Eid Jubilation in City

The end of the holy month of Ramadan is drawing near to us in Eid, the festival of cheer and merrymaking. After the observance of self-discipline and restraint during the month of Ramadan, the Eid festivities acquire a special significance with an undertone of sobriety. The high spirits affecting us all at this time make us forget, however temporarily it may be, some of our problems in life and whatever be our station in life, we set about, with unusual zest and gusto, making preparations for observance of the festival within our means.

In the down to earth view of things, the problems of Eid celebration that we commonly face relate mainly to shopping, visiting ones near and dear ones living in village homes and preparation of various tasty dishes for family and friends.

The major part of the preparations consists in shopping for the various new things needed. For most people, Eid shopping proves to be a painstaking job. As Eid day draws near, the buying gets momentum in crowded roads and shops.

For Eid shopping there are different locales for different classes of people: Affluent, less affluent and the vast majority of people with limited means. For the affluent, shopping presents very few problems, for they care very little about bargaining. They have select shopping centres and plazas where the buyers just pick up the things of their choice and pay up. Price matters little here; if there is any bargaining here, it is on a marginal scale.

The real problem is faced by other classes of people. In the initial part of Ramadan, a general rise in price of many things is noticeable. As Eid draws near, there is a further spurt in price. This seems to be in contrast with situation in many countries where at times of festivals, reduction sales are a normal feature. But we find no such trend here. Of course during this season, reduction sale banners bedeck the exteriors of many shops dealing in dresses, shoes and other consumer articles. In most cases, these banners can be misleading. Some observers are of the

opinion that most of these are just eyewash to attract customers.

But a distressing thing is seen in the wide variance in prices of the same article in the same area from one shop to another. The shopkeepers, of course, have their ready explanation for this, but that does not appear convincing. The wise thing in such situations, according to some experienced shoppers, is to verify a price, as far as possible, from a couple of shops before making a purchase. But it is not easy to follow this dictum in the heavy rush of shoppers during this season. In many cases, shoppers, in general financially strengthened by Eid bonus, do not feel like taking extra trouble involved in verification of prices.

Many economy-minded people will take resort to shopping on footpaths in the city. Roadside shops proliferate during this season to such an extent that there are few things which are not available at these places. But to buy anything here, you should have the ability for deft bargaining. This is no place for chicken-hearted shoppers. The price initially asked at such places may be high but the expert player knows where to begin in the bargaining game. All this is admittedly exacting and time-consuming. But in our eastern outlook of life, the exercise of bargaining has its attractions.

Another important aspect of the joyous occasion is the frantic bids of a good number of city population to leave the city to join their near and dear ones in their village homes. The exodus, filled with sentimental feelings, will reach the height of its momentum when public and private offices close for the Eid holidays. The sight of the mass movement by railways, buses, steamers and launches is staggering in the extreme. The respective agencies run some additional services to meet the extra demands, but the travelling public, by and large, expect that, considering the enormity of the traffic rush, the concerned authorities will try their utmost to make further additional arrangements.

In this connection, it is important to keep in view the security aspect of the heavy movement of passengers through various modes of transport. In the past it was seen that the carrying of heavy extra loads of passengers and goods without caring for normal safety measures had resulted in tragic accidents with high casualties. Even in normal times, journeys by road are, subject to frequent accidents. It, therefore, calls for extra precaution on the part of the concerned agencies in the operation of their services.

The most galling thing to which intending passengers by different modes of transport are subjected at this time of inordinate rush every year is the large scale black market racket by organised groups charging higher prices on tickets earlier collected by them through covert means. The intending passengers will be greatly relieved if the law-enforcing agencies are more alert and vigilant in cooperation with the booking staff to ensure that the black market operators are not given a free hand in their business. Any corruption at the ticket counters should be checked and a suitable modality formulated so that tickets are sold to bona fide passengers.

