

### BFF's 'no' to Asiad

Bangladesh football team will not take part in the forthcoming Asian Games which will begin in the Japanese city of Hiroshima in October.

The decision was taken in a meeting of the executive committee of Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) yesterday with vice-president M Azizul Haq in the chair.

BFF, who was advised earlier by Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) to take decision regarding the participation of the football team in the Asiad, decided against participation with express intention of what they termed 'not to hamper the local league'. A practical and logical decision in following the disastrous performance of Bangladesh in the 6th SAF Games where they finished sixth among the six teams.

The meeting also decided not to bring the failed mentor Swiss Oldrich Svab to groom a junior team. Svab was the coach of the national team.

BOA, the supreme body to select the disciplines for the Hiroshima Asiad earlier came up with a decision that the hockey, kabaddi, and shooting team along with the athletics and swimming contingents will be fielded in the paramount sports meet of Asia.

### Only seven turn up for hockey camp

In the backdrop of a looming threat of boycott of the Asiad by Bangladesh Hockey Players' Welfare Association (BHPWA), only seven players reported to Bangladesh Hockey Federation (BHF) in the national camp yesterday.

The BHPWA came up with the threat after the authority expressed their reluctance to hold the hockey players' transfer on May. The general secretary of BHF, Shamsul Bari who assured the players to pursue the club officials to hold this year's players' transfer before May 7 did little justice to his words later.

The recently formed executive committee of BHF in a meeting deferred the transfer date till August.

BHF will now hold a meeting shortly to find a way out of the deepening crisis.

### Some solace for OM

PARIS, Apr 25: A decision by European soccer officials to let Olympique Marseille play for next year's European Cup "will save us," says Bernard Tapie, the owner of the scandal-plagued team, reports AP.

The former European champions, shoved to the Second Division next season by the French Soccer Federation Friday because of a payoff scandal, had faced a bleak outlook. Tapie said in an interview published Monday in the newspaper Equipe.

Without the decision announced Sunday by the European Soccer Union, "it was almost lost. Everyone had to be sold. Impossible to pull out of it. But now..." Tapie said. A self-made millionaire and leftist member of Parliament, Tapie on Saturday said he would appeal the decision by the French federation, which also levelled sanctions against him and former team members.

"I know they want to kill me. But I don't die that easily."

Biman who posted 132 for three got the bulk of the runs from Jahangir who made 39. Shanawaz Shaheed, another national cricketer contributed 34. Zakaria Imtiaz remained unbeaten on 29.

### Getting back in reckoning

LONDON, Apr 25: Mike Gatting hammered 224 not out for Middlesex on Sunday after England's new chairman of selectors Ray Illingworth said experienced older players may well figure in his Test plans, reports Reuter.

Former England captain Gatting made the most of two escapes on 46 and 146 to haul the county champions out of trouble after they followed on 201 behind the England A team in the season's traditional Lord's curtain-raiser.

Gatting, who batted seven and a quarter hours and struck 35 fours from 361 balls, carried Middlesex to 394 for four declared in their second innings on the fourth and final day and the game was drawn.

Illingworth said during the match: "I didn't captain England until I was 37, and then played Tests until I was 41. Experience is worth a hell of a lot and more so in cricket than in any other game."

Gatting, 37 in June, was dropped during last season's Test series against Australia, but he said on Sunday: "I'm always available for England, home or abroad, although at the moment I'm just concentrating on getting runs for Middlesex."

"I spoke to 'lily' briefly at the start of this match and I'm not really concerned about whether I'm in his 50 to watch or not. He's not really got to say anything to me — it's more a case of getting the runs on the board."

### Where is Ambrose?

LONDON, Apr 25: Curtly Ambrose, the world's number one bowler, was at the centre of a mystery on Monday, when he failed to return from the Caribbean to his English county, Northamptonshire, reports AFP.

Ambrose, 30, was due to play for Northants against Middlesex in the Benson and Hedges Cup preliminary round at Lord's here Tuesday.

There were indications that the Antiguan wanted an extra break from cricket following his impressive 26-wicket performance in the 3-1 Test series victory against England.

Northants chief executive Steve Coverdale was at Gatwick Airport in southern England to meet Ambrose, but the pacesetter was not on the flight.

