BOGOTA, Colombia, June 7: Colombia, who hadn't played in the World Cup for 28 years, made it to the second round in 1990. Four years later, some give the Colombians a chance of winning, reports AP.

"There's no sin in dreaming," coach Francisco Maturano said.

With Faustino Asprilla, who scored 10 goals for Parma in Italy, and Adolfo Valencia, who scored 11 for Bundesliga champion Bayern Munich, Colombia should have one of the top attacks in the tournament.

"The key to the World Cup is playing each game as though it were the championship," Valencia said.

Goalkeeper Rene Higuita, his career sidelined by a stay in prison, isn't on the team. The focus then will be on the centre of the field, on Carlos Valderrama, the one with the floppy blond hair.

Bu the undisputed star is Asprilla, considered one of the top forwards in the world.

"He has everything to become No 1 in the world," says Eusebio, who led the 1966 World Cup in scoring with nine goals for Portugal. "He is a phenomenon."

Valderrama played in France for Montpellier and in Spain for Valladolid, but is now back home. Freddy Rincon plays for Palmeiras in Brazil.

"My going to Brazil was important," Rincon said. "I earned a lot of experience on an athletic and personal level."

Players on Colombia's bench include forwards Ivan Valenciano, Anthony Avila and Victor Hugo Arizabal. Goalkeeper Farid Mondragon will back up Oscar Cordoba, who replaced Higuita.

"Colombia is going to go far in the World Cup," Cordoba predicted.

Luis Carlos Perea, recuperating from surgery on the right knee, and Andres Escobar are considered the heart of the

defence. Luis Fernando Herrera and Wilson Prez play on the wings and often move forward.

"I have a lot of expectations for the World Cup," Asprilla said, "because I know what the team is capable of doing."

It was capable enough to beat Argentina 5-0 at Buenos Aires to clinch a spot in the 24-team field. Colombia at one point had a 28-game unbeaten streak, most of it against top quality international opposition.

Maturano, a dentist, is considered the best coach Colombia ever has produced. He smiles when pondering the success of the soccer team.

Colombia often are criticised for their drug cartels, which reportedly have controlled various elite teams in the country. But the coach tries to stay above that, and keep the team above that, too.

"Colombia needed this," he said. "This country has suffered a lot. Soccer helps relieve the pain."

LARA — TRANSCENDENTAL TRINIDADIAN



LONDON, June 7: Brian Lara rewrote the cricket record books on Monday with the world's highest first-class innings of 501 not out, reports Reuter.

Playing for Warwickshire in their county championship match against Durham at Edgbaston, Birmingham, West Indies batsman Lara beat the previous mark of 499 by Pakistani against Karachai for Karachi against Bahawalpur in the 1958-59 season.

Dropped by Durham wicket-keeper Chris Scott when he had scored only 18 on the second day of the rain-hit game on Friday, Lara reached the landmark by cover driving occasional bowler John Morris for four.

Trinidadian left-hander Lara, who holds the world's highest Test score of 375 has now hit seven centuries in his last eight first-class innings.

That sequence started with his 375 in the fifth and final Test against England in Antigua in April and continued when he came to Warwickshire shortly afterwards.

In his first county season Lara has championship scores of 147 v Glamorgan, 106 and 120 not out v Leicestershire, 136 v Somerset, 26 and 140 v Middlesex and 501 not out v Durham.

Lara, characteristically, was down to earth when he spoke about his innings. "It's nice to have records and be on top but I've still got a lot of cricket ahead of me and I need to be more consistent," he said.

There were only two deliveries of the match remaining when Lara faced Morris with his score 497, but he needed

just one to make cricket history.

"I didn't realise we were in the last over until four balls had been bowled," said Lara. "(Non-striker) Keith (Piper) came up to me and said there were only two deliveries left."

The Trinidadian, who batted in total for nearly eight hours and struck 10 sixes and 62 fours, added: "Records are there to be broken and I'm happy to be the one doing it."

"If the records I have set are broken I hope I am the one doing it. It's hard to compare my Test 375 with 501 here... you just have to cherish both of them."


Lara's performance transcended all else in Monday's county cricket, though his West Indies teammate Desmond Haynes would have taken a measure of satisfaction from his first first-class century for almost a year.

Opener Haynes completed his 55th career hundred in 129 balls for Middlesex as they pursued 349 in a minimum 80 overs to beat Worcestershire at Lord's.