Another important aspect of Eid celebration is the general proclivity for indulgence in gastronomic luxuries. Here also the scope is considerably limited for the majority by the rising trend of prices at this time. Inspite of this, some of the customary dishes like 'samat', 'firni', 'pollau' will be prepared in many homes. This is as much a part of the festive ritual as wearing new clothes.

Exchanging greetings with friends and relatives and visiting their homes after the Eid prayer form another important feature of the festive occasion. In the midst of unbounded merriment, many of us will solemnly remember deceased near and dear ones and visit their graves to offer 'fateha'.

Overcoming all odds, when Eid comes, it will be an occasion for general elation and euphoria, throwing into temporary limbo all our cares and anxieties.

6 Pakistanis held in Delhi for spying

NEW DELHI, Mar 4: Indian police have arrested six alleged Pakistani intelligence operatives in India, Delhi's police chief said today, reports Reuter.

Police Commissioner Mukun Behari Kaushal told a news conference that the six men, arrested in the Indian capital on Thursday, were Pakistani citizens.

"This is the first time we have arrested actual Pakistanis," Kaushal said. "Previously, (Pakistan) used Kashmiri and other militants to carry out anti-India operations."

A Pakistani official denied Kaushal's claim, saying, "This is total rubbish. It shows how India is getting panicky."

He said the arrests were apparently linked to the International Human Rights meeting in Geneva where Pakistan has moved a resolution seeking a fact-finding mission for Kashmir.

Pakistan said Indian troops have been torturing Muslim militants and raping girls following a separatist uprising in which at least 15,000 people have been killed in four years.

India denies the charges but said some reported violations have been investigated and the culprits punished.

Kaushal said the six men were armed with bombs and poison.

Separatist militants in India often carry Cyanide capsules to commit suicide to evade arrest.

"We have interviewed them on the video. They have confessed to a conspiracy to target sensitive targets," Kaushal said. He did not elaborate.

Diplomats said the arrests were likely to lead to a fresh round of acrimonious allegations between the two archfoes.

Pakistan expelled four Indian diplomats last year for alleged spying. India responded by expelling four Pakistani diplomats.

Both sides say their diplomats are harassed and sometimes beaten by secret police in each other's country.

India accuses Pakistan of arming and training militants in the northern states of Jammu and Kashmir and Punjab.

The government has accused Muslim groups in Bombay of carrying out a string of bomb attacks in India's commercial hub, saying they were helped by Pakistan. Islamabad denies the charges.

At least 250 people were killed in the blasts.

Indian team to see condition of returnees

CHITTAGONG, Mar 4: An Indian delegation including leaders of tribal refugees now encamped in Tripura in India, is expected to visit the Chittagong Hill Tracts after Eid to see for themselves the resettlement of tribal returnees in their homes, administration sources said.

The delegation will be headed by Upendra Lal Chakma, Chairman of the Tribal Refugees Welfare Association based in Tripura.

The Indian side and the refugee leaders have expressed their desire to visit the CHT and accordingly, invitations would be sent to them soon.

If the delegation finds the rehabilitation of the tribal returnees satisfactory a process is likely to be initiated to begin the second phase of repatriation of the Chakma refugees.

However, in the first phase of repatriation that took place from February 15 to 22, 1849 tribal refugees of 379 families returned voluntarily to their homes in CHT under a negotiated agreement between Dhaka and New Delhi.

Muslims, Croats meet in Vienna

VIENNA, Mar 4: Bosnian Muslim and Croat negotiators met at the United States embassy in Vienna this evening for a 'get-acquainted' session ahead of up to 10 days of talks on forming a federation. They are due to settle the details of a UN-brokered accord to establish a Croat-Muslim federation — with the hope of ending nearly two years of fighting — under the auspices of US President Bill Clinton's special envoy, Charles Redman, reports Reuter.

