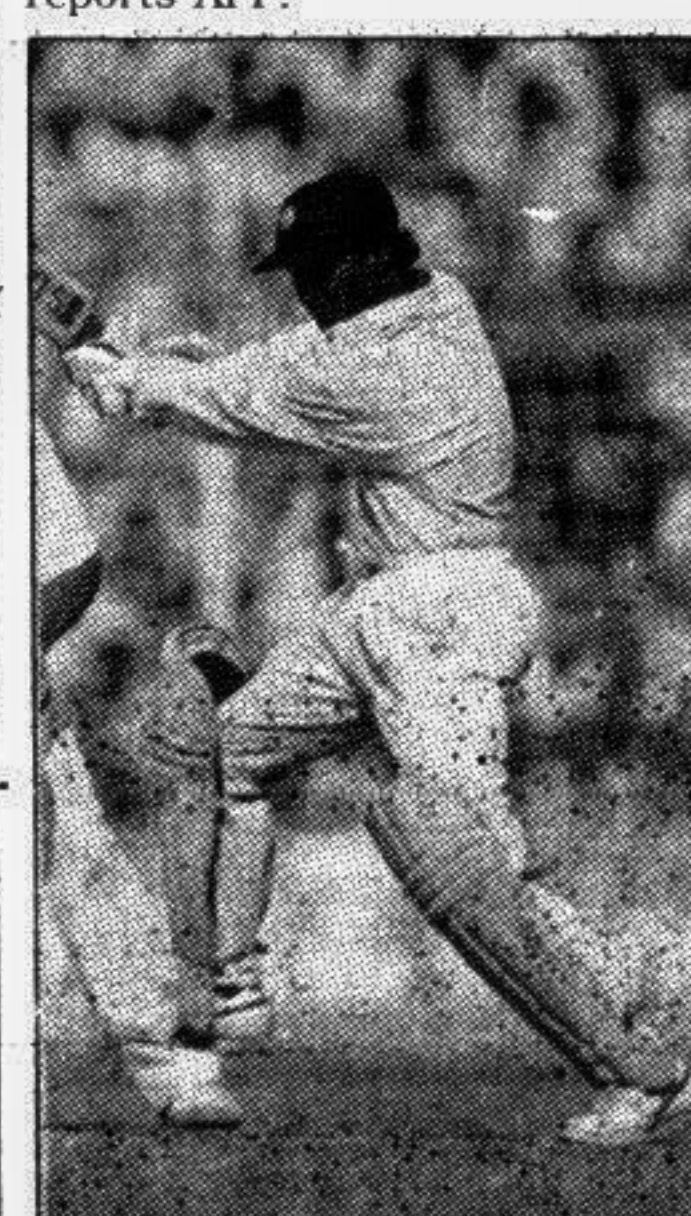

## India too good for Emirates



**SHARJAH,** United Arab Emirates, Apr 13: India shrugged off the shock of a heart attack to their cricket manager Wednesday to outplay unfancied United Arab Emirates by 71 runs in the Australasia Cup opener here, reports AFP.

Returning to the desert venue after three years, the Indians toyed with the inexperienced weekend cricketers from the UAE to earn full point from the Group A encounter in the six-nation tournament.

Sent to bat first, the Indians piled up 273 for five in the stipulated 50 overs and then restricted UAE to 202 for nine.

The emphatic victory served as an ideal morale-booster for India's crucial league clash against arch-rivals Pakistan on Friday, but was paled the news of manager Ajit Wadekar's heart attack before the match

began. Wadekar was rushed to hospital Wednesday morning when he complained of chest pain. ECG tests confirmed he had suffered a stroke and was under constant observation.

India's run chase was led by left-hander Viney Kambli, who smashed a brilliant 82 off 63 balls with three sixes and four boundaries. He remained unbeaten till the end.

Kambli put on 109 for the fourth wicket with skipper Mohammad Azharuddin, who made 81. Vice-captain Sachin Tendulkar hit 63 off 75 balls as opener.

UAE, who won the ICC Trophy for non-Test playing nations in Kenya last month to qualify for the World Cup in 1996, began their reply in sensational fashion, but could not match India.

