Hitting the Jack-pot Prize Bonds Way

Shajal was comparing his prize-bond numbers with the winning ones in the latest draw with absolutely undivided attention. At one stage, he made a triumphant cry that could almost be audible from across the street. Yes, he had won a Tk 500 prize in it. The joy of receiving money with virtually no effort, took some time to dilute. Then again, he started to look out the rest of the prize-bonds and as he was almost through with scrutinizing his collection of 100 (each ten taka worth) prize-bonds, he hit the jack-pot again. And this time he had hit it big. But the enormity of the prize money surprisingly left him spellbound and motionless. This time he had won Tk 10,000 and obviously, second consecutive win in a row was a bit too much for him to take in a single day. He almost became 'sick' with joy.

With probably one or two rare exceptions, everyone likes to make some money that doesn't always have to be earned through hard work. The prospect of adding some extra fat to one's bank balance by making some quick bucks, as it seems, has always been worth the risk. This is probably why people buy lottery tickets and sometimes turn into compulsive gamblers.

Fortunately, Islam's strict prohibition against any sort of gambling, didn't ever allow it to reach an epidemic shape in our country. But here too, people want to make some extra money, while at the same time, not putting their present financial position into jeopardy.

In such a situation, prize-bonds have gained a huge popularity. People buy prize-bonds for themselves and they give prize-bonds as gifts to their near and dear ones on social occasions. Although saving through prize-bond curtails the possibility of interests as in bank savings, yet an added attraction to it is the temptation of winning a prize and if anyone from the low-income group manages to win one of the big prizes, his life may very well take a positive turn towards prosperity.

Out of a series of saving devices, prize bond now occupies a unique position. It helps peo

ple to grow capital which in turn helps the government to invest the fund in various nation-building activities.

Although at the beginning there was prize-bonds of Tk 10 denomination only, subsequently, 50 Tk prize-bond was introduced and now both kinds are very much in circulation. It has been heard that the government is thinking seriously of introducing bonds of Tk 100 and Tk 500 denomination also, for boosting the per capita income of the people. Obviously, these bonds, if introduced, will carry along with it greater temptation of prize money than the usual.

But some people who save through prize-bonds object to the time limitation set by the government to claim the prize money. If and unless one claims the prize money in six-years'

time, the prize will be forfeited. Many people who have prize-bonds could not verify the bond numbers at the time of the draw and later 'on it probably escapes their eyes. So, there is a possibility of lot of prize-money going unclaimed. "Therefore, the given time limit of 6-years should be withdrawn. Because the money won, should always remain the winner's money, it should never be forfeited," says one.

Another problem that many people face is when they want to surrender their prize-bonds for cash money. "Selling bonds seems to be a lot more hassle than buying one," jokingly says a man. This problem probably arises out of the banks assigned by the government to perform these tasks. In reality, many banks see it as an imposed burden to do this job. So, innocent people are harassed.

There is no denying the fact that prize-bonds have over the years become a very popular savings device among the middle and low-income groups specially. But the bottomline remains, in a situation where only money can breed more money — a ten or fifty Taka prize-bond brings the possibility of Tk 50,000 as a prize money — not many people are even capable of sparing that little amount for trying their luck.

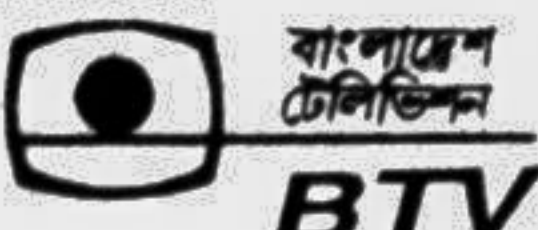
During the meeting, President Biswas expressed happiness at the excellent relations that exist between the Armed Forces of Bangladesh and Australia.
