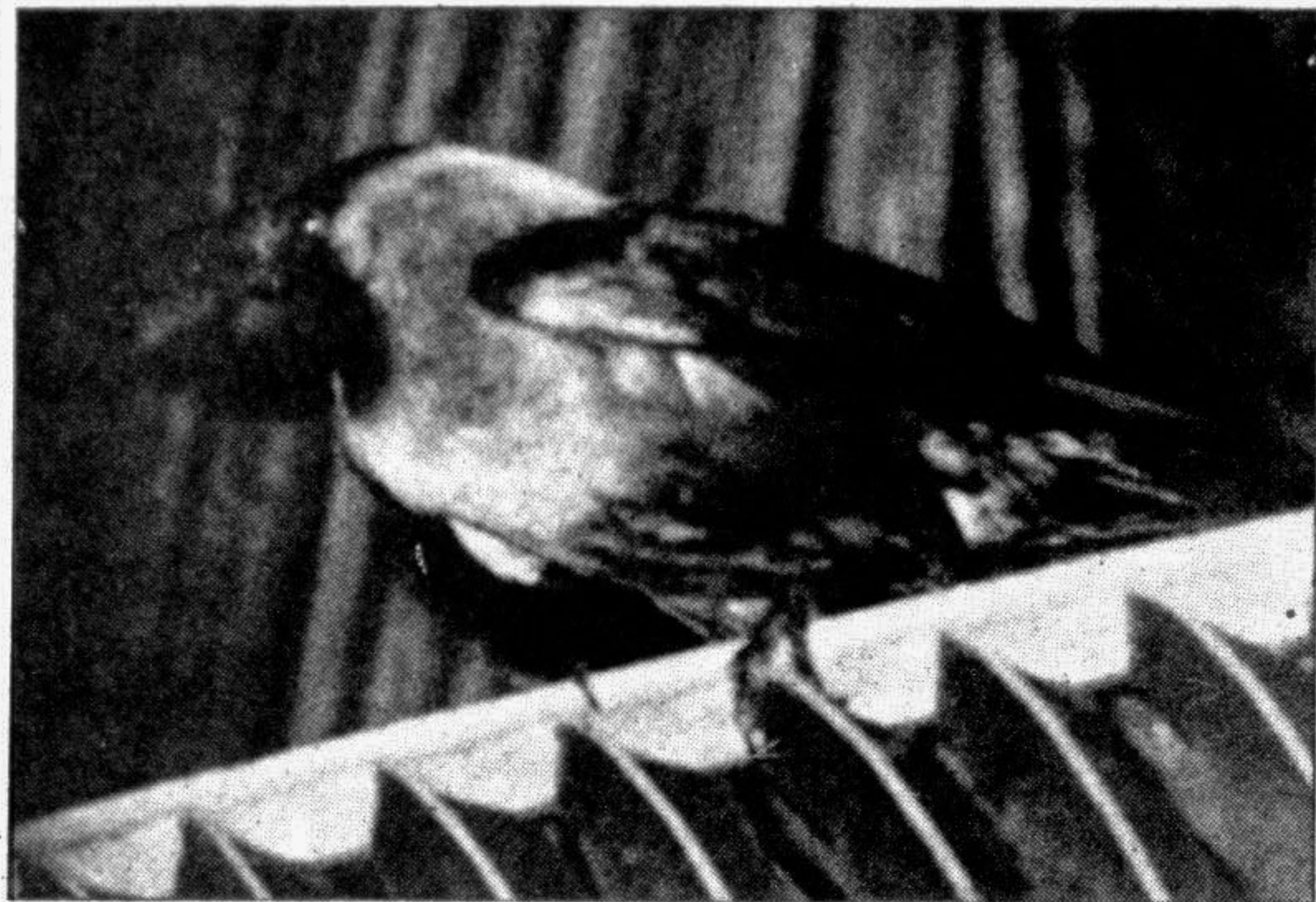


Dhaka Day by Day

Mourning Bird

Famously notorious, the crow is not a loved bird. The question of taking it as a pet is rather outlandish. However much 'Ayomya's' Mobarak may extoll the virtue of this cunning bird, none in his right senses will be tempted to follow him in taming this omnivorous bird. Although known for their guile and cunningness, the crows are awfully foolish too in two ways do they demonstrate their lack of intelligence. Adept as they are in stealing food, they give a miserable account of themselves at the time of hiding the reminder of their stolen delicacy. They would keep their eyes shut while preserving the crumb for the future, thinking if they did not look others would not also notice. Then of course, there is their legendary incapacity to detect the offspring of cuckoos who might not take the trouble of rearing their own young kind and instead lay eggs in a crow's nest replacing the ones of the nest's owner.

