Hosokawa's resignation and the coalition's rocky road

Monzurul Huq writes from Tokyo

Japanese Prime Minister Morihiro Hosokawa's abrupt announcement last Friday that he would step down in order to break the impasse created at the parliament over allegations about his own past financial dealings has not only created a vacuum within the government, but also raised questions about the future of the seven-party coalition that came to power only last August.

At a hastily called press conference, the Prime Minister said he has decided

to step down on realising the fact that he is becoming an obstacle to normal Diet proceedings.

The Diet has been deadlocked mainly over the issue of Hosokawa's borrowing of 100

AL, JP call hartal today

The Awami League and the Jatiya Party have called a country-wide dawn-to-dusk hartal today to protest the alleged police excesses and the killing of two political activists during Thursday's Secretariat 'siege' by the AL.

Two students — Mustafa Aminur Rasul Paran and Habibur Rahman Milon — were shot and killed by unidentified persons near Kaptan Bazar during violence on the day of the opposition programme.

However, both the AL and the ruling BNP have claimed the deceased Paran and Habib had been their activists.

The Jatiya Party's 'siege' around the Election Commission office on the same day passed off peacefully.

AL rally in city Compel this govt to step down'

Awami League general secretary Zillur Rahman yesterday alleged that the government of Begum Khaleda Zia had compelled his party to opt for a non-stop agitation, aimed at toppling the government.

"We had to announce the Secretariat siege programme after the ruling party wiped out the last speck of democracy by rigging the Magura by-election in an unprecedented manner," Zillur told a public meeting in the capital. "We were again forced to take up a package of anti-government programmes because the police attacked the peaceful siege and the BNP gunmen killed six agitators Thursday."

Addressing the meeting at Bangabandhu Avenue, the AL leader viewed that no fair election was possible under the Khaleda Zia government after what it had done in the Magura polls.

"The vote dacoity won't end with the BNP in power," he said. "The resignation of the government and holding the

Mining Rules of '68 to be amended

The Mining Rules of 1968 will be amended soon for which a high-level committee appointed by the government is now working.

The 11-member committee, headed by a joint secretary, is expected to finalise the amendments within a couple of months and submit the report to the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources. The amended rules will be effective only after these are vetted by the Law Ministry.

"The amendments for updating the Mining Rules formulated 26 years ago, are very essential in the changing circumstances," said a source in the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources. He said the government was feeling the need of amendments be-

cause large-scale mining activities were going to be started soon in the country.

Petrobangla has already signed contracts with Chinese and North Korean firms for coal mining in Barapukuria and hard rock mining in Madhyapara. An agreement for coal exploration and mining with foreign company BHP Minerals is also expected to be signed shortly.

To facilitate all these mining activities, the existing rules need to be changed and new clauses added," said the source.

According to the proposed amendments, the permissible size of the lease area for mining will be increased substantially while the rates for the

BB to issue bonds to bail BSRS

The government has decided to issue Treasury Bonds of Tk 175 crore to collect funds for resuming the landing operations of the Bangladesh Shilpa Rin Sangstha (BSRS).

The money to be collected through the sale of the bonds will be made available to the BSRS as loan for a period of three years at six per cent interest.

The bonds will be issued on April 16 from the Bangladesh Bank and available for purchase by the banks and financial institutions.

The bonds will bear interest at a rate of five per cent and will be of Tk one crore, five crore and 10 crore denominations. The bonds would be treated as approved security and serve the statutory liquidity requirement for the banks.

The bonds would be issued as promissory notes and be transferable through endorsement.

The lending operation of the BSRS was stopped in 1985 after an embargo imposed by the Asian Development Bank

Prokrichi tones down its campaign

The Prokrichi-BCS Central Action Council has toned down its two-month-long agitation programme announced April 5 for realisation of its 17-point charter of demands.

A platform of some 70 thousand doctors, engineers, agriculturists and 26 non-administrative cadres, the Prokrichi resumed its campaign this week but on a less belligerent note.

The two-month programme includes work abstentions and boycotts of the government's different coordination meetings at the thana and district levels.

When the earlier action programme was deferred in January 1, the Prokrichi leaders had said that they would

Malaysia will buy rice, jute bags to cut trade gap

Malaysia is keen to import high quality rice, jute and jute bags from Bangladesh to reduce existing trade gap between the two countries, according to a message received here yesterday, reports UNB.

This was disclosed by the Malaysian Deputy Minister for International Trade and Industry when a 10-member Bangladeshi textile delegation led by State Minister for Textile Major (retd) Abdul Mannan met with him in Kuala Lumpur during their three-day visit.

The delegation also called on Domestic Trade and Consumer Affairs Minister Y B Dato' Haji Abu Hassan Bin Haji Omar, Deputy Minister Dato' M Mahalingam Jui Meng and Deputy Foreign Minister Abdullah Bin Haji Che Wan.

They discussed wide range of issues including possibilities of joint venture projects and relocation of labour intensive industries to Bangladesh.

Problems relating to recruitment of Bangladeshi workers, were also came up in
