

Martina Navratflova moved closer to the 167th title of her career on Friday when

she put down Belgian challenger Sabine Appelmans in the quarter-finals of the Paris Open, reports AFP. But the 37-year-old Czech-

born American, 16 years older than an opponent clearly oozing confidence after a series of wins, needed to pace herself carefully through three tough

Navratilova, who eventually scored a 6-4, 3-6, 6-3 victory over her fellow left-hander in the Pierre de Coubertin-Stadium, appeared to have tamed Appelmans with a series of stretch volley winners in the latter stages of the opening

But after going 3-1 clear in the second, she lost concentration and the seventh-seeded Belgian surged back to win five consecutive games.

Becker silences Stich

STUTTGART, Feb 19: Boris Becker tamed the service of German rival Michael Stich to score an important victory in his comeback campaign here on Friday, reports AFP.

Becker won 6-3, 7-6 (7-4) in the Stuttgart Open quarterfinal for his fifth victory over the man who has often been

his biggest critic. The defeat will cost Stich the number two spot in next week's world rankings as he won the title last year. Becker's triumph will uncoubtedly boost his 14th ranking after he retained the Milan title last weekend.

Becker scored his first break when leading 5-3 in the first set. Stich went 40-0, saved one set point and then hit Becker's return into the net.

The second set saw more of a battle. A Becker double fault cost him a service game but then Stich's service also let him down. In the tiebreak Becker led 5-1 at one stage before wrapping up 7-4.

The two players may have met in a new crossroads in their careers.

The two have often clashed over Becker's attitude toward playing for Germany in the Davis Cup. But Becker, with the crowd back on his side, seems to have halted the slump in his tennis with the seven-week break to coincide with the birth of his son.

After rising to second in the world with a strong finish to 1993. Stich was knocked out of the Australian Open in the first round and the second round at Milan last weekend Fatigue has jolted his concentration.

Becker will now play Goran Ivanisevic, who had to overcome another moment of anger before beating France's Henri Leconte and get into the semi-finals of the 2.25 million dollar event.

Blair blazes Daehlie, Norway's darling



LILLEHAMMER. Feb 19: America's tough cookie Tonya Harding crumbled and cried on Saturday, but it was smiles all the way for Olympic hosts Norway when they

picked up two more nuggets of Nordic gold to go top of the medals table, reports Reuter.

Norway's cross-country king, Bjorn Daehlie, rewrote the record books in the 15 km pursuit, blowing kisses to the adoring crowd and pirouetting across the line as he became the greatest Nordic skier in Olympic history.

In the premier women's event, the downhill, Katja Seizinger thundered to a commanding victory to give Germany their second Alpine title of the Lillehammer Games and make amends for her failure in the super-giant slalom.

UP to 140,000 people many of them Norwegians waving national flags and with their faces painted in the country's red, white and blue colours -swarmed into the Olympic region for the women's downhill, two-man bob and other weekend events.

But it was at the crosscountry course, beneath a piercing blue sky, that Norwegian reserve was truly abandoned as Fred Boerre Lundberg in the Nordic combined event and Daehlie added more gold to the host country's haul.

Norway took back the overall medals lead from Russia, with Italy third followed by the United States.

Raucous cheers and clanking cowbells resounded round the Birkebeineren stadium twice in just two hours as

Daehlie became Norway's just one title away from equalling the overall Winter

Games record. It was his second win and third medal at Lillehammer.

American Bonnie Blair won the 500m Olympic speedskating title at Hamar on Saturday to become the first woman to win gold medals at three successive Winter Olympics, reports The reigning world sprint

champion clocked a new track record of 39.25 sec for her fifth medal. She won 500m and 1,000m titles in Albertville, and 500m and 1000m bronze in Calgary in 1988. Canada's Susan Auch was

0.1 sec off her personal best as she took the silver with 39.61 sec. Germany's Franziska Schenk took bronze with 40.44. Blair, 29, supported by her large Irish-Catholic family, yet

again took centre stage. Blair thought her best days were over a year ago, but new coach Nick Thometz helped to

re-ignite her enthusiasm.

So far Johann Koss has won the 5.000m and 1.500m. while Russian's Alexander Goulubev and Svetlana Bazhanova have won the men's 500m and women's 3.000m.

But Blair, expected to take 1,000m gold on February 23, is also set to make a major im-

pact.