A crow is cleverer than its bigger cousin, the raven of jay, and those live in towns and cities seem to be gifted with some special qualities that prove handy to their advantage. Watching them to prepare their nests can be really fascinating, but rearing their young ones can be even more exciting. If it fortunately so happens that the tree on which the nest is being built can be seen from your balcony or office room, all the better for the

purpose. The crow is not particularly a good carpenter at making its nest. The haphazard way of arranging the dead branches, wires and all the small and odd bits of things it collects says a lot about the crow's nature.

However, as parents crows put to stake even their dear lives to protect their offsprings. Like parents of other animal and bird species they are equally caring in bringing up the young ones. The way they teach the kids how to fly is a good lesson for others. They too suffer immensely when one of their children hurts itself or is maimed somehow. In one such incident, both parents were found to be morose and vainly trying to help the injured one to get to its feet. For days they made every attempt to help the limping offspring. They could leave the nest long before because the other one had by this time mastered enough skill to fend for itself.

Then came the fateful day when gusty wind accompanied with heavy rain blew the nest away and along with the weakling. In the morning it was a clamorous cawing that awoke everyone of the neighbourhood of that particular residential area. The crows had assembled to mourn the death of one of their kind. The sympathy and solidarity expressed so vociferously may differ from the silence observed by human beings but in grief both their kinds are brought closer to each other. Thus we can receive a rare insight into the crow's nature or perhaps character.

Seminar on peptic ulcer held

Deputy Leader of Parliament Prof. A Q M Badruddoza Chowdhury yesterday stressed the need for more research on gastroenterological disease to ensure better treatment to the patients, reports BSS.

The Deputy Leader said this while inaugurating a seminar on management of the difficult peptic ulcer at a hotel in the capital.

Jointly organised by Bangladesh Gastroenterology Society and ACI Pharmaceuticals, the seminar was also addressed, among others, by Bangladesh Gastroenterology Society president Prof. A K Azad Khan, General Secretary Prof. Mahmud Hasan and Director of ACI Limited, M. Masaddek Hossain.

Christopher J Hawkey, Professor of Gastroenterology department, University of Nottingham, UK presented the key note paper at the seminar.

Prof Chowdhury said, it had been observed that cases of peptic ulcer patients are becoming more difficult day by day and accurate diagnosis is needed to detect the disease.

The Deputy Leader urged the physicians to diagnose the disease timely and correctly.

He said, 12 percent population of our country are suffering from the disease of peptic ulcer and the diagnosis should be easy and cheaper for providing better service to the patients.

Dr Abeyasundere said the objective of WHO was to look after women health equally within the framework of WHO. He said special care should be taken about the health and environment of working women and specially to those working in the industries.

Dr Fariduddin said girl child was discriminated in education, family care, health and nutrition.

Associate Professor of Paediatrics Dr Shameem Ahmed in her paper on Women, Health and Development in Bangladesh presented at the symposium suggested change in the prevailing value system to remove discrimination of women.

Nasreen Huq in her paper on The Impact of Gender Bias on Women's Health said in all societies around the globe, women occupy a position subordinate to men.