## Oh boy!

NEW DELHI, Apr 13: A 12-year-old Indian boy has become the youngest person to swim from Sri Lanka to India and next plans to attempt the English channel, the Press Trust of India said today, reports Reuters.

It said Kutraleeswaran took 16 hours on Tuesday to swim 37 km (23 miles) across the Palk Strait separating the two countries.

"I am confident of crossing the English channel much more easily. I propose to cross it sometime in August," PTI quoted the Madras schoolboy as saying after landing at Dhanushkodi in India's southern Tamil Nadu state.

PTI said Kutraleeswaran was less than half the age of other swimmers who had crossed the Palk Strait.

# England await a win of wins



**BRIDGETOWN,** Barbados, Apr 13: A record breaking second century of the match by Alec Stewart

set England on course for a historic win against West Indies on Tuesday, reports Reuters.

His magnificent 143 following on his first innings 118 enabled England to declare at 394 for seven, leaving West Indies an almost impossible 446 to win.

Paceman Andrew Caddick made their task even harder with two wickets shortly before the close as West Indies finished on 47 for two and needing 399 runs in 90 overs on the final day.

West Indies prospects were made even worse by injuries to both their opening batsmen. Desmond Haynes stayed in the pavilion because of a painful finger requiring stitches after being hit in the first innings. Partner and captain Richie Richardson made 18 but then retired hurt with hamstring.

Caddick added to West Indies' woes by removing makeshift opener Jimmy Adams for 12 and nightwatchman Kenny Benjamin before he had scored.

But the day belonged to Stewart. He became the first England batsman to score a century in both innings of a Test match against West Indies.

He also set up the chance for England to become the first side to beat West Indies in a Bridgetown Test since 1935.

England, already 3-0 down and the five-match series lost, began the day with extreme caution, adding only 53 in the morning session to their overnight 171 for three.

Stewart, resuming on 62, managed only 13 runs in the first two hours. Partner Graeme Hick was even slower, taking almost an hour to move off his overnight 52 and shortly before lunch falling for 59 to a brilliant diving catch by Brian Lara at first slip off Courtney Walsh.

But with the lead ever widening, the West Indies pace attack appeared to lose heart.

Fast bowler Curtly Ambrose, who in the previous Test had been the architect of England's abysmal second innings dismissal for 46, suffered as much as any.

Stewart reached his second century of the match with a boundary off the tall fast bowler. He celebrated with two successive fours in the same over as he and new batsman Graham Thorpe cut loose in an punishing batting display as 133 runs were added in the afternoon session.

Their 150-run partnership for the fifth wicket ended any real hopes of a West Indies win and although Stewart fell to Walsh, an inside edge onto his stumps, shortly before tea, he had given England real hope of a shock win.

Stewart hit 20 boundaries from the 319 balls he faced, but perhaps more significantly showed he has matured into a Test batsman of real stature.

Thorpe continued to attack the willing West Indies pace bowlers and made 84 before skying a catch in a desperate chase to reach his century before captain Mike Atherton declared.

Atherton duly declared soon afterwards, leaving West Indies needing a record fourth innings winning score and at around four runs an over.

Left-arm spinner Phil Tufnell, who could be England's match winner on the final day, troubled the West Indian batsmen but it was Caddick who made the important breakthrough.

With the score on 43 he had Adams caught by Jack Russell behind the stumps and without addition had Benjamin held by Hick at second slip.