ROK regrets revival of Super 301

SEOUL, Mar 4: South Korea today expressed regret over the reviving by the US government of the Super 301 trade provision. A foreign ministry spokesman said that the South Korean government deeply regrets that the US government revives the Super 301 provision through administrative means, at a time when the Uruguay Round of talks is almost bringing about a worldwide free trade system after seven years of negotiations, reports Xinhua.

Indonesia assures Bosnia of NAM support

Silajdzic said earlier Friday that the support of NAM and Russia was necessary if the Serbs were to be brought to the negotiating table.

Meanwhile British UN troops in central Bosnia came under attack today when three mortar shells hit their base in the town of Zepce, a UN source in Zagreb said.

One of the 82-mm mortar bombs, believed to have been fired by the Bosnian Serbs, landed near the main building, but no casualties nor damage was inflicted, so the British did not fire back, the source said.

Another report says, the UN commander in Bosnia today voiced 'disappointment' over the lack of response to an urgent UN appeal for more troops in Bosnia and warned it could 'make things fall.'

Truck kills minor girl in Sylhet

SYLHET, Mar 4: A minor girl was crushed under the wheels of a speeding truck on Sylhet-Tamabil Road yesterday.

The accident occurred at about 2 PM near Chiknagul Primary School where the girl Shahida, 7, was crossing the road. She died on the spot.

Shahida, daughter of late Tota Miah of village Kukalganj, was returning home with a bag of wheat she received from the UP office under Vulnerable Group Development Programme.

Police sent the body to the Sylhet MAG Osmany Medical College Hospital morgue. The driver and helper had escaped but police seized the truck.

Two killed in mishaps

At least two persons were killed and two others injured in separate incidents in Dhaka and Narsingdi yesterday.

A nine-year-old boy, Nazrul Islam, was run over by a speeding truck at Pollabari in the city yesterday morning.

Fatally wounded Nazrul was rushed to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where the doctors declared him dead.

In Narsingdi, Monir Hossain, 16, was stabbed to death and his elder brother Abul Kalam, 18, sustained stab injuries in a clash over possession of a land at village Nihat yesterday. Kalam was admitted to the DMCH.

In another incident in Dhaka, one Tofazzal Hossain, 35, was severely beaten up in Babu Bazar area by a group of unidentified people. He was admitted to the DMCH.

7 out of 9 Goalpara power units idle

KHULNA, Mar 4: Shortage of funds, inefficiency of the ministry concerned and lack of skilled manpower have plagued the age-old generating units of the Goalpara Power Station in Khalishpur.

According to sources in the Power Development Board only two out of nine units are producing power, that too in reduced quantity. The other units remained idle because of shortage of funds and lack of technical manpower.

Installed in 1973, the Czech aided 60 MW power plant was shut down in September 1990. The PDB and the ministry could not procure funds timely to overhaul the plant. Earlier, the plant remained closed for nine months in 1977 and again for 14 months in 1981 for overhauling and servicing.

According to local engineers, about 30 million dollar was needed for rehabilitation work of the plant but the authorities failed to procure the money in time.

Meanwhile, the rehabilitation cost has gone upto 600

Leak at Russian N-plant

MOSCOW, Mar 4: Authorities shut down one of the four reactors at the northern Kola nuclear power station to fix a leak in the coolant system, the ITAR-Tass news agency said Friday. No radiation was reported released, reports AP.

According to Sylhet Kotwali Police, Fayed is an accused in two murder cases.

India to export rickshaws

NEW DELHI, Mar 4: Indian Cycle giant Atlas Cycles announced plans Friday to export rickshaws — the traditional taxicabs of Asia — to Holland and Germany, reports AFP.

The special bicycle-powered rickshaw models would be aimed at the more advanced, environment-conscious markets of Europe, a company official at the Atlas plant in Haryana state told the Press Trust of India news agency.

Rickshaws and scooter-taxi outnumber taxicabs in India and are the cheapest mode of transport after public buses.

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
