# Pak opposition ends boycott of NA

**ISLAMABAD, May 29:** Pakistan's opposition decided today to end a boycott of the National Assembly and return to the House to demand Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto follow through on her offer to step aside, opposition leaders said, reports Reuter.  
 "We will take up this issue in the National Assembly," Nawaz Sharif said after a meeting of his Pakistan Muslim League and its allies in the National Assembly agreed to end a boycott of the House that began last month.  
 The opposition launched its boycott as a protest after Bhutto's Pakistan People's Party (PPP) toppled the pro-Sharif government in the North West Frontier Province.

# Serbs may accept limited truce

**SARAJEVO, May 29:** Bosnian Serbs battled government forces on Sunday for control of strategic heights and communications lines along a 200-kilometer front in north-central Bosnia, reports AP.  
 Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic conceded for the first time that his side has been forced to give up territory, and indicated he might be willing to accept a limited, rather than permanent, cease-fire.

# 50 settlers

 Bodo tribal militants armed with self-loading rifles and machetes went on a bloody rampage in the countryside surrounding Kokrajhar on Friday night, attacking Muslim settlers and setting their homes and property on fire.  
 Twenty-two people — 11 women, six children and five men — were killed according to official count, but witnesses in Kokrajhar and government sources here speaking on condition of anonymity put the death toll at nearly 50.  
 More than 100 people were injured, 7000 people left homeless and four villages burned to the ground, they said.  
 The tribal-dominated district is known as an ethnic powderkeg with periodic outbreaks of violence ensuing from tensions between Bodos and settlers and Bodos and native Assamese.  
 Twenty settlers were killed in Bodo attacks in January and 50 died in a bout of ethnic violence the preceding October.

# Viral diseases

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 suffering from this disease," said Dr Reaz Fida, a private practitioner.  
 "And most of the rest 50 per cent patients are suffering from fever, cold, pain and other viral diseases," he added.  
 The doctors suggested that paracetamol could be taken as a relief against pain and fever and anti-histamine drugs against cold. Anti-biotics such as those of the amoxicillin group can also help people resist the viral attacks.  
 The patients should take seasonal fruits, specially pineapple, in case of viral diseases like influenza.  
 "There is no need to rush to doctors as they can do little against virus attacks," the doctors said adding the patient, however, must consult a doctor if he or she suffers from fever for more than four days.  
 The doctors explained that the spread of viral diseases was a natural phenomenon in the country during this season every year.

# 12 injured in N'ganj clash

**From Our Correspondent NARAYANGANJ, May 29:** Twelve persons were injured, four of them critically, in a village here in an hour-long clash this morning.  
 Ahmed Ali of Monabari village owed Taka 35 to Akhtar Hossain of Sonachara village.  
 When Akhtar asked Ali for the money at around 10 am, the latter refused to pay. An enraged Akhtar went home, but soon returned with 50 men-armed with lethal weapons and cocktails and attacked the house of Ahmed Ali.  
 In the bloody clash, twelve persons were injured. The seriously injured are Farida Begum (28), Mujibur Rahman (22), Mohammad Ali (35) and Mokles (28). They have been admitted to the Narayanganj Hospital.

 A police press release said a detective police team made the arrest in a surprise raid at the Mohakhali hospital gate at about 1:30 am while the group was allegedly taking preparations to commit dacoity in a garments factory at Tejgaon industrial area.

# AL-BNP clash in Pabna: 15 hurt

**PABNA, May 29:** At least 15 people were injured, three of them critically, in an armed clash between Awami League and BNP activists at the Maynamoti suburb of the town Sunday evening, reports UNB.  
 Sohrab Hossain, Munaf Ali and Abdus Salam of Awami League were admitted to the Sadar Hospital with bullet injuries, police said.  
 The fighting, sequel to a series of clashes for the last three days for political supremacy in the area, erupted at around 7 pm and continued for half an hour.  
 At least 25-30 rounds of fire were shot and some 20 bombs exploded during the clash.