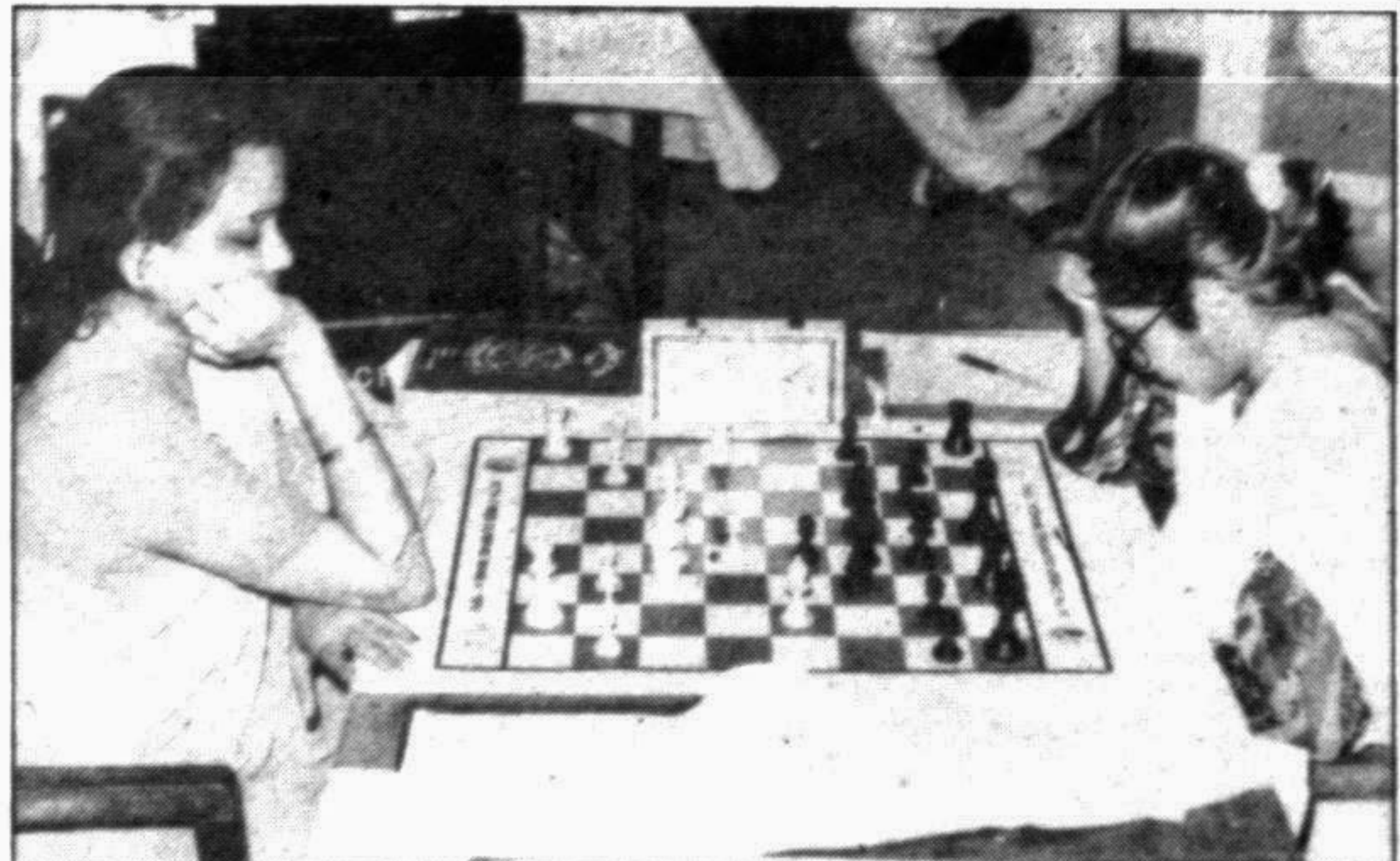
"A lot of work has been going on to make everything ready for Curtly and when I spoke to him two days ago, he gave me no indication that he wouldn't be arriving today," said Coverdale.

MADRID, Apr 25: Madrid's two big clubs both lost on Sunday with Atletico perilously close to relegation.

Stadium. Real Madrid played miserably, creating almost no chances and at the end irritated fans threw seat cushions onto the pitch.

