Reuter. "Craig's cartilage problems in his left knee are such that we now believe it is in his best interests for surgery to be arranged sooner rather than later," said Australian manager Cameron Battersby.

McDermott will be replaced by Damien Fleming who is in the party which will go on to Sharjah at the end of the present tour.

#### Transcendental Tendulkar

AUCKLAND. Mar 28: New Zealand might have lost a humiliating defeat here Sunday but India's master batsmar Sachin Tendulkar was being hailed today as being "magni ficent" and bordering on genius", reports AFP.

India defeated New Zealand in the second one-day match but the sports press here have virtually overlooked that and instead concentrated on Tendulkar's 82 runs off 49 balls.

"New Zealand sport abounds in great moments, indelible memories, entrancing action which lifts the spirit and allowwe ordinary mortals to live briefly with the gods of the games," the New Zealand Herald's Don Cameron began his match report.

He said it did not matter that Tendulkar had handed out New Zealand's worst one-day hiding

Cameron said their was a twinkling in Tendulkar's eyes as he began hitting balls to the boundary.

"Some batsmen on the rampage appear contemptuous of the bowlers, dismissing the ball with a brutal arrogance. Not Tendulkar, even if the bowlers might not have noticed the difference ..."

"Rather Tendulkar seemed in some private communion with the great and godly arts of the game. As if he and the graces of cricket were in such harmony that anything he attempted would turn into yet another sumptuous stroke."

Cameron noted the way the 18.000 spectators stood in tribute to Tendulkar.

"The word great is overused and has lost its impact, Cameron wrote.

"Perhaps, in that hour, Tendulkar moved beyond the physical limitations of being great, and on to the metaphysical, to the very bordering of

genius." The Dominion's Peter Bidwell said New Zealanders had watched "one of the finest innings seen in a one-day

match" Retired Indian cricketer Sunil Gavasker told the Herald he had seen one of the most talented batsmen in the world play one of the most extraordinary innings.

## Schoot waters down Popov



PARIS, Mar 28: Frenchman Franck Schoot upstaged Alexander Popov and snat-

ched the Russian master's 50 metres backstroke shortcourse world best mark in the final meeting of the World Cup swimming series on Sunday, reports' Reuter.

Schoot sprinted home in 24.60 seconds as both he and Popov swam inside the 24.66 mark Popov established in Desenzano, Italy, on March 13.

Popov touched in 24.65 to claim second place ahead of fellow Russian Vladimir Selkov, who returned 24.83.

Schoot, who set a longcourse European record in the event at the National Championships in Lille on March 18, sealed a great weekend for the French hosts following Franck Espositor's 200 metres butterfly shot course world record on Saturday.

But Popov finished fittingly with a win in the last session of the seven-venue World Cup series, claiming his third victory of the Paris meeting in the 50 metres freestyle.

Popov, winner of Saturday's 100 freestyle and 100 backstroke, swept home in 21.61, just outside his 21.50 world short-course record but ahead

of Britain's Mark Foster. Foster, who lost his world

mark to Popov in Desenzano two weeks ago, was second in 21.97 with Germany's Silko Guenzel third in 22.22. Germany's Sandra Voelker

equalled the women's 100 metres backstroke European short-course record with a time of 59.97 seconds which matched the mark set by East German Kristin Otto in Indianapolis on January 8.

Schoot said his 50 backstroke world best time technically not a world record because the event is not swum at major championships — was a surprise.

"It's completely unexpected, like the European record in the long-course pool a week ago," said Schoot, who dedicated it to his wife and Esposito followed up

Saturday's world record breaking win over American Olympic champion Melvyn Stewart in the 200 butterfly with another fine victory in the 100 butterfly.

Esposito clocked 52.69 just 0.18 seconds outside the European short-course mark of German Michael Gross- to win from Denis Pankratov of Russia (52.82).