# Honecker dead

**SANTIAGO, May 29:** Erich Honecker, who supervised construction of the Berlin Wall and ruled Communist East Germany with an iron fist for 18 years, died Sunday in Chile. He was 81, reports AP.  
 Honecker spent his final days in Chile, bitter in self-imposed exile an unrepentant about his brutal regime.  
 Honecker's lawyer Nicholas Becker, reached by telephone in Bonn, said he didn't know the immediate cause of death. Honecker had lived in Chile since early 1993 with his wife Margot and their daughter Sonja.  
 A spokesman for German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, whose aggressive push for reunification led to the end of East Germany, released a brief, blunt statement.  
 "Honecker failed in his political goals. His policies brought suffering to countless people in Germany. Out of respect for the dead, it is fitting to say little more about his role in post-war German history," said spokesman Dieter Vogel.  
 In January 1989, Honecker, a coal miner's son, predicted the Berlin Wall would last for a century. But within two years, Honecker had been ousted from power, saved by liver cancer from a near-certain conviction in a Berlin court.  
 Born on August 25, 1912 in Saarland in western Germany, Honecker joined a Communist youth group at age 14 and spent 10 years in a Nazi prison.  
 After World War II, Honecker rose in the East German party ranks. He became a member of the ruling Politburo in 1958. Beginning in August 1961, he supervised the construction of the Berlin Wall to stem the westward exodus of East Germans.  
 Honecker took over as party leader in 1971, after helping engineer the ouster of his predecessor, Walter Ulbricht.  
 The peak of his political career came in September 1987, when he visited West Germany and received all the protocol honours of a foreign head of state.



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# Two killed, 40 hurt in Savar bus accident

**SAVAR, May 29:** Two people were killed and 40 injured in an inter-district bus accident on the Dhaka-Aricha highway near Nabinagar in Savar thana early today, reports UNB.  
 Police said Nur Mohammad, 25, and an unidentified person, aged about 40, died instantly when the Dhaka-bound night-coach from Lalmonirhat skidded off the road at 4 pm.  
 Ten of the injured were sent to the Ganoshasthya Kendra, another 10 rushed to Savar Thaha Health Complex and the remaining 20 sent to Dhaka.

# Political impasse

 Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) moves a Constitution amendment bill providing for a care-taker government.  
 But the BNP leaders maintain that it is illogical for the opposition to be the ruling party — which does not believe in the concept of an interim administration — to move the bill. The BNP, is however, ready to discuss any opposition-sponsored bill on the issue.  
 Several rounds of informal discussions have so far been held, outside Parliament, between the leaders on either side but they are yet to reach any agreement.  
 A section of the ruling party leadership is now of the opinion that they should try to win over the smaller parliamentary groups. In that case, they think the Jamaat-sponsored bill on care-taker administration could be placed in the House during the budget session.  
 The Jamaat, which admittedly does not believe in a continuous boycott of Parliament, would respond to the ruling party's call for returning to the House provided its bill is placed for discussion, a top leader of the BNP told this correspondent yesterday.  
 He, however, said that efforts should continue to bring back the entire opposition to the House.  
 The BNP standing committee, the highest policy-making body of the party, would meet soon to finalise the party strategy in this regard.

# Congress wins majority seats in by-polls

**NEW DELHI, May 29:** Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao's Congress party won most of the 17 federal and state legislatures seats for which elections were held last week, the federal Election Commission reported Sunday, reports AP.  
 The elections were called to fill the 17 vacancies, spread over in 10 states.  
 The Congress won five of the seven federal parliament seats. The remaining two were shared by the Hindu Bharatiya Janata Party and the Republican Socialist Party.  
 In the state legislature, Rao's party won five of the 10.

