Donor-aided ADP projects

Audit finds faults in spendings

Star Report

Actual expenditures of only 20 out of 417 donor-aided projects, included in the Annual Development Plan (ADP) of 1988-89, matched the final budget allocations, according to an audit report released recently.

Prepared by the office of the Auditor and Comptroller General, the report on the foreign-aided development projects in the 1988-89 budget identified a number of irregularities in the expenditure of the projects including exceeding budget allocations; expenditure without any allocations; spending on projects not included in the ADP but forwhich project-aid was received; and budget allocations not being spent fully.

The findings of the report highlight the various project implementation problems being widely discussed presently and which have also come under severe criticism from the donor community.

The report was placed before the Jatiya Sangsad on Sunday last.

According to the audit report, only 39 out of 3445 audit objections were resolved during the investigations.

Of the 417 foreign-aided projects implemented by various government agencies during 1988-89, 267 failed to spend Tk 927.12 crore out of a budget allocation of Tk 2641.95 crore while 76 projects exceeded the budget al-See Page 12 Col 7

Myanmar and Bangladesh are expected to sign a border trade agreement in Dhaka on March 20

A four-member delegation headed by Myanmar's Minister of Trade Tun Kyi will arrive on a five-day trip to Bangladesh on March 18 to sign the agreement, which is the first of its kind between Bangladesh and any of its neighbours. Major General Win Myint,

chief of Myanmar's western command and two other high officials will accompany the Trade Minister, according to Commerce Ministry sources. Commerce Minister Sham-

sul Islam will sign the agreement on behalf of Bangladesh which will initially be valid for

one year. The agreement will

automatically be renewed

annually unless any side

The border trade agreement will primarily allow the sale and purchase of goods between the two countries via the Teknaf border of Bangladesh and the Maungdaw region of Myanmar located in the Rakhaine state.

Initially most of the trade will be carried by maritime transports across the Naaf river. The two countries may also consider setting up ferry services and even constructing a bridge at some later stage if trade picks up, sources said.

The proposed agreement is seen as a changed posture of Myanmar towards its neighbours and its desire to follow an open door policy against its previous isolationist attitude.

Myanmar also signed a border trade agreement with India early this year. Officials feel that the sign-

ing of the border agreement will be mutually beneficial to both Myanmar and Bangladesh. Local exporters could make

a major inroad into Myanmar's consumer market that includes items from cosmetics to toiletries and from newsprint to fertiliser. Particularly the local textile and pharmaceutical industries are expected to get a good market in Myanmar. There would also be demand for ceramic, leather products and tobacco. The items that should at-

tract the Bangladesh market include timber, forest products, bamboo, fresh vegetables See Page 12 Col 7
