Cricketers back

Cricketers back home yesterday after their 40-day tour of the African continent in connection with the recently-concluded fifth ICC Trophy in the Kenyan capital of Nairobi.

It was a quiet almost stealthy odyssey for Faruque Ahmed and his boys who failed to fulfil a nation's ambition of seeing its cricket team play in the next World Cup, the greatest competition of one-day cricket to be held for the second time in the sub-continent in 1996.

Bangladesh were ousted from the quarter-finals this year's ICC Trophy but their inability to make it to the last four struck an unprecedented note of despair among the cricket fans of the country simply because never in its 15-year-old history the world championship for the associate members of the ICC carried a promotional boost. There top finishers of the meet — champions UAE, runners-up Kenya and third placed Holland will play in the World Cup alongside the nine Test playing countries following a recent ICC provision.

Abahani ride well on Mizan

A brilliant hat-trick by Mizanur Rahman throttled Abahani Krira Chakra to the semi-final of the Charms Cup invitational football tournament as the popular Dhaka outfit blanked Mahindra and Mahindra of India at the East Bengal ground yesterday.

The lanky striker, who played for Brothers Union last year and now giving the Dhanmondi club a yeoman's service on loan, struck twice to help Abahani to formidable two-nil lead at first half.

He duly completed the treble midway through the second half and a minute to the final whistle Zakir, the industrious Abahani midfielder, rounded off the tally.

Mizan, who scored in Abahani's two previous engagements — a 2-1 win over IFA Eleven and a 1-1 draw with Calcutta Mohammedans — opened the account in the tenth minute of the match when he latched on a Mamun Joarder pass and fired the ball home from close (1-0).

Fifteen minutes later the speedy striker weaved his way in from the right flank to catch the custodian of the Bombay outfit napping with a neat placement (2-0).

Mizan scored his fifth goal of the meet, arranged for the welfare of the distressed Calcutta journalists when he thundered in a 25-yarder volley to evoke the memories of a similar goal against Calcutta Mohammedans a couple of days back in the 30th minute of the second half (3-0).

Kiwis keen to bounce back

WELLINGTON, Mar 8: New Zealand cricketers have a sense of deja vu as they prepare for Wednesday's one-day international against Pakistan at the Basin Reserve, reports AP.

With New Zealand 2-0 down in the five-match series, the home side is in a must-win situation. And for seven of the 13-man squad, that is a repeat of March 24 of last year.

That day New Zealand were 2-0 down in the five-game series against Australia after losses at Dunedin and Christchurch. Even the venue was the same — and on that occasion, New Zealand bounced back from a tight position to win by 88 runs.

They went on to win a thrilling fourth match at Hamilton by three wickets before losing the decider in front of a packed Eden Park on the final day of the series.

Batsmen Mark Greatbatch, Andrew Jones and Chris Harris, wicketkeeper Tony Blair and bowlers Danny Morrison, Chris Pringle and Gavin Larsen were in that New Zealand side a year ago.

Greatbatch and company are now hoping they can repeat the feat against Pakistan, but win a fifth-match decider.

New Zealand captain Ken Rutherford hopes the players realise the significance of the match.

Hopefully a lot of thought has gone into individual's play. There comes a time when the talking's got to stop and the action has to start. Rutherford said after training at a cold and windy Basin Reserve on Tuesday. "Tomorrow is make or break as far as the series is concerned."

The New Zealand batting order will stay the same, with Greatbatch going in first. Rutherford remains optimistic that New Zealand can prosper if they get a quick start.

"That takes a bit of pressure off the middle order and with the likes of Chris Cairns and Shane Thomson, there are players with the ability to hit over the field," he added.

Pakistan are confident of putting the series beyond doubt. They will field the same 11 from the first two games and believe they have an edge over the New Zealanders.

Captain Salim Malik wasn't impressed with New Zealand's batting in the Eden Park one-day.

"When they batted circumstances were easy but they didn't bat well," he said. "After the third Test (which New Zealand won by five wickets) they were pretty confident but now they're very much under pressure and we are more confident."

UAE success soured

ABU DHABI, United Arab Emirates, Mar 8: The possibility of being disqualified on technical grounds from the 1996 World Cup cricket tournament could spoil what should have been the United Arab Emirates' greatest moment in the sport, reports AP.

The small southern Gulf emirate on Sunday won the International Cricket Conference Trophy tournament in Kenya and are one of the three qualifiers — along with Kenya and Holland — from this event, for the World Cup to be staged jointly by India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka in 1996.

The UAE's problem is that only one of the players at the ICC trophy was a citizen — skipper Sultan Zarwani. All the rest were from Pakistan, India or Sri Lanka, who have, however, served the mandatory five years in the country, as required under ICC rules.

Warne, Hughes lashed out at

SYDNEY, Mar 8: Australian Test cricket greats and leading writers lashed out at the behaviour of Shane Warne and Merv Hughes in continuing condemnation here today of their antics during the first Johannesburg Test against South Africa, reports AFP.

Warne and Hughes were reported for verbal abuse by the match umpires and fined 440 Australian dollars (310 US) during a prickly third day's play last Sunday.