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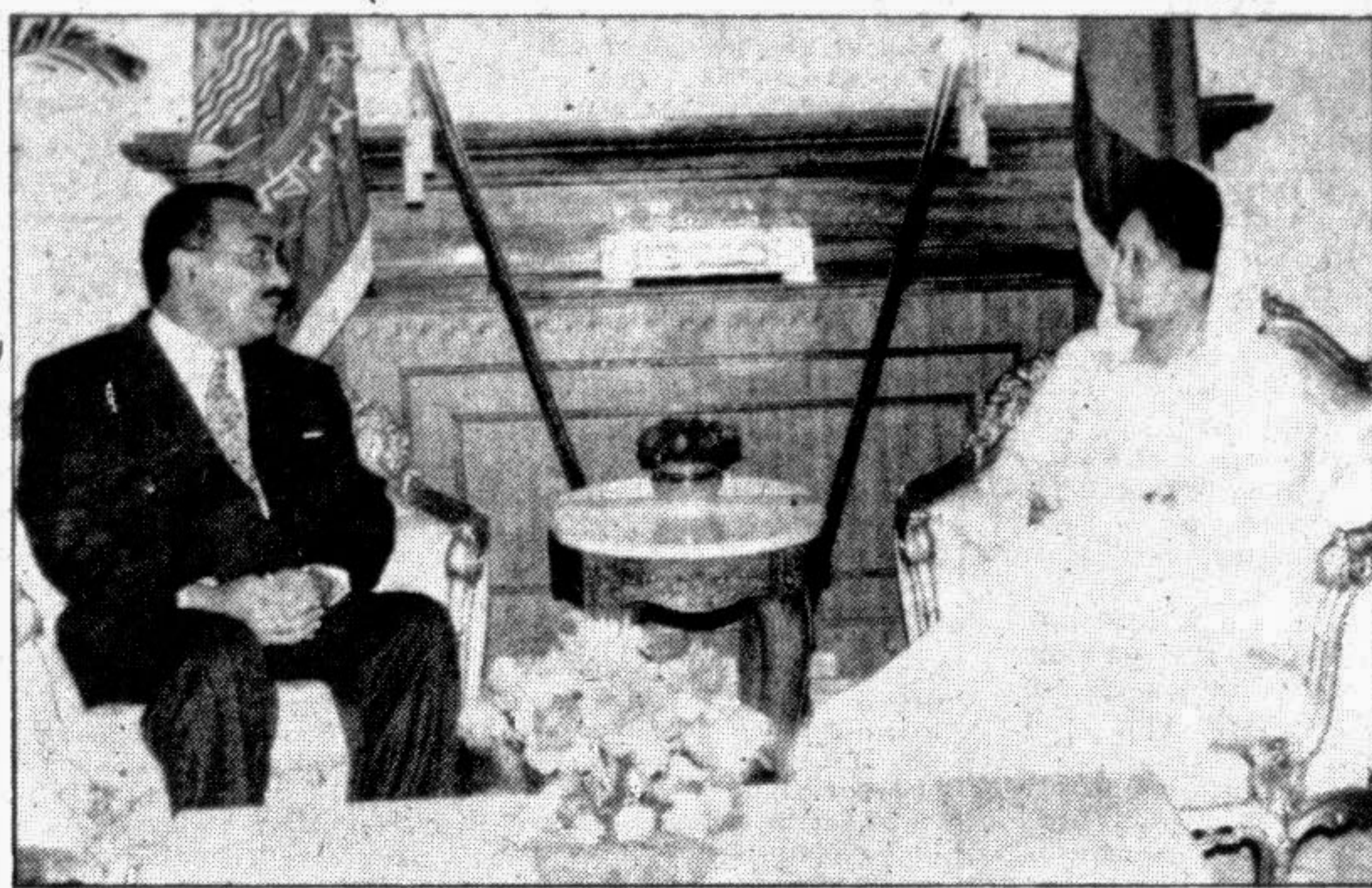

Over 12 lakh tonnes urea produced till Jan

Industries Minister A M Zahiruddin Khan yesterday asked all concerned to ensure availability of adequate quantity of fertiliser to the farmers at a reasonable price, reports UNB.

The government reduced the price of urea from last year by Tk 650 per ton and Tk 32.50 per bag and the benefit of this reduction must go to farmers, the minister said while addressing the inaugural session of a workshop on Fertiliser Marketing Management in the capital.

Ministry of Agriculture, International Fertiliser Development Centre (IFDC) and Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC) jointly organised the workshop.

Six urea fertiliser factories produced 12,26,911 mt during the first seven months of current financial year as against 11,23,033 mt during the corresponding period of 1992-93. The six factories under BCIC sold 11,28,095 mt during the seven months (July '93 to January '94) as against 8,59,230 mt during the corresponding period of last year.

The actual export of urea during the seven months is 299,167 mt as against 2,72,812 mt during the same period of 1992-93.

IFDC Chief John H Allgood and USAID Mission Director Dr Richard Brown, Secretary of Agriculture Ministry Akhter Ali and BCIC Chairman Waseq Al Azad also addressed the workshop. Senior officials of the Industries and Agriculture ministries, IFDC and USAID attended it.

Khan said food production was around 9 million tons in 1971, and since then it had increased by over 100 per cent. "The credit for this spectacular success primarily goes to the hard working farmers of the country," the minister observed.

He asked all concerned to avoid cartelisation and all kinds of destructive activities in fertiliser supply and maintain stable price to make fertiliser available to the farmers. BCIC, the bankers and others involved in distribution process should work in unison to ensure it, he added.

The visiting US Prof Lawrence Ziring presented the title paper while teachers and students of Dhaka University were among others, who participated in the discussions.

During his hour-long lecture Prof Ziring dwelt at length talked on the causes of some of the major international conflicts in the post Cold War era. He favoured peaceful solutions to the outstanding issues standing on way to restoration of normalcy in relations among nations.