# Export earnings: No exact figure

Although only 10 days are left before a new budget for the country is announced, the actual amount of export earnings during the current fiscal year is not known because of irregular publication of the monthly bulletins by the Export Promotion Bureau (EPB).  
 EPB sources say they could not publish the export bulletins during the last four months due to lack of coordination.  
 The export performance up to January this year was mentioned in the last bulletin which was published only last month after a long delay.  
 Sources said, the EPB was considering publishing a monthly bulletin of international standard regularly.  
 That will take two or three months, hence the suspension of the previous cyclostyled bulletin, he informed.  
 In the first 7 months of the current fiscal year the country's export earnings stood at 1579.53 million dollars.

 Karim El-Eryani said after a meeting of the cabinet and Presidential Council that any UN resolution should recognize that the civil war is an "internal conflict."  
 "We discussed the (proposal) being presented to the Security Council and we all agreed that it represents a flagrant interference in the internal affairs of Yemen," Eryani told The Associated Press.  
 Egypt and several other states including Saudi Arabia have asked the Security Council to arrange a cease-fire. They also reportedly want the council to consider a weapons embargo of Yemen.  
 The north has rejected outside intervention and refused to deal with southern Yemeni leader Ali Salem al-Beidh. It says it is talking to southern "moderates" to halt the war and restore Yemen's 4-year-old unification.

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# The Midnight File

**Somali gunmen free Nepali peacekeeper**  
**MOGADISHU, May 29:** A UN peacekeeper from Nepal was freed Sunday, nearly two weeks after he was seized by Somali gunmen who shot dead five colleagues. Lance Cpl Kumar Banjya, 25, was handed over to the Red Cross, said UN spokesman George Bennett. "Obviously he wasn't too happy to be captive, but he is in good spirits," Bennett said, reports AP.  
**Iraqi PM sacked**  
**NICOSIA, May 29:** Iraqi President Saddam Hussein has sacked his Prime Minister and taken his place at the head of a new government. Iraqi news agency reported today. The announcement from Iraq's ruling revolution command council was monitored by the British Broadcasting Corporation, reports Reuter.

# Israel asks PLO to move offices out of Jerusalem

**JERUSALEM, May 29:** Israel has told the PLO to move its self-rule offices out of Jerusalem, and the government ordered police to keep a closer eye on PLO headquarters in the city, officials said Sunday, reports AP.  
 The toughened stand by Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin comes amid escalating rhetoric between Israel and the PLO over the future status of Jerusalem, which both claim as their capital.  
 Israel claims the mushrooming number of PLO offices in Jerusalem violates the autonomy accord's provision for self-rule headquarters in the Gaza Strip or West Bank town of Jericho. In the Israel-PLO accord, the two sides postponed negotiations on the sensitive issue of Jerusalem for two years.  
 Israeli Agriculture Minister Yaakov Tzur said after a Cabinet meeting Sunday that the government would take "all the necessary steps" to insure that the provisions of the Israel-PLO accord were met.  
 "I don't think Israel can allow any hint or process that gives the impression that Jerusalem is going to be the capital of the Palestinians. This is against the agreement that we signed," he told reporters.  
 The PLO has opened a housing ministry, statistics bureau and economic agencies in east

# Rwandan interim govt flees its HQ

**KIGALI, May 29:** Rwanda's interim government was reported to have fled its refuge south of the capital Kigali as rebels advanced, diplomats said today, reports Reuter.  
 They said most government ministers and top officials had left their refuge at a former, civil servants' college near Gitarama town, 40 km (25 miles) south of Kigali.  
 The ministers and officials fled their headquarters on Saturday by road and helicopter.

# Constable found dead at Demra

 A constable of the Special Branch (SB), Shamsuddin, 45, was found dead in a ditch at Demra yesterday.  
 Demra police suspect it was a case of homicide. "There were several stab injuries on the body of Shamsuddin", said the duty officer of the Demra police station.  
 Shamsuddin was missing since he had left his house at Parabo, Demra, for office Saturday morning.  
 Police are yet to find any clue to the murder. The body was sent to the Mitford Hospital morgue for autopsy.  
 Ayesha Bibi, wife of the late police constable, lodged a murder case with Demra police.