Warne, the leg-spinning wonder, was reported to match referee Donald Carr for his tirade at South African opener Andrew Hudson, upon dismissing him for 60 in his team's second innings.

There was no let-up today in the disgust of the duo's behaviour, with the role of team coach Bob Simpson and captain Allan Border in the controversy coming under scrutiny.

Former Test skipper and respected television commentator Richie Benaud said from Johannesburg: "I thought the umpires demanded 10 marks out of 10 for the way they handled the situation."

Journalist Mike Coward, writing in the Australian national daily from Johannesburg, went further.

"It is to be earnestly hoped that Shane Warne and Merv Hughes are made to understand the disservice they have done both to Australian cricket and Test match cricket."

"Their behaviour under pressure on Sunday ... was inexcusable."

"Hopefully, this time coach Bob Simpson will not turn a blind eye to such boorish conduct and severely censure these egocentric men who are given to demeaning the Australian cap and the fragile Test match game they profess to care so much about."

"Certainly a rap over the knuckles and a fine in a wobbly currency is insufficient punishment."

Melbourne's The Age columnist Peter McFarlane wrote from the press box: "Warne is fast developing a reputation as an extremely bad-mannered youngman on the field, a situation that has been allowed to worsen through the summer."

"Not only is Warne to blame, but what on earth are his captain, Allan Border, and the national team coach, Bob Simpson, doing in condoning this behaviour?"

ACB steps in

JOHANNESBURG, Mar 8: The Australian Cricket Board (ACB) today it had started an inquiry into the behaviour of bowlers Shane Warne and Merv Hughes who "sledged" South African batsmen here on Sunday, reports AFP.

The two men were fined 1,000 rand (295 dollars) each and severely reprimanded after an initial inquiry Sunday night by match referee Donald Carr, the former England captain.

Umpires David Shepherd of England and Barry Lambson of South Africa had lodged complaints with Carr for "verbal abuse" by the two of South Africa's opening pair of Andrew Hudson and Gary Kirsten.

What exactly occurred in the middle was not known, but television replays showed Hudson checking his stride on his way back to the pavilion after being dismissed for 60 by Warne as the Australian shouted at him while being held back by a teammate.

Hughes is believed to have "sledged" Kirsten after catching him for 35 off Tim May.

Australia began the final day of its first Test with South Africa at Wanderers cricket ground here Tuesday with an overnight 123-2, needing 454 to win.

Shaw given a chance

JOHANNESBURG, Mar 8: South Africa, who beat Australia by 197 runs in the first Test on Tuesday, have included left-arm spinner Tim Shaw in a 13-man squad for the second Test beginning in Cape Town on March 17, reports Reuters.

The 34-year-old Shaw, who went on South Africa's three-match tour of India when they were first readmitted to international cricket at the end of 1991, has been in excellent form for his Eastern Province this season.

He has taken 28 Castle Cup wickets at an average of 23.54.

Not surprisingly, the South African selectors have retained the side who beat Australia plus all-rounder Eric Simons who was 12th man for the first Test.

Emphatic win for S Africa

JOHANNESBURG, Mar 8: A fine all-round bowling performance by South Africa destroyed Australia's much-lauded batting lineup to secure a 197-run victory in the first Test at the Wanderers on Tuesday, reports Reuters.

Set a near impossible 454 to win, Australia were dismissed for 256 in their second innings.

The wickets, as in the first innings, were evenly shared among the four seam bowlers. Brian McMillan took three for 61 and there were two each for Allan Donald, Fanie de Villiers and Craig Matthews.

It was man-of-the-match Hansie Cronje, though, who delivered the final blow, having Tim May caught at short leg by Gary Kirsten after he and Merv Hughes (26 not out) had stayed off the inevitable for 68 minutes with a last wicket partnership of 21.

Starting the final day on 123 for two, Australia were soon in trouble.

Mark Waugh hit two boundaries to take him to 28 but then edged a delivery from Donald to wicketkeeper Dave Richardson in the fifth over.

The catch marked Richardson's 50th dismissal in his 12th Test, beating the previous fastest to that mark by Australian wicketkeeper Rodney Marsh who reached his half-century of victims in 13 Tests.

Tyson tones up for worst

INDIANAPOLIS, Mar 8: With about one year to go before his release from prison, Mike Tyson has given up on the legal system and is focusing on his education.

Tyson was convicted in February 1992 of raping beauty pageant contestant Desiree Washington while both were in Indianapolis the previous summer.

He was sentenced to six years at the Indiana Youth Centre, but his May 1995 release could be moved up by as much as six months if he passes his high school equivalency exam.

On Monday, the US Supreme Court declined to review the former heavyweight boxing champ's conviction.

The court, without comment, turned away arguments Monday that Tyson, 27, was denied a fair trial.

"I doubt this will affect him. I think he sets himself up to expect the worst and is pretty surprised when something other than that happens," said Phil Slavens, an assistant superintendent at the prison.