Bosnian Meho Kodreo came back with a flourish from a four match suspension to hit Real Sociedad's first goal two minutes into the second half.

Imanol Alguacil made it 2-0 in the 88th minute with a long, clean shot.

Barcelona got off to a flying start with a first-minute goal by Bulgarian Hristo Stoichkov.

Second-half goals by Stoichkov, Guillermo Amor and Quique Esteban completed an impressive performance against a Celta side tired and broken after losing the Spanish Cup final to Real Zaragoza on Wednesday.

"We are two points from Deportivo, and there are still six in play," Barcelona coach Johan Cruyff said.

Barcelona have been steadily regaining their stride after an uneven run earlier in the season and of the last 24 points in play, they have taken 22. They also have a better goal difference than Deportivo.

Deportivo coach Arsenio Iglesias made light of the dropped point. The league is within our grasp. I'm content with the point we have achieved," he said.

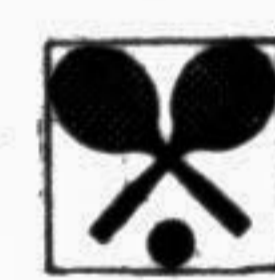

## Medvedev after Sampras



MONTE CARLO, Apr 25: Andrei Medvedev says he's playing his best tennis ever and now has his sights on Pete Sampras.

If the two meet on clay in next month's French Open, it should be a top attraction.

Sampras is hot. He's won four tournaments in a row, 21 straight matches and is solidly entrenched in the No 1 ranking in the ATP Tour rankings.

But Medvedev would be a formidable opponent if he plays like he did last week at the Monte Carlo Open.

Medvedev powered past defending champion Sergi Bruguera — also the French Open champion — 7-5, 6-1, 6-3 Sunday to win the \$1.7 million tournament. It was his seventh title on the pro circuit and first since last August when he won the New Haven tournament.

Two days earlier, he beat Courier in a 3-hour, 19-minute match that was probably one of the year's best.

real and wasn't a dream." The sixth-seeded Medvedev won \$235,000 for the victory. Bruguera, seeded fifth, received \$124,000. Bruguera won Monte Carlo in 1991, beating Boris Becker, and last year overcame Cedric Pioline of France in the final.

Medvedev, ranked No. 9 in the world, dominated the match from the start and won in one hour, 39 minutes.

"I think Andrei was playing very hard all the time. He put me all the time under pressure and maybe that is why I couldn't play as well as the other days," Bruguera said.

Medvedev really took it to Bruguera, especially in the second set when Medvedev won six consecutive games.

"Six games in a row, I mean, it is not very easy," Medvedev said. "It was the best set, probably of my career."

On a hot streak, Medvedev took nine straight games from the second game in the second set and had a 3-0 lead on his way to a 6-3 third set.

At last!

LONDON, Apr 25: It wasn't exactly like winning Wimbledon, but it was still cause for celebration. After 17 years, a British man has finally won an ATP Tour tennis tournament, reports AP.

When Jeremy Bates defeated Joern Renzenbrink of Germany in Sunday's final of the Korean Open in Seoul, he became the first British male to win in the tour since Mark Cox in 1977.

Britain's tennis writers, all in Monte Carlo for the Monte Carlo Open, shifted gears and wrote about Bates' victory 6,000 miles away.

"At last!" was the headline in Monday's Daily Express. "Jeremy end 17 years of British failure."

"It is like a monkey of the back," said Cox, who now heads a development program for British junior players. "It's a terrific boost for British tennis."

Since Cox's victory, British tennis — especially the men's game — has stayed in the limelight mainly as the butt of numerous jokes. In recent years, British bookmakers have equated the chances of a British winning Wimbledon with the likelihood of a verified UFO landing.

Last month, Bates led the country's Davis Cup team as it reached an all-time low in a loss to Portugal in a regional match, pushing the Brits to the brink of relegation to the third world of tennis.

For Bates, who turned pro in 1982, the surprise victory in Korea is the highlight of his singles career.

Though it came at one of the lesser events of the ATP Tour, Bates' victory will likely improve his world ranking from 131 to close to 100, surpassing Mark Petchey at No. 104 as Britain's highest-ranked player. Bates will now be eligible to go directly into the draw at this year's Wimbledon instead of relying on a wild card berth.
