

WELLINGTON, Feb 20: Injured New Zealand cricket captain Martin Crowe is unlikely to be fit to play against India when they tour next

month, reports AP. Crowe has been ruled out of action since the first Test in Australia last November and underwent knee surgery late last year. New Zealand have lost five straight Tests under the leadership of stand-in captain Kep Rutherford.

Crowe had been hoping to be available in time for India's tour, which comprises one Test and four one-day internationals, but New Zealand Cricket chairman Peter Mc-Dermott said Sunday that Crowe's return is unlikely.

"We haven't had any indication that way at the moment," McDermott said.

"He's keen. If he could, he'd be out there now. But he's determined to be fit and well for the England tour."

New Zealand have a twomonth tour of England starting in late April and McDermott doesn't want Crowe taking the chance of coming back before he is fully fit and risking another setback to his career.

New Zealand, meanwhile, have made three changes to their squad of 12 for the third Test against Pakistan, which starts on Thursday in Christchurch.

Opener Blair Pocock has been dropped to make way for Blair Hartland, while allrounder Chris Cairns returns from injury and Chris Pringle is recalled.




the problems ahead for England when Atherton, winning the toss on a slowish pitch, and Stweart gave their side a deceptively good start with a fine partnership of 121.