Haynes has struggled this season, scoring 73 runs in six innings, but struck three sixes and 15 fours in his return to form. Even so, Middlesex ended on 304 for eight and the game was drawn.

Dutch-born place bowler Andre van Troost seized three wickets for no runs in nine deliveries as Somerset snatched their first championship win of the season after four consecutive defeats.

They beat Hampshire by 87 runs at Taunton, having set a target of 333 after two innings were forfeited in a rain-hit match.

ADELAIDE, Australia, June 7: Sir Donald Bradman, the greatest batsman in cricket history, Thursday offered his congratulations to West Indies star Brian Lara on becoming the first man in the history of first-class cricket to score 500 runs in an innings, reports PTI.

Bradman made a brief statement after being told of Lara's unbeaten 501 for Warwickshire against Durham in a County Championship match in England.

"Brian Lara is a wonderful aggressive player with the right attitude to the game of cricket," Bradman said. "My heartiest congratulations go to him on his record-breaking feat."

Bradman's 452 for New South Wales in 1930 is now the third-highest first-class score.

Some more for Imran

MADRAS, June 7: "No bowler in the world other than Pakistan's Imran Khan practised ball tampering and the whole issue is amazing," said the two great pacers of Australia, Jeff Thomson and Dennis Lillee, reports PTI.

"We used to suspect the way Imran used to swing an old ball but we never asked him. It is the duty of the administrators and we just played the game," said the deadly duo of the 1970s.

Lillee and Thomson who arrived here early this morning to pick the potential trainees for the MRF Pace Foundation were talking to newsmen.

"Neither of us indulged in such methods. None could swing the old ball the wrong way like Imran used to when he was 60 or 70 overs old," Thomson said.

Size matters in batting, says Hanif



LONDON, June 7: Hanif Mohammad, who knows a thing or two about batting records, says the secret of Brian Lara's success is all down to his size, reports Reuter.

West Indies Test batsman Lara smashed Hanif's world record first-class score of 499 on Monday, plundering an unbeaten 501 for Warwickshire in their county championship match against Durham at Edgbaston, Birmingham.

Hanif was known as Pakistan's "Little Master" during his heady years of high scoring in the 1950s and 1960s, said after being told his record had fallen to Lara: "It's all in the height, I believe."

Former Pakistan captain Hanif, speaking in an interview on British radio, said: "Lara is very short and many other short Test players have scored lots of runs, like me. Sir Don

broke the world record of Sir Don Bradman after so many years so records are meant to be broken."

While the cricket world marvelled at Lara's latest feat, it apparently came as no surprise to his 63-year-old mother Pearl in Trinidad.

"I'm happy for him and I expect him to do great things but it doesn't surprise me. He always lived up to the expectations," she said from her home in the eastern Cantaro village.

"He likes to make runs and when he gets out there (on the pitch), he just wants to make runs and he makes quite a lot."

The mother of 11 children and 21 grandchildren, Pearl said her only regret was that his father Bunti, who died in 1989, was not around to see his performance and share in the happiness.

Hanif was not surprised that his record, for Karachi against Bahawalpur in the 1958-59 season, had been beaten.

"Records are meant to be broken," he said. "That is my belief. When I got 499, people started saying that nobody could break that. But I said 'I

Bradman and Sir Len Hutton.

"It is a magnificent achievement to score 501 in first-class cricket. I knew he was capable of it because he broke the world record in Test cricket. I've been watching him for the last three years and he's a magnificent cricketer."

Hanif was not surprised that his record, for Karachi against Bahawalpur in the 1958-59 season, had been beaten.

"Records are meant to be broken," he said. "That is my belief. When I got 499, people started saying that nobody could break that. But I said 'I

The speed with which Lara has risen to power prompted former West Indies captain Clive Lloyd to say: "He's done it all in such a short time."

"None of the other great players achieved so much so quickly. If he plays for another 15 years it is difficult to imagine what he might achieve."

Lara, whose unbeaten 501 was made out of Warwickshire's first innings of 810 for four declared in a drawn four-day match accepts the plaudits with grace and modesty.

"It's nice to have records and be on top but I've still got a lot of cricket ahead of me and I need to be more consistent. I don't think I'm a great cricketer," he said.

Lara plans a short break back home in the Caribbean later this week.

"I'll try to slip into Trinidad quietly," he said. "Now that would be an achievement."
