

Colombians beat Greeks 2-0

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J., June 6: Herman Gavira and Freddy Rincon scored second-half goals off free kicks to give Colombia a 2-0 victory over fellow World Cup qualifier Greece in a tuneup for both teams at Giants Stadium Sunday, reports AP.


The game also served as the first test of the stadium's new grass field, which was installed over an artificial surface in May.

And from all indications, the field held up very well. The ball appeared to bounce smoothly, the footing was good and the sodded sections did not become loose as players were tackled, a major concern with seven World Cup games scheduled here in June and July.

Colombia dominated before a crowd of 73,511, most of whom wore yellow and rooted for the South American team.

After a scoreless first half in which Colombia had the best of the scoring chances, the Colombians substituted in forwards Adolfo Valencia and Faustino Asprilla and that got the offence going.

Asprilla was fouled just out-

side the left corner of the box in the 48th minute and Carlos Valderrama launched a soft floating pass toward goal on the ensuing free kick. Gavira outjumped two Greek defenders and headed the ball into the corner of the net, just out of reach of Greek keeper Ilias Atmatzidis.

Rincon got the other goal in the 68th minute after another

on to volley the ball into the left corner.

Greece, who will make their World Cup debut, had very few scoring chances. Their best might have come seven minutes into the second half when Savas Kofidis appeared to have a clear shot at Colombian goalkeeper Oscar Cordoba in the penalty area. But Asprilla came back from the offensive and booted the ball over his own goal just as Kofidis was about to shoot.







Greeks robbed of their pride, possession

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J., June 6: Greece may have lost more than a world cup tune up against Colombia on Sunday, reports AP.

Greece coach Alkis Panagoulas alleged during his team was beaten 2-0 by Colombia, someone broke into the team's locker at the Giants Stadium during the exhibition and stole money and jewelry.

"This is bad for the World Cup," said Panagoulas, who graduated from nearby Upsala college and was the coach of the US National team from 1982-85. "We were robbed. They took everything, money, jewelry and watches."

A spokesman at the State Police office at Giants Stadium said a report had not been filed about 45 minutes after the game. Several hundred state troopers were on duty at the game, many ringing the field during the game.

John Griffin, the World Cup USA press officer at the venue, said his organization has received a preliminary report on the alleged incident.

"The players are returning to their hotel to check their rooms before any further action is taken," Griffin said.

Brolin double sinks Norway

STOCKHOLM, June 6: Swedish striker Tomas Brolin struck twice on Sunday to give his team a convincing 2-0 victory over fellow-World Cup finalists Norway, reports Reuter.

The partnership of AC Parma's Brolin and Martin Dahlin of Borussia Moenchengladbach, far and away Sweden's best two players, was too much for a ponderous looking Norwegian side, which lacked fire power up front.

Norway spoiled Sweden's attacking game in the first half by packing the midfield with five men and playing with a single striker.

The home team's PSV Eindhoven striker Klas Ingesson provided the high point of the first half with a sizzling 25-metre volley after a neat one-two with Dahlin, but Tottenham's goalkeeper Erik Thorstvedt saved.

Sweden piled on the pressure at the start of the second half and broke through when Dahlin and Brolin played another one-two. The move appeared to break down but the ball bounced off a Norwegian defender for Brolin to hammer the ball home from 15 metres.

Five minutes later Dahlin slotted an inch-perfect pass through to Jesper Blomqvist, who was adjudged to have been brought down by Thorstvedt. Brolin scored comfortably from the penalty spot.

Norway brought on three substitutes in an attempt to score. But the Swedish defense looked secure for the rest of the match.

Koreans lose last warm-up

WAKEFIELD, Mass., June 6: Jon Ron's second goal of the game in the 77th minute lifted Ecuador to a 2-1 victory over the Republic of Korea in an exhibition soccer match, Sunday night, reports AP.

Ron's match winner was a header which beat Korean goalkeeper Park Choi-Woo from 15 meters out. Luis Carrasco set up the goal with a strong cross from the left.

Korea's Hong Myung Bo beat Ecuador goalkeeper Jacinto Espinoza with a penalty kick in the 60th minute to tie the game at 1-1.

Ecuador played the second half one man short after Juan Carlos Garay received his second yellow card late in the first.

The game, played in front of a crowd of about 3,000, was Korea's final warmup before the World Cup. Korea are scheduled to open their World Cup competition against Spain on June 17 at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas.

Ecuador are not involved in the World Cup.

AC Milan's generosity

JAKARTA, June 6: Visiting Italian soccer club AC Milan said it would donate 10,000 dollars to the victims of tidal waves which claimed more than 200 lives in East Java, the official Antara news agency said today, reports AFP.

Asked about a row over World Cup bonuses, which soured relations between players and officials last week, forward Nasro Sirakov said the players had put the dispute behind them.

The row led to the resignation of the Bulgarian Soccer Union president Valentin Mihov after he unilaterally promised players large bonuses which the union said it could not afford.

Czechs send Irish tumbling

DUBLIN, June 6: Ireland, who have beaten serious World Cup contenders Germany and the Netherlands in the last six weeks, were brought down to earth on Sunday when they lost 3-1 to the Czech Republic in their last World Cup warm-up match, reports Reuter.

Kuka fired at the centre of the goal but goalkeeper Pat Bonner had already committed himself to a dive to his left and was unable to stop the shot. It was the first goal Ireland had conceded since last November.

Two goals, the first a penalty, from Pavel Kuka of Kaiserslautern in Germany and one from defender Jan Suchoperek gave the visitors, who have failed to qualify for the World Cup finals, a well-deserved victory over a lacklustre Irish team who leave for their training camp in Florida on Monday.

Ireland's only goal was credited to Andy Townsend although his 18-metre drive took a deflection off a defender before leaving goalkeeper Bett Kuboa easily beaten.

Irish manager Jack Charlton said afterwards, "I am not reading anything into that result. That was not the real us. It will have little bearing on how we fare in the World Cup."

The loss was only Ireland's second in the last 17 matches and only the 11th time they have lost in eight years since Charlton became manager.

But the setback deflated the mood of more than 40,000 fans at Lansdowne Road who had come to give their green-shirted heroes a rousing send-off to the United States.

The Czechs took the lead when Terry Phelan was forced

in a desperate lunge to bring down the elusive Kuka at the end of another penetrating counter attack in the 25th minute.

Kuka fired at the centre of the goal but goalkeeper Pat Bonner had already committed himself to a dive to his left and was unable to stop the shot. It was the first goal Ireland had conceded since last November.

That seemed only a temporary setback when skipper Townsend fired a fierce shot from the edge of the box after Tony Cascarino's touch-back and the ball flew in after a massive deflection off Tomas Repka.

But as they chased a game that was gradually getting away from them, the Irish ran the inevitable risk of the quick counter.

And seven minutes from time Suchoperek beat Bonner with a shot that went in off the post.

Coyne twice went close

near the end of the match but it just wasn't Ireland's day.
