She Defies Elements and More

Dominique Lapierre is no Charles Dickens, nor is he a native of the city he has presented with all its filth, squalor and perhaps an ounce of grace in his much-heralded novel, "City of Joy". Dhaka did not have the fortune or misfortune to come under such a searching gaze of Western writers. A writer of Dickens's stature and vision would perhaps treated Dhaka and Calcutta as the twin cities like Paris and London. Sunil Gangopadhyay made an attempt to bring in the political struggles and the trauma of being uprooted from one's own soil following the division of Bengal. Yet the subject have stopped short of becoming a gripping experience.


Yet Dhaka has an attractive history which no one has fully captured in fictions where the spirit matters more than the statement of bare facts. What Sir Laurens van der Post has done for the South Africans — the Blacks in particular or the Bushmen of Africa or Kalahari Desert — may not be applicable for olden Dhaka or the original Dhakites who are evidently a dying species now, but at least the floating populace of this city could be a subject of historical study with the depth of Laurens's compassion.

Neither historical nor compassionate treatment of the city's unwanted has so far riveted the attention on them in a humanitarian way. Perhaps to challenge such a mindless indifference an old woman has resorted to a most unusual culinary practice. The place she has chosen is the narrow strip of road divider

in between Dhanmondi and Shukrabad. No, she has not intruded into the enclosure with iron railing but squeezed exactly into the small opening where the long fencing from two sides ends to allow pedestrians to cross from one side of the road to the other.

While vehicles move in opposite directions in an endless flow, blaring their high-decibel horns, the woman goes on peeling or slicing her vegetables for cooking right in the middle of the automobile melee. A Lapierre would have something to show to the world as a seamy side of Dhaka life. But that did nothing to assuage the wretchedness, the agony of the woman and also the indignity of man in a myopic civilization. Writting stunt is one thing and opening an inner vision, a god-like insight is a completely different matter.

The old woman who lives on that small space under the open sky is a living protest against a civilization boasting of space or micro chip age. She defies natural elements with the same disdain she demonstrates against law and order. She is lucky that no small man of law has as yet considered her intrusion as an act of defiance to his authority and has not ordered to pack her insignificant belongings. The old woman has made a point but there is none to notice it. The gaping holes in our society most of the time are tried to put under the blanket. She takes the gloss of our society but we are too inhuman to see it and feel it.

Malaria claims 200 since Jan

Deputy Minister for Health Sirajul Haq yesterday told the House that some 200 people died of cerebral malaria in the country since January 1, reports UNB.

Replies to a question from Sardar Shakawat Hossain Bakul (BNP), the minister said Tatherpur thana in Sunamganj was the worst affected by malaria where it spread in an epidemic form and claimed 117 lives.

He said 8,504 people were attacked by malaria in 46 thanas. The government has taken emergency steps in the affected areas.

Badly affected areas are: Tatherpur, Kalmakanda, Dharmapasha, Matiranga, Alikadam, Ukhia and Nithhangchhari.

Replies to another question from Begum KJ Hamida Khanam, the minister said according to 1991 census, the country's population growth rate was 2.17. But the growth rate reduced by 0.83 per cent since family planning programmes were launched.

'Prithvi' launch to escalate tension, says Pak leader

A Pakistani leader yesterday described the test-firing of India's home-built missile, 'Prithvi', as a 'blatant disregard' of global trends towards dialogue for denuclearisation and disarmament in the unipolar world, reports UNB.

"As a representative democratic government, India should make more efforts in defusing tension in the region, rather than testing missile and arms buildup," said Shanawaz Waezer Ali, Special Assistant to the Pakistan Prime Minister, who arrived here yesterday on a three-day visit.

She said when Pakistan was undertaking nuclear programmes for peaceful purposes "it is unfortunate that India had tested missile which will escalate tension in the region."

Pakistan has called for immediate meeting of the SAARC to work out means of easing tension.

19 new hospitals set up at thana level since Jan '91

Nineteen new hospitals have been constructed at a cost of Tk 55.53 crore in different thana headquarters since January 1991, Health and Family Welfare Minister Chowdhury Kamal Ibne Yusuf told Parliament yesterday, reports UNB.

In reply to another question from Hafeza Asma Khatun, the minister said the government has no plan to appoint any MBBS doctor in the Family Welfare Centre at the union level.

But 250 MBBS doctors have been appointed at the union level under the Fourth Five Year Plan.

D-Day photographic exhibition begins

The photographs were all about the "Great Crusade" — The brothers in arms landing on the tough Normandy beaches on June 6, 1944, known as the D-Day.

The black-and-white mosaic of the pictures, portraying the courage and sacrifices at Normandy, France, were put on display on the international commemoration of the landing and liberation of France in the Second World War.

The cultural section of the French Embassy organised the 10-day photographic exhibition that began yesterday at the Alliance Francaise in the city.

The exhibition is being hosted as part of the worldwide celebration organised by the French Cultural Ministry to mark the 50th anniversary of the D-Day.

Opening the function, Ambassador of France in Dhaka Jean-Michel Lacombe said that the landing of the Allied Forces in Normandy, condemned Operation Overlord, was a great gamble that cost thousands of lives.