The Rev. Charles Williams, a close friend of Tyson's and president of the Indiana Black Expo, said he doubted Tyson would be surprised by the decision.

Tyson has matured during his two years at the prison, located west of Indianapolis in Plainfield, and spends his free time attending classes and working out, Slavens said.

"He's been pretty much on an even keel his whole stay here. As he gets relatively close to getting home his attitude is more upbeat," he said.

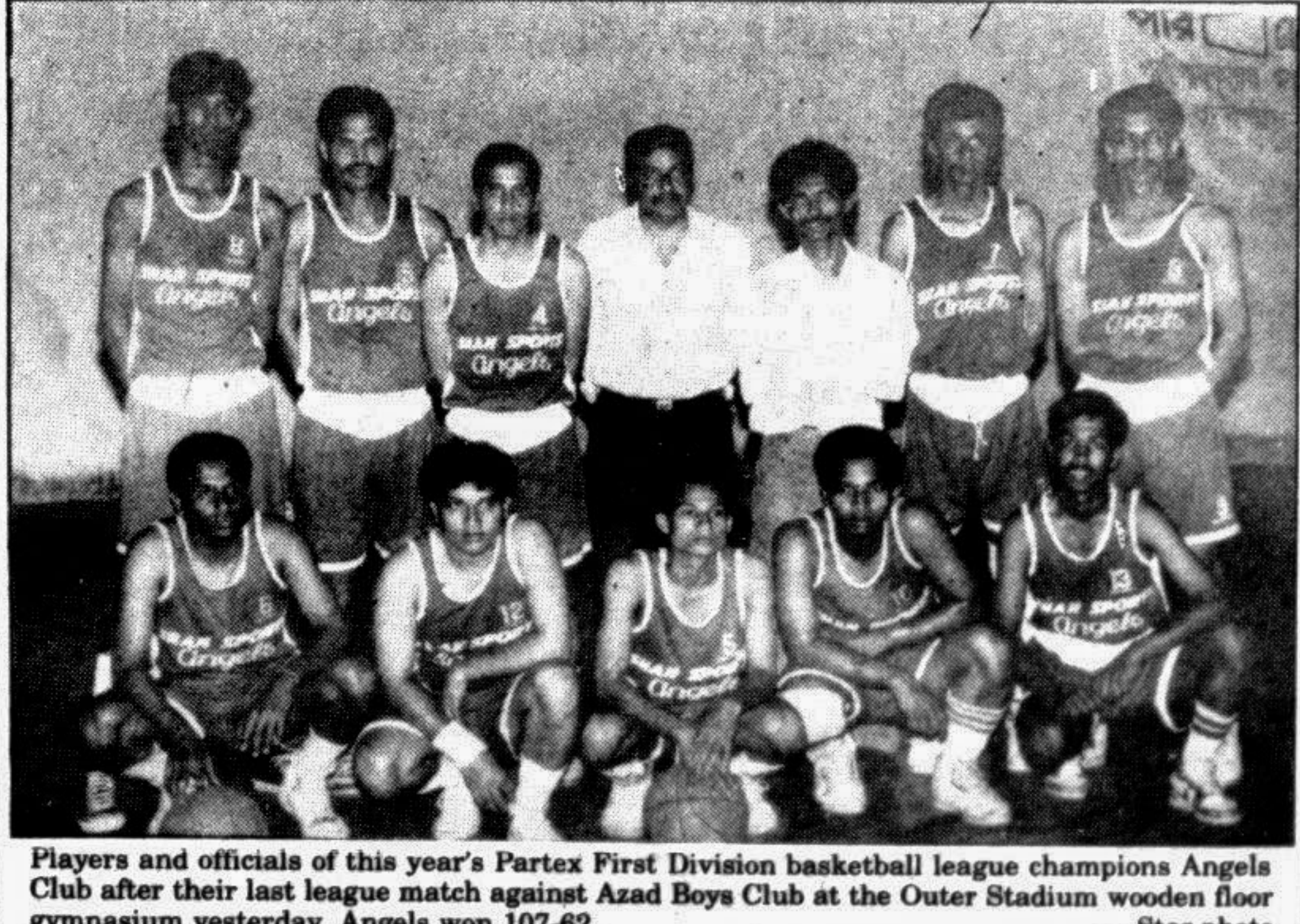
Tyson's attorney, Alan Dershowitz, said the denial was expected because the Supreme Court accepts a small fraction of the petitions it receives. Dershowitz said he will begin a federal habeas corpus petition, which requests a release from prison.

Attorneys representing Washington said the decision proved the validity of the original verdict in Marion Superior Court.

"We're very pleased with the result, although it comes as no surprise," said Lisa Campolo, an associate of Boston attorney Deval Patrick. Patrick is representing Washington in a civil lawsuit against Tyson in US District Court in Indianapolis.

"We hope the decision by the Supreme Court on the conviction will allow all the proceedings, including the civil case, to be resolved quickly," Campolo said.

Dershowitz's appeal said Indiana law wrongly allowed prosecutors to select judge Patricia J. Gifford, a former prosecutor in sex crimes, to preside over Tyson's trial.
