The runaway was charged with possession of two packets of heroin and was released to her parents.

Wineland was charged with possession of suspected crack cocaine and drug paraphernalia and was taken to Dade County Jail, where he was being held early Tuesday on dlrs 6,000 bond, authorities said.

Capriati checked in Saturday morning and checked out Monday.

Capriati most recently has been living in Boca Raton with friends after moving out of her parents' home near Tampa.

"It's better here (in Bocal than up where I was living." she told Sports Illustrated for a story this month.

She told the magazine she was "chillin", just having fun.

WI to play six Tests in England in '95 LONDON, May 17: England

are cashing in on the powerful crowd appeal of the West Indies by scheduling an expanded six-Test cricket series against them next year, reports Reuter.

The unofficial world champions have never played more than five Test matches on previous visits to England, but in 1995 their international programme has been extended to. mirror those of Australian teams, with six Tests as well as three one-day internationals.

"It has been done largely for financial reasons," admitted Test and County Cricket Board spokesman Tim Lamb.

"The West Indies are a very attractive team and this way all six of our Test match grounds get an opportunity to stage one match each in the series.

.The change of programme means that Shri Lanka will not play a Test in England next year. They have played one-off matches at the end of the last three West Indian tours.

Stewart's Surrey unstoppable LONDON, May 17: Alec

Stewart's Surrey continued their unstoppable start to the season while West Indian Carl Hooper starred with the bat, albeit in a losing cause, in English county cricket on Monday, reports Reuter.

Stewart, Englands opener who hit two centuries in one Test in the West Indies on the recent England tour, insisted his county side "are not getting carried away." The championship leaders