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Myanmar minister for Rail meets President

A four member delegation led by U Win Sein, Minister for Rail Transportation of Myanmar, called on President Abdur Rahman Biswas at Bangabhaban yesterday, reports BSS.

Oli Ahmed, Minister for Communications was present.

Exchanging views with the Myanmar minister, President Biswas expressed satisfaction over the existing cordial and friendly relations between the two neighbouring countries. His visit, the President hoped, would further strengthen the relationship between the two countries.

President Biswas mentioned that the outstanding issues like Rohingya refugee problem should be resolved within the shortest possible time in the interest of both the countries.

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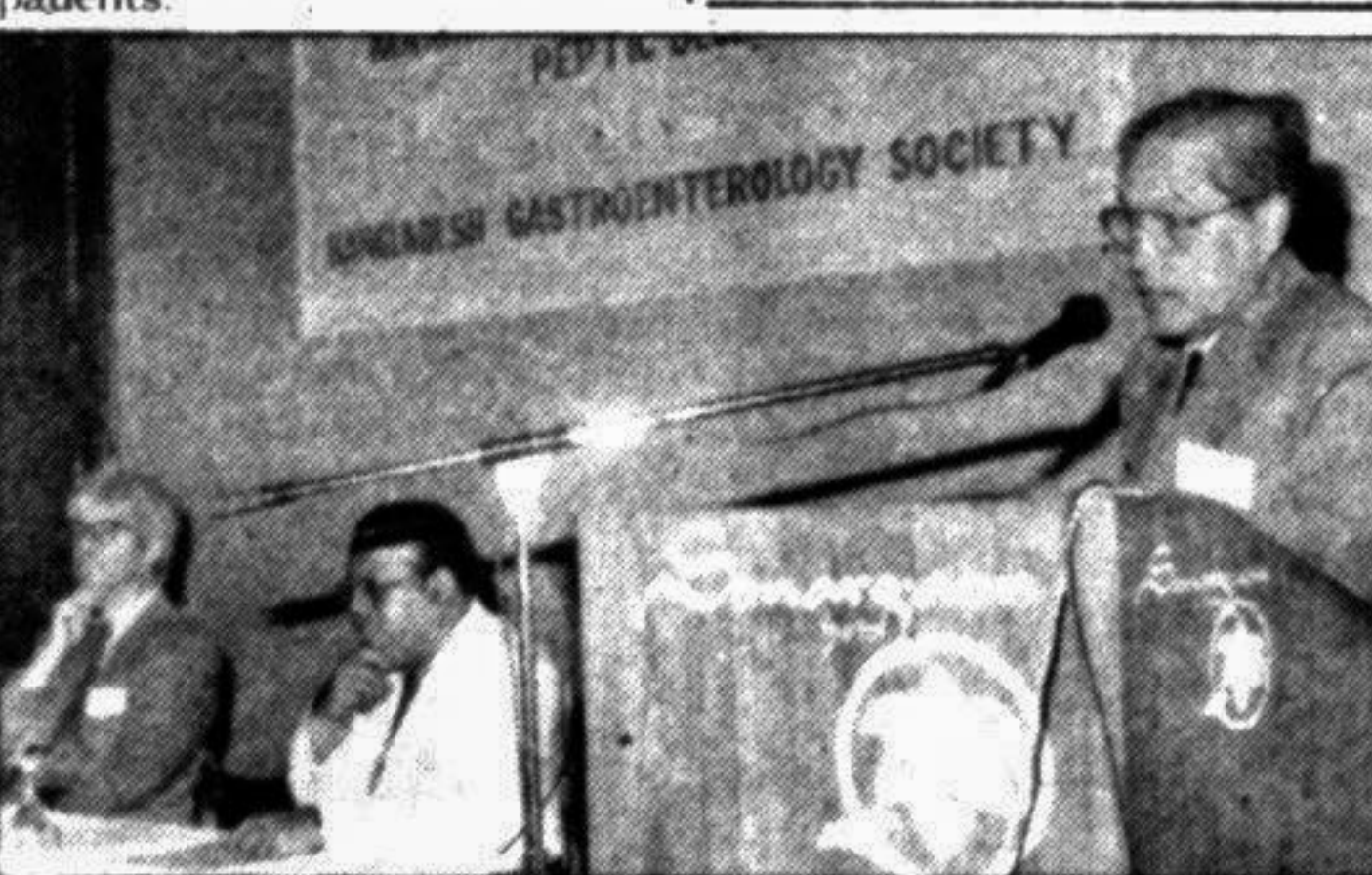