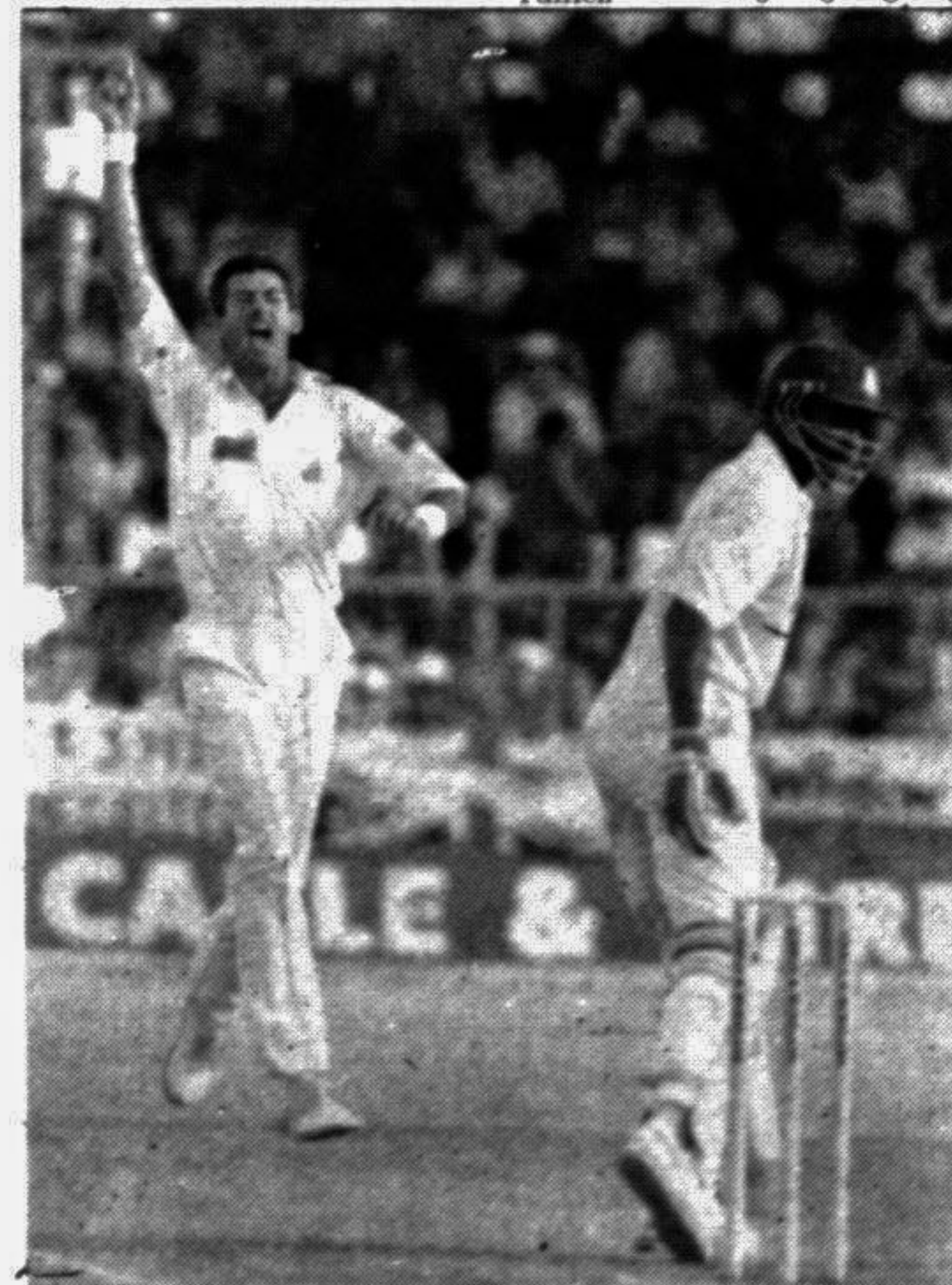
For the first time of the tour, England looked to be enjoying themselves.

"I enjoyed my second century the best," said Stewart afterwards. "It was more important and it would be great now to top it all off with a victory."

"We were outplayed in the first three Tests and we knew when we came out here that we would have to play to our full potential to match West Indies. We've done that so far in this game and now we're in a good position."

The only disappointment for England on by far their best day of the tour was a missed stumping chance by Russell off Tufnell.

"It was a difficult stumping. You can't blame Jack," said Stewart.

The officials of the seven-member committee are: chairman — Pablo Porta (Spain); members: Hafizuddin Ahmed (Bangladesh), Marcel Mathier (Switzerland), Rafael Esquibel (Venezuela), Alan Evans (Wales), Mahmud Ahmed (Egypt), and Rafael Salguero (Guatemala).

Of the 72 officials, six are from Asia including Hafizuddin Ahmed, who is also vice president of the Asian Football Confederation (AFC). They are — Peter Velaphan (Malaysia), Paul Moni (Malaysia), Faruq Bouzu (Syria), Nd Nugarana (Indonesia) and Tadeo Murata (Japan).
