

## To Olsen soccer is a science



ccer coach Egil Olsen believes Norway are the best team

in the world — at least when his players don't have the ball, reports Reuter. A cult figure in Norway -

where even a new "Drillo" icecream is on sale in his honour - Olsen has led Norway to their first World Cup finals since 1938. "Professor" Olsen, 52, has

spent long hours poring over videos to create what he calls effective football - a style criticised abroad as a boring kickand-chase, with players obeying orders but lacking artistry. "Some people look at foot-





ORLANDO, Fla, May 28: Orlando's police chief and the chief executive of World Cup USA have dismissed newspaper reports that English hooligans will team up with Dutch thugs to disrupt tournament soccer matches this summer, reports AP.

Police Chief Tom Hurlburt and World Cup boss Alan Rothenberg said the reports were unsubstantiated.

Rothenberg, on an inspection tour of the nine American host cities, said during a news conference that the stories were erroneous.


Hurlburt said officials at England's National Criminal Intelligence Service denied the report appearing in the London-based national paper The Guardian last weekend. The official cited by the paper said he was misquoted, Hurlburt added.

The story was repeated by The Tampa Tribune on Friday. along with speculation about possible violence.

The Guardian story said English hooligans were likely to link up with Dutch extremist groups at the Holland-Belgium match June 25 in Orlando and at a potential quarterfinal July 10 between Holland and Germany at East Rutherford, NJ. Holland knocked England

out of the World Cup finals.




