The Daily Star NAM FMs' confee opens in Cairo tomorrow

CAIRO, May 29: Foreign Ministers of the Non-Alligned Movement (NAM) - facing wars in Yemen. Rwanda and Bosnia — meet here Tuesday with South Africa taking part for the first time, reports AFP.

Eighty-five countries are sending their Foreign Ministers for the four-day conference, including Alfred Nizo for South Africa following its first all-race elections, Egyptian of-

A Serbian request to take part in the conference is to be examined on Monday at the level of senior officials, but it is unlikely to be approved, said an Egyptian diplomatic source.

Yugoslavia was a key member of NAM before its break-

But Egyptian Foreign Minister Amr Mussa has accused Serbia of violating international law and opposes Belgrade taking part in meetings of the 108-nation Movement.

Apart from Serbia, NATO countries as well as Russia have asked for observer status. On the agenda will be conflicts threatening several

member states, such as Yemen, Rwanda and Bosnia. The delegates have to choose a new country to host the next NAM summit and chair the group of developing countries, following Indonesia

whose three-year term ends in

September 1995. So far no country has announced its candidacy, although Latin American states

have been lobbying for the position since the region last hosted the summit in 1979, in Cuba.

The diplomatic source said Iran could run as chairman. Its Foreign Minister, Ali Akbar Velayati, is to attend the Cairo conference although Egypt and Iran do not have diplomatic relations. The conference will also set

up a committee to re-examine the role of NAM with the end of the Cold War and superpower rivalry. Both Egypt and Indonesia are expected to submit documents outlining their vision of the future.

Ten truckloads of army troops were deployed in Kokrajhar and the surrounding countryside in addition to hundreds of police and paramilitary troops to stop the violence that erupted Friday and restore orders.

Security forces, which have been equipped with orders to shoot rioters on sight, toured the district Sunday in a deterrent show of strength, officials said. A hunt was also underway for the killers.

tense," the statement said. The activists said the bitterness was increasing everyday because 'innocent people have been subjected to inhuman torture' by India security forces, thousands of whom are deployed in the border state.
